OIL WORKERS CONTINUE TO GUARD ROADS

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Sept. 22.—The law and order committee of the striking oil workers of Kern county continued today to guard roads, highways, bridges and other points of interest, and to return back all property to the fields who could not satisfactorily explain their absence. The workers were not seeking to harm anyone, secretary of the union, Fred Stephens, who was reported to have been in Sacramento, last night, before a personal investigation to determine whether the law and order committee in fact was a strike committee, as charged by the oil companies, was not registered in the state here today. The local oil companies have formed an organization to keep in better touch with developments.

PRELIMINARY OF ARBUCKLE STARTS TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Sept. 22.—The preliminary hearing of Roscoe Arbuckle on the charge of murder in connection with the death of Virginia Rappé, before Judge Lazarus, occupied the attention of all concerned with the case today. The men were excluded from the hearing under an order issued last night by District Attorney Brady, who said he believed the hearing would occupy at least three days. The preliminary hearing will be held on the charge of murder but it is within the discretion of Judge Lazarus to fix the degree of the crime he believes Arbuckle to be guilty of under the evidence.

LIBEL SUIT FOR MILLIONS OPENS CHICAGO COURT

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—A \$10,000,000 libel suit of the city of Chicago against the Chicago Tribune opened today with counsel for the newspaper asking the court to uphold a general demurrer based on constitutional rights of freedom of the press. If granted, the demurrer would have the effect of dismissing the suit on the grounds of insufficient evidence. The suit involves the question of whether a newspaper may be held liable to the extent of its total value, and virtually be put out of business if the suit is won. The libel action grew out of statements made by the Tribune during the last city election, criticizing the present city administration for the manner in which the municipal finances were handled. The city contends the article and editorial expressions on which the suit is based damaged the city credit in disposing of municipal bonds.

FOREIGN PRICE SILVER MAKING REAL ADVANCE

Local dealers said that apart from heavy purchases of silver for the Orient, the diminishing supply and the virtual suspension of mining is an important factor.

FRANK MERKLE DROPS DEAD IN BANK BUFFET

TONOPAH, Nev., Sept. 22.—Frank Merkle, 50 years old, an old-time resident of Tonopah, died suddenly at 10:30 o'clock while seated in a chair in the bank buffet. Merkle had been sitting for three days, evidently suffering from indigestion, and when he came upon this morning he remarked that he had spent a bad night. He first talked of going to one of the hospitals, but upon reaching a point directly opposite the Bonanza office he sat down on the curbing, stating that he could not finish the work. Later he went into the bank and at 10:30 o'clock sat for Dr. McLeod. Shortly after the latter's arrival Merkle died.

WATER LEVEL IS REACHED AT PIONEER MINE

TONOPAH, Nev., Sept. 22.—The shaft on the Pioneer mine at Tonopah has attained a depth of 800 feet, reaching the water level, and good values have been found in the ore, according to W. J. Tabin, principal owner of the property, who is a visitor in Tonopah. From the 700 level down to the 800-foot point, traces of values has heretofore been found, and the fact that assays show values of from \$400 to \$500 a ton has given encouragement to the situation.
