## OUR SHIPPING POLICY.

In an address before the Associa- of exporting clubs in New York recently, Chairman Lasker of the United States shipping board called the policy of the Jones act to the attention of the country, and as far as the policy of the shipping board can commit it to a policy of dependence on American ships for the carrying of American commerce. This policy is clearly outlined and the necessity for it is clearly stated. The following passage from Chairman Lasker's speech is of interest: "The policy of self-dependence and self-sufficiency while it was conquering an empire of nations, finds itself ever approaching the time when vast supplies must be sent out into the lands of the world beyond the seas. If employment at home and conditions of domestic production are such that they will also not be sufficient to carry out our commerce, it is necessary to carry out our commerce by the foreign bottoms which have the foreign trade, and when they and our competition produce the most they will also not be sufficient to carry out our commerce."

The present task of the shipping board as Mr. Lasker defines it is to bring the Jones act into line with the facts of the case. The nature of our war-built shipping is such that it is not only desirable, it is necessary, to give the act a fair and equitable treatment. It embodies the essence of the protective principle. The Jones act is far from the ideal and our principal steel mills and shipping are now based upon steel which is far from both the pure and the sea. These facts involve practical disadvantages from which the shipping interests of our great rivals are free. Again, labor is high priced with us, and will remain high priced. The farmer's sons of Iowa and Kansas may be pressing to enter the merchant marine, but if so they are not entering it at the sacrifice of better opportunities at home. Our sailors, if we have them, must enjoy the same advantages of protection to American industry that other workers possess. That protection can be gained only through advantages for our merchant marine that compensate it for the practical advantages possessed by other nations. And if it is precisely the function and purpose of the Jones act to furnish this compensating advantage.

## OPTIMISM BECOMING PREVALENT.

The prosperity which is now favoring southern Nevada, and especially Tonopah, is becoming generally known throughout the country, and arrivals from every point say that the best thing is to see this great silver camp that in any other section of the country. In fact, Tonopah is the one popular topic of conversation these days, and especially so in view of the great activity that is manifesting itself in a mining way, as well as from the possibilities for oil at Fish Lake. Where there is a lot of smoke there generally is a little fire, so we must conclude that the outlook for southern Nevada is most bright and that our claims for recognition will be considered by the big powers in the financial world of affairs.

There never was a time when there was so much doing in a general way at Tonopah and the various districts tributary thereto, as at present. The numerous mineral finds of merit that have been made in the past few weeks have stimulated business conditions to a marked extent. There is a feeling of optimism pervading the atmosphere that has not been witnessed since the very height of the Divide excitement, and the booster has put on his fighting clothes, firm in his determination to bring Tonopah into popular favor with the investing public. Even the pessimist is beginning to sit up and take notice of what is going on about him, and is gradually wiping the cobwebs from his eyes, only to come to a realization of the fact that perhaps, after all, here is about the most likely place in these United States to make life worth while. Although winter is near at hand, the empire builder is not disheartened in the least. These stalwarts have not been idle by any means during the past few months, and mineral discoveries that have been made in various outside districts have had a tendency to provide for the future. Therefore, development will be prosecuted throughout the winter months at many of the camps which will no doubt result in a number of producers being developed by early spring.

## SCENIC ROUTE MOUNT LASSEN IS BEING BUILT

Its Associated Press REDDING, Cal., Oct. 24—Subsection of a portion of a route for a scenic highway through the recently-created Mount Lassen National park, near here, is being made by M. E. Lottner, of Redding, known as the "Father of the Lassen Park." Many isolated parts of the park, now seldom visited, will be opened up by the road, which for a great part of the distance will follow an old-fashioned trail from Reno to the present mining settlement of Shasta, near here.

Mount Lassen, the only active volcano in the continental United States, is only one of the wonders of the park, according to Lottner, who recently spent several weeks exploring wild and rugged portions of the reservation. One feature of Mount Lassen, a giant inverted bowl, rises 400 feet into the air to a point where one can see the other North and south of Cinder Cone. The great lava flow, jagged masses of lava a height of between 50 and 100 feet above the surrounding hills. Alpine lakes, with towering banks on one side and lava sand on the other, are hidden here and there in the lava beds.
