ACQUITTED MEN HAVE NO CHANGE IN FUTURE

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—None of the American league players who were acquitted last night of alleged criminal conspiracy to throw the 1919 world series has any immediate prospect of being restored to organized baseball, according to a statement issued by Judge Landis, national baseball commissioner. "Regardless of the verdict of the jury," said the statement, "no player that throws a ball game, no player that entertains proposals or promises to throw a ball game, no player that sits in conference with a bunch of crooked players and gamblers where ways and means of throwing games are discussed, and does not promptly tell his club about it, will ever play in professional baseball."

Scenes of extreme pathos were enacted all day yesterday at the Hotel Vesuvius. Neapolitans of every class stood in line many hours to file past the pier of Caruso. From time to time the procession would halt while a man or woman would kneel for a moment beside the body and offer a prayer.

HUNGARY PLANNING TO REORGANIZE CHAMBER

The chamber will be composed of parties representing the various cities and industrial, commercial and cultural associations. The members of the nobility also will be represented. Another party will be representative of the clergy, members of the government and judiciary. There also will be 20 life members to be appointed by the king on the suggestion of the prime minister.

CALIFORNIA STRIKE OF OIL MEN CERTAIN

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 3.—The district council of the Oil Workers' Union of California completed today its preliminary plans for a strike of 20,000 workers in the California fields on September 1, which it intends to call if the operators persist in their refusal to negotiate a new agreement with the men and the federal government, Walter Yarrow, president of the union, announced.

DANGER OF FLOOD HAS PASSED IN COLORADO

(By Associated Press) PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 3.—Fear of a repetition of the floods which devastated Pueblo two months ago passed today as the waters of the Arkansas river steadily receded from their high mark, which was reached last night. Many merchants in the downtown district moved their stock last night when they received word of threatening flood conditions.

MAN BEATEN TO DEATH BY RENO AUTOMOBILIST

(By Associated Press) CARSON CITY, Nev., Aug. 3.—C. Pellor, of Goffs, California, died today at Gardnerville from the effects of a beating given him Monday. John Strauss, of Reno, admitted beating Pellor with an axe while they were on their way to California in Pellor's automobile, the police said, but gave no reason for the act.

NEW FIND MADE IN CLOISTER DISCOVERY

(By Associated Press) JERUSALEM, Aug. 3.—Excavations at Askalon have resulted in the discovery of the famous cloister round the great court built by Herod the Great which was described in the writings of Josephus as being admirable for its workmanship and grandeur. Statues of Apollo, Venus and Victory and also a gigantic statue of Herod has been found on the spot.

NEVADA TAX COMMISSION STARTS SESSION AUG. 15

NEGRO HANGED BY MOB DOWN VIRGINIA WAY

(By Associated Press) PETERSBURG, Va., Aug. 3.—One of two negroes who were arrested last night in connection with the murder of Theloy Elmore, postmaster of Tobacco, Virginia, was taken from jail at Lawrenceville today by a mob and lynched. The other negro was not molested.

WILLIAMS IS CALLED DOWN BY GOVERNOR

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—Governor Harding of the federal reserve board, after sitting through a two-day attack on his administration by John Skelton Williams, former comptroller of the currency, today broke into the proceedings of the congressional committee with a flat denial of statements the witness was making. Williams in the course of his testimony remarked that Governor Harding had broken his promise to him concerning the board record. "I deny that I ever made such a promise," Governor Harding exclaimed. "Governor Harding has threatened to use poison gas," Williams said. "And I deny that, too," Governor Harding shouted.

NOT GUILTY IS VERDICT WHITE SOX BALL CASE

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—The seven former White Sox players and two alleged gamblers brought to trial in the baseball scandal case today stood cleared of any connection with the alleged conspiracy to throw the 1919 world series to Cincinnati, a jury last night having acquitted them on the first ballot. A verdict freeing Buck Weaver, Happy Felsch, Chick Gandil, Joe Jackson, Claude Williams, Charles Riesberg and Eddie Cootie, former players, and Carl Zerk and David Ziser, was returned shortly before midnight, amidst a scene of wild cheering, whistling and yelling from 500 spectators. By chance early today the former White Sox ball players and the jurors who acquitted them met in a little Italian restaurant, and both parties joined in a celebration that lasted until sunrise. The party broke up with the singing of "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here." All indictments remaining against the acquitted ball players will be quashed, Robert Crowe, state's attorney said today. "As far as I am concerned, the case is a closed book."

WHITE SOX BARRED FROM COAST GAMES

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 3.—None of the former White Sox players who were acquitted in Chicago last night ever will be permitted to play in the Pacific Coast league, William McCarthy, president, announced. "The acquittal of the accused was a technical verdict only," McCarthy said.

CONCEALED WEAPON TRIAL IS CONTINUED

The trial of Gordon Weston, who was arrested several days ago on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, and which was scheduled to be heard this afternoon at 2 o'clock, was continued until next Tuesday at 10 o'clock in the morning upon the request of Attorney Thompson, representing the defendant.

WESTERN RAILROADS INCREASE FORCES

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—That railroads entering Chicago are preparing for a resumption of big business in the near future was learned with the announcement that the Chicago Burlington & Quincy had added 2300 men to its forces. Of the new employes 1300 will be used in the repair of cars and the others on the maintenance of way.

RELEASE OF AMERICANS IN RUSSIA REPORTED

(By Associated Press) RIGA, Latvia, Aug. 3.—American prisoners in Russia already have been released from confinement, according to unofficial reports at the bolshevik legation press bureau here today, but there was no word as to the number released or when, how or where they will be delivered across the border.

AMERICA LOSES YACHT CONTEST ACROSS SEAS

(By Associated Press) COWES, Isle of Wight, Aug. 3.—Great Britain won the third of the series of international races for six-meter yachts sailed here today. The British yachts scored 21 points against 15 for their American competitors.
