WEATHER WAS WARM DURING JULY MONTH

There was an average of 82 per cent of sunshine during the month of July, according to the report of J. C. Percy, observer of the local weather bureau. The highest temperature was 96 on the 25d, while the lowest was 45, which was recorded on the 3d. The mean temperature for the month was 76, which was the highest in 15 years except during 1917, when it reached 77. Precipitation for the month was recorded at .01 inches, which occurred on the 18th. There were 19 clear days and 12 partly cloudy. Thunderstorms occurred on the 16th and 20th. Prevailing direction of the wind was southeast with a total movement of 5873 miles, with a maximum velocity of 33 miles per hour.

IRRIGATION VOTE IS OVERWHELMING

(By Associated Press) YREKA, Cal., Aug. 1.—Organization of the Klamath-Shasta irrigation to include 125,000 acres in the Shasta valley was voted by an overwhelming majority recently. The next step will be the raising of funds with which to make a detailed survey of the project, which calls for the tapping of the Klamath river and using the overflow waters from Klamath lake for irrigation purposes in the district.

BULGARIA HAS SIMPLIFIED ITS SPELLING PLAN

(By Associated Press) SOFIA, Aug. 1.—Simplification of the Bulgarian orthography by eliminating three letters of the alphabet, recently ordered by the cabinet council, has just been put into effect. The censorship, still existing here, will enforce the new spelling in all publications.

These three letters are remnants of the old Slavic tongue. They do not exist in the Serbian language and they recently were ordered stricken from the Russian alphabet by the soviet ministry of public instruction. Their principal use was as word terminations. The new spelling is taken in some quarters to be an effort toward closer relations with the Serbs.




