## U. S. FIRMS CARELESS WITH FOREIGN MAIL

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—Way to American business firms send big chances for trade in foreign countries by the little thing of omitting proper postage on letters going to those countries. That question has never been answered and yet some of the biggest firms in the United States are doing this in spite of every effort of the postoffice department to correct. There are almost 2000 letters which reach New York city daily with short-paid postage or no postage at all for foreign countries. The postoffice department has decided that the only way to impress business firms with the seriousness of the situation is to return those letters to the senders for additional postage. This is preferable to forwarding them to destination, where double the amount of the postage in postage is collected.

## EXPLOSION OF BOMBS BREAKS UP FESTIVITIES

RENO, July 29.—The festivities of St. John's Eve were interrupted by the explosion of three dynamite bombs of enormous dimensions, thrown by unknown hands in different parts of the city, outside three printing offices of which the printers are on strike.

The first explosion was so terrific that although laborites are becoming accustomed to bombs, real pain was produced among the merry-makers in the streets of Battery Alley who, leaving their open air balls and bonfires, fled into the lower part of town. Although there were no victims, the force of the explosion brought down the ceilings of the houses near which it burst. A dense and suffocating smoke filled the whole street and many persons fainted.

Another bomb did less damage in the Rua dos Correios, and the third, which was of the same powerful type as the first, burst near an open air ball, seriously wounding three persons. Some arrests were made, but no real clue has as yet been discovered.

The suggestion has been made that men be permitted to smoke in church. Perhaps on the theory that it is better to smoke here than elsewhere.

## OLDTIMERS HAVE VERY PROMISING SILVER PROSPECT

Frank Macy, Jack Whitman and Pete Wynekin, three oldtimers of this district, are apparently on the road to wealth. The three men arrived in Tonopah last night from Frisberg, the extreme eastern end of Nye county, where they are engaged in developing a promising silver property, and report that they have a showing that will compare favorably with any of the new outlying districts in southern Nevada. The shaft now has a depth of 60 feet and a fine body of commercial grade ore has been followed almost from grass roots, picked samples showing values running up into the hundreds of dollars a ton.

It is proposed to sink until a depth of 75 feet is attained when drifting will be started in both directions. It is also intended to do considerable crosscutting to exploit the vein system which makes such a strong showing on the surface. The property is located 48 miles from the railroad, Jackrabbit being the shipping point.

## WAR ROMANCE CULMINATES IN WEDDING HERE

A union that was brought about as a result of the late world war was consummated yesterday when Mrs. Eugenie Slabbacke, mother of Mrs. Edna Nort, and Richard Van Denbosche were made man and wife, Justice Cuddy officiating. The ceremony was performed at the residence of the bride's daughter in the presence of only immediate relatives and friends of the contracting parties, the couple being attended by Frank Vertie and Mrs. Nort. Following the ceremony the newlyweds were treated to a real old-fashioned charivari last night, and a wedding supper was served which was attended by about 30 people. The contracting parties are both natives of Belgium and came to this country following the signing of the armistice. Both passed through harrowing experiences during the invasion of their country by the Germans. Mrs. Van Denbosche having been left for dead with her throat severed. She made a complete recovery, much to the surprise of the attending physicians. The groom recently came to Tonopah from Michigan and the couple will make their home here.

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## PIONEER GOLDFIELD MINING MAN DEAD

James S. Alan, one of Goldfield's oldest and most respected citizens, passed away at his home on West Ramsey street at 12:45 Thursday morning after a fight against the inevitable in which he and the family had the sympathy of hundreds of friends, a sympathy that is now deepened for those who remain to mourn.

Going to Goldfield in 1903, when the town was still young, Mr. Alan entered into business enterprises and since then had a successful career, going into many ventures in mining as side issues which still leave properties in his name in several of the districts surrounding Goldfield.

He is survived by his widow, a son, Byron Alan; a daughter, Miss Edwina Alan, all now in Goldfield; a sister, Mrs. Will Delano, in Manitowoc, Wis., and a brother, Rev. W. T. Alan, in Greenville, Pa. A son, Walter J. Alan, died here in 1907, and is buried in Goldfield.
