INDIAN HERO HELPS OTHERS HARVEST CROP

(By Associated Press) IDABEL, Okla., Oct. 5.—On a small farm in McCurtain county 35 miles over rough roads from Idabel, Joseph Oklahombi, a Choctaw Indian, is hunting and fishing, raising corn and helping his neighbors at harvest time.

A half-dozen persons in Idabel could be found who remembered exactly what part Oklahombi played in the world war—yet it was he who captured 171 German prisoners single-handed, and was decorated and cited by Marshal Petain of France as the second greatest American hero that the war produced.

Oklahombi however, when questioned by Mrs. C. C. Conlan, of the Oklahoma Historical society, who also is a Choctaw, saw nothing peculiar in his lack of recognition, he said. He did only his duty, he added, and is now back home with his wife and baby—carrying on as his forefathers carried on. Oklahombi is a full-blood.

His name, taken from the Choctaw, means in their language "man killer," according to an interpreter. It is not directly connected with the name Oklahoma, presented to the state, which is a combination of two Choctaw words.

NEWPORT PLANS CITY OF HOMES AND NOT RESORT

(By Associated Press) NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 5.—Newport for the people of Newport—summer folk and the regular residents, not for excursionists—is the slogan of the Newport Improvement society. The fashionable summer colony has organized to oppose a tendency regarded as containing possibilities of making Newport a "Coney Island." Excursionists should not be attracted; the long stretch of beach on the waterfront should be developed as a bathing place exclusively and not as an amusement resort, society believes.

A corporation of summer residents has been formed to make a bid for the beach property with a view to conservative development. Amusements now considered as objectionable and attractive only to transient visitors would be eliminated and excursion traffic would be discouraged under the plans of those interested.

EXPORTS HEAVY DURING FIRST HALF OF YEAR

(By Associated Press) LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 5.—One million, three hundred and sixty thousand, four hundred and forty freight cars, each car 40 feet in length and containing 25 tons each, which placed end to end would form a continuous string of cars 10,396 miles long, or almost half around the world, would be necessary to transport the \$4,011,999 tons representing the combined quantity of principal commodities exported from the United States to all foreign countries for the first six months of 1921, according to an announcement made today by R. L. McKellar, foreign freight traffic manager of the Southern Railway system and Mobile & Ohio railroad, with headquarters here.

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IMPORTANT STYLES FEATURED IN SLEEVES AND COLLARS



Once again embroidery and fur lend their rich and luxurious flavor to the new suits for fall and winter, and once again designers indicate their choice of those decorative features. Embroideries have been developed in ways new to us and fur collars have taken on added importance because of their novel and very becoming shapes. They invite one to snuggle down into their soft and cozy depths and between them and the snugly soft and protecting hats that droop about the face, there is little chance for the cold to make headway against the merry eyes that can laugh at it.

Ever since a famous Paris designer introduced sleeves that are so large and so much emphasized by decoration that the rest of the garment becomes a mere background for them, sleeves have become more and more important in all outer garments. All sorts of embroideries find place on them—beads, silk and especially the new brand embroideries. These rich embellishments invite the company of fur and a very handsome example of this new mode appears in the suit shown at the left of the two pictured. The suit has trim lines and reveals a conservative interpretation of the decorative sleeve.

For some of these sleeves are made with wide, long, extended cuffs to the wristline. In this model the cuff is almost knee-length, cut with a slight flare in the wrist and much improved by large patch pockets. It is in that dark gray shade known as "sphinx" with cuffs and collar of dark beaver fur. Handsome hose buttons are something more than a pretense for it, a long, close-set row of them down the front makes the best possible finish for the embroidery.

The suit at the right has a head and fur-trimmed model in which the cuff is lower at the back than in front and lines straight. It also requires of buttons a decorative quality and a row of five of them appears where the front and back join in the coat. A narrow belt maintains the style introduced in the spring and consists of each side crossing at the front. These two suits are hand-made when developed in shop-surfaced cloth like velvets or flannel crepes. Fox, marten or other fur is used on them.

TOIYABE RANGE SCENE LATEST STRIKE OF GOLD

News of another new mineral discovery, this time gold values pre-eminently to a marked extent, reached Tonopah with the arrival of H. H. Kalkbrenner, a couple of specimens who was exhibiting specimens of ore carrying free gold which came from a property he recently located at the base of the Toiyabe range, four miles south of Millet and 30 miles north of Tonopah.

No little excitement was created as a result of this discovery, in view of the fact that the ore runs about 25 cents a pound in gold. While no assays have been reported at this writing, it is believed that the ore will show values of between \$100 and \$200 in gold a ton, and to mention the silver content.

The ore that Mr. Kalkbrenner was exhibiting was found at a depth of three feet in a well-defined vein. The ore has a width of about 4 inches, and has been exposed by a trench having a length of 20 feet. When first found it was only a knife-blade seam, but it is gradually widening out, and is unquestionably one of the richest surface gold finds that has been made in southern Nevada in a long period.

Mr. Kalkbrenner has located four claims and has a good showing on each, he stated, but the fine when the rich ore was taken, gave the greatest promise. He has been prospecting in that locality since June 15, and on July 1 succeeded in finding the vein of the ore that at first he had discovered. Since which time he has given most of his time to prospecting.

A number of Tonopah people have become greatly interested in the possibilities of the new district, and will be glad to see their way shown to the vein of the new discovery.
