**TONOPAH DIVIDE SHAFT LOWERED 12.5 FT. IN WEEK**

Shaft sinking at the Tonopah Divide mine progressed steadily for the week ending Wednesday, November 2. Development work was carried forward throughout the mine workings and the usual production of approximately 50 tons daily was sent to the Belmont mill in Tonopah. Shaft sinking will be continued until the water level is reached, and then development on a much broader scale will be inaugurated. The report of Superintendent William Watters for the week follows:  
 "Drift 201 was advanced 28.6 feet. Drift 207 1/2 was carried forward 14.5 feet. North crosscut S25 was advanced 10.5 feet. South crosscut S25 was advanced 11 feet. South crosscut S27 was advanced 3.5 feet. Raise 111 was driven 7 feet. Raise 113 was driven 7 feet. Raise 315 1/2 was driven 21 feet. The shaft was lowered 12.5 feet. Total advance, 115.6 feet."

**ISSUES REPORT ON OPERATIONS AT THE MIDWAY**

Superintendent W. J. Douglass of the Tonopah Midway Consolidated Mining company has issued the following statement to stockholders of the company covering operations on that property since January 1 of this year.  
 His report follows:  
 I beg to submit the following report of the operations of your property since January first of this year.  
 The work performed during the year has been practically confined to crosscuts have been run both northward and southward. The south crosscut was run a distance of 650 feet. At a distance of 100 feet south from the shaft, a gouge or vein matter was cut showing a width of about 10 feet and giving up small values. At a distance of 400 feet further south, a number of small quartz stringers were cut.  
 The north crosscut was run a distance of 740 feet from the shaft. At a point in this crosscut 450 feet north from the shaft, a quartz vein seven feet wide was cut, showing values assaying from \$2.00 to \$7.00 per ton. Up to the present time there has been no drifting done on this vein. At a point in the crosscut about 100 feet north from this vein, another vein was cut showing a width of from 25 to 30 feet. This is a large, strong vein, all of which is quartz with a trachyte footwall and Extension breccia hanging-wall. This quartz is of a very lively nature and assays from \$2 to \$10 per ton with small spots showing high values. It is my intention to start drifting on this vein right away, as I have every reason to believe good commercial orebodies will be encountered. Several smaller veins, ranging from one to five feet, have been cut north of this vein.  
 The property was closed down for four months during the year on account of a walkout of all classes of mine labor in Tonopah.

**GREEN TABLE OF CONFERENCE BY NAVY DEPT.**

(By Associated Press)  
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7.—The "green table" at which the representatives of the nations participating in the forthcoming conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern and Pacific questions will sit during their deliberations will be especially made and furnished by the navy department.  
 The table which is destined to become historic is not of mahogany but of light wood finished in mahogany. It is constructed in sections and is portable making possible its transfer in case some of the full sessions of the conference are held in other than Continental hall.  
 When assembled it forms a hollow rectangle with the fourth side open and measures on the two long sides 40 feet, and across the third 28 feet, giving a total perimeter of 108 feet—ample room for seating at least 30 persons. The table will, in accordance with custom, be covered with green baize.

**GOLD HOLDINGS IN AMERICA AT HIGH PRESSURE**

(By Associated Press)  
 NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Gold holdings of the United States, the world's sole creditor nation, mounted to a new high record last month, approximating the stupendous sum of \$3,500,000,000. Statisticians estimate this to be 35 to 40 per cent of the world's visible supply.  
 Of this amount the 12 federal reserve banks hold a total of about \$930,000,000, the bulk of which reposes in the vaults of the local institution. Metal which has been pouring into this country ever since the close of the war has averaged \$75,000,000 monthly this year.  
 Some of the gold bears the stamp of nations born after the European cataclysm and some of the minted metal is almost as rare and strange to the average observer as an old-time Spanish doubloon.  
 Part of the gold sent here by Germany to meet reparations payments to the allies was said to be French coin extracted by Germany from France as indemnity after the Franco-Prussian war in 1870.  
 The amount of gold bars now held by the local assay office is not disclosed, but the machinery of that institution has been taxed to capacity recently reducing foreign bullion to requisite fineness for the domestic market. Bars valued at many millions of dollars have been shipped from this city to the Philadelphia mint in the last few months to be made into coin.
