## BLUEBEARD OF GAMBALS IS CALLED FOR TRIAL

### Camp of Royston Now Experiencing a Mushroom Growth

#### HUNDREDS VISITING DISTRICT DAILY AS NEW FINDS REPORTED

The camp of Royston continues to show great activity in a prospecting way, and on Sunday 60 automobiles were counted on the ground at one time. It is estimated that fully 75 cars were out to the new camp during the day, which would mean that no less than 300 people visited the district during the day.

The new town now boasts of a general store and a woodyard, as well as a boarding house. The store is operated by John Luce, while on Saturday a boarding house, which is operated by J. W. Draper in a tent 18x18 feet in size, sprang up like a mushroom. Seven big auto trucks have been brought in by California people who had heard of the great possibilities, and a bid will be made for freight business.

John Connors and Francis Hallahan, two well-known young men of Tonopah, have applied to the public register commission of Nevada for a certificate of public convenience, as have L. L. Muesel and Muesel & Turner, and the matter will be heard by the commission at the court house in Tonopah on November 14 at 10:30 o'clock in the morning. The applicants desire to operate for both freight and passenger service between Tonopah and Royston, and in the event the permit is granted, which it will be without question, an economical means of transportation will be furnished for the prospectors who have been experiencing considerable difficulty in reaching the new silver-gold district of Nye county, which lies 27 miles north of Tonopah.

It has been many years since so much excitement predominated in southern Nevada as at the present time, and the one big topic of conversation now discussed in Tonopah is regarding Royston. Every mining man who has visited the camp since the big noise started seven weeks ago, following the uncovering of a large and rich body of ore on the Golden Eagle claim operated under lease by Betts and associates, has returned an optimistic booster for the district, although one or two have been inclined to be skeptical regarding the persistency of the ore-shoots. Captain A. Case, who has taken a lease on a portion of the Best Chance claim of the Hudson Mining company, made a wager Sunday that the ore-shoots would as a general rule be found to be extending to great depth.

The shaft on the Betts lease of the Golden Eagle claim had attained a depth Sunday night of 21 feet and the ore-vein was showing bigger and richer than ever. The high-grade shoot has a width of 3 feet in the bottom of the workings and will mill better than \$1000 a ton. Sacking of high-grade still continues and a shipment is expected to go out almost any day.

The McCarthy-Edwards lease on the Frisco claim, now controlled by what is known as the Super Six Mining company, is making a splendid showing, and considerable ore is ready for extraction. Coupled with the development on the Frisco claim, it might be mentioned that 12 leases

are at work, and in nearly every instance pay ore is exposed.

On the Golden Eagle claim trenching has exposed the vein for a length of 1300 feet and pay ore is an evidence. In the Betts shaft the men in control have placed a night guard to prevent any attempt at high-grading that might be made. Some of the ore has a value of at least \$5 a pound and shows liberally of black metal.

L. P. Kimball and associates, who are leasing on the I Guess claim, have uncovered in a trench about 2 feet of splendid-looking ore, and while no assays have been had at this writing, it is generally agreed among miners and prospectors that values of close to 500 ounces silver a ton are contained. These leases also control 500 feet of ground on the C. O. D., where Pate Beko and Lee Hand are meeting with satisfactory results. Ben D. Luce also has 500 feet of ground on the C. O. D., which adjoins the Beko-Hand lease, and in trenching he has exposed a splendid-looking vein that shows a good-sized streak of high-grade ore.

There is a feeling of optimism prevailing throughout all quarters. Since the Ben Hur Divide Mining company entered the district, taking over the Flagstaff and Hudson No. 1 claims, lying within 700 feet of the Betts lease, a garage has been constructed which adjoins the bankhouse. Development has been instituted and a most promising showing is in evidence. Several frame buildings are now in course of construction at the new camp and the person who would visit the scene after an absence of a week would be surprised at the remarkable growth the San Antonio district is experiencing in general, and especially the immediate locality which is known as Royston.

#### BULLION SENT OUT FROM TWO LARGER MINES

Bullion shipments were in order yesterday and today from two of the larger mines of the district. On Sunday morning the Tonopah Mining company sent out 19 bars having a weight of 40,000 ounces, which had an estimated value of \$45,000. This was the result of the clean-up of the Desert mill for the last 15 days of October.

This morning the Tonopah Extension Mining company sent out 22 bars, weighing 38,675.93 ounces, and having an estimated value of \$43,600. This was the result of the clean-up at the company mill for the last half of October.

#### GRAIN BILL IS THROWN OUT BY JUDGE LANDIS

#### AMERICAN REDMEN TO PAY HONOR UNKNOWN

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7.—Four American Indian chiefs, such a tribal hero, will pay to the unknown dead at Arlington next Friday the highest honors known to their race by placing on the casket a couple of war bonnets. Plenty Cooz, of the Crow; Lone Wolf, of the Kiowas, and Amos Red Owl and Stranger Dorse of the Sioux were chosen to confer the decoration by Commissioner of Indian Affairs Burke because of their prominence in Indian history of the west. Each is a high chief and has fought the American soldiers. They will be dressed in full warrior regalia.

#### MERGER OIL TO GENERATE ITS ELECTRICITY

George A. Foster, vice-president of the Flat Lake Merger Oil company, left by automobile today for California, where he will secure a driller for the night shift at the Merger well, which is to go on as soon as possible.

The Merger offices here have placed an order for a power generator sufficient to make electricity for the camp, which should arrive from Los Angeles Friday. With the installation of the lights and the completion of the boiler housing, the Merger camp will be prepared for mill shaft time. According to news from the well brought in yesterday by visitors who were inspecting the property, the drill is running full steam but in a very hard formation again.

#### WILL EXILE CHARLES ON ISLAND OF MADEIRA

(By Associated Press) BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 7.—Former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary and wife, last reported to be at Galatz, Rumania, awaiting the British light cruiser Cardiff to carry them to exile on the island of Madeira, are believed to have passed out of the Danube into the Black sea on their way to the Bosphorus today. The national assembly of Hungary, at a special session yesterday, enacted into law a bill de-throning Charles and ousting the entire Hapsburg dynasty.

#### NEGRO KILLED BY MISTAKE OF U. S. OFFICER

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7.—The killing of a negro prisoner in Haiti through mistaken orders to the marine corps captain was related by P. L. Spear, of Promont, Nebraska, a former marine corps lieutenant, to the senate committee investigating American occupation of the island.

Spear testified that Captain Thomas L. Edwards, who later was killed in an airplane accident, gave orders for the execution by a marine private. The witness said he did not know how the mistake occurred. Captain Edwards, he said, obtained orders from the marine corps major in charge of the native gendarmes.

#### FAT ARBUCKLE TRIAL STARTS NOVEMBER 14

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 7.—The trial of Fatty Arbuckle for manslaughter growing out of the death of Virginia Rappe was continued until November 14 by consent of both sides.

Arbuckle was in court, accompanied by his wife. There was no crowd present, but the Women's Vigilant Committee had representatives on hand as in the preliminary hearing of the Arbuckle case. Gavin McNab, Arbuckle's chief counsel, appeared in court for the first time in the case.

#### SECRET PRISON MAINTAINED BY SINN FEINERS

(By Associated Press) BELFAST, Nov. 7.—After raiding a place in Kent street last night the police reported they had discovered a prison maintained by the Republicans. A young man found confined in the place, they said, had been condemned to execution today. Three armed guards were arrested.

#### MRS. SOUTHARD SENTENCED TEN YEARS TO LIFE

(By Associated Press) TWIN FALLS, Idaho, Nov. 7.—Mrs. Lydia Southard was sentenced to the Idaho penitentiary for from 10 years to the remainder of her life. She was found guilty Friday of the murder of her fourth husband, Edward F. Meyer. She received sentence mainly. Notice of appeal was given.

#### SOUTHERN OIL HAS TAKEN BIG ADVANCE

#### OVEN EXPLODES AND BAKER IS KILLED

#### WILL OBSERVE ARMISTICE DAY IN THIS TOWN

Exercises appropriate to the occasion will be held in Tonopah on Armistice day, Friday, November 11. #### ELEVEN MURDERS ARE CHARGED TO LANDRU VERSAILLES, FRANCE

#### PARDON GIVEN MEN CONVICTED GERMAN MURDER

(By Associated Press) LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Nov. 7.—Five former American soldiers, convicted in Coblenz by court-martial of the murder of Captain Gilbert Lancefield, of the British army, left the federal prison here, pardoned by the president. They were re-enlisted in the army and given honorable discharges and back pay from the time of their arrest in Germany.

#### ASSASSIN HASHIMOTO DENIES ANY ONE HELPED

(By Associated Press) TOKYO, Nov. 7.—Eigoro Hashimoto, assistant stationmaster at Osaka railway station, where Premier Hara was assassinated Friday night, has been arrested, charged with complicity in the crime. About 20 other employees at the station were released after being questioned. Ryudo Nakika, the assassin's father, the police say, that he had no accomplices.

#### DESTROYER IS ASHORE SOUTH ANGEL ISLAND

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 7.—The destroyer Wood went ashore in a fog today on the south side of Angel island in San Francisco bay. Navy officials said it was in no danger and probably will be floated at high tide.

#### 2 EXPLOSIONS WRECK KANSAS MINE PROPERTY

(By Associated Press) PITTSBURG, Kan., Nov. 7.—The small mine of the Burgess Coal company, a mile south of Mulberry, was completely wrecked by two explosions today. The mine had been operated several weeks despite the strike. Eight men, all miners, comprise the company, and they did all the work at the mine.

(By Associated Press) VERSAILLES, France, Nov. 7.—Court officials gathered here today for the trial of Henri Desire Landru, the "Bluebeard of Gambais," who is charged with 11 murders. Ten of his alleged victims were women, and the eleventh was the son of one of them.

The trial of Landru, who has become known throughout France as "The Bluebeard of Gambais," bids fair to rank among the celebrated criminal cases of France. Landru was arrested in April, 1919, and has spent his time for the past two and a half years in answering or evading questions of the police, the investigating magistrates, and other court officials as to the fate of his fiancée. He has proved a most stubborn as well as a very clever prisoner and the police admit that their case against him is not as strong as they should like it to be. The so-called Bluebeard rented a small villa at Gambais, a few miles from Paris, and it is there that the police charge he did away with the 11 women, all trace of whom has been absolutely lost. It is alleged that he disguised his various marital papers and other documents from the letters received from women with a life property and no near relatives.

A short carnival would follow, then a journey to the Gambais villa in the company of the fiancée. The newspaper says that Landru always returned alone. The police claim to have proof that women were seen to enter the villa but none was heard of afterward. A few weeks later, whenever funds, stocks, furniture and jewelry the women possessed would be lost.
