Japanese Insist on Equal Strength With Others in the Air

WITH REDUCTION OF NAVY DEMANDS WILL BE MADE FOR PLANES

(By Associated Press)
TOKIO, Jan. 14.—The heads of the Japanese navy, faced by the decision of the arms conference to cut Japan's naval strength in accordance with the 5-5-3 ratio, plan a great air force of 156 planes, six balloons and four airships. In the words of Captain K. Takahashi, director of the aerial bureau of the naval office, Japan "will insist on at least the same aerial strength as England or America."

Takahashi said that "when plans now in hand are completed Japan will occupy fifth place among the powers. However, we are contemplating the construction of three or four more airplane carriers. Our geographical position necessitates an increase in our aerial strength which we will insist on keeping at least equal to that of England or America."

WEST END CON. MAINTAINING A HIGH AVERAGE

Excellent conditions prevail about the mine and mill property of the West End Consolidated Mining company, and the tonnage and grade of ore mined from all sections of the big mine remain at normal. Both shafts of the property are raising a large quantity of ore, all of which is maintaining the usual average values, there being a total of 1700 tons raised during the weekly period ending January 14.

The full face of ore that was encountered last week in drift 642 No. 1 from the Ohio shaft, still continues with the same large production that was reported before.

The first days of next week will see the regular mill start-up made for the first half of January, and it is reasonable to expect the same large figures for mill production as was the result during October.

The official report of company operations for the week ending January 14, as today reported by the management, follows:

West End Shaft.

From the West End shaft, drift 412A has made the usual headway without change to report. Intermediate drift 404A made good progress with no change. Drift 530 No. 2 made fair progress on 2 feet of vein material. Raise 670D made a connection with the 500 level and will be used for filling purposes. Intermediate drift 683 made good progress on ore of fair grade. On the 960 level, drift 969 has been started.

Ohio Shaft.

From the Ohio shaft drift 549 made a connection and has been discontinued. Drift 535 No. 1 made the usual advance with no change to report. Drift 577 No. 1 made small footage without change. Drift 642 No. 3 made the usual progress on a full face of low-grade quartz. On the 800 level the regular progress was made in 865 raise, 870 raise and 862 crosscut. A new intermediate drift, 848 drift No. 1, has been started on ore. On the 1100 level, 1106 raise made the usual progress with no change. Regular development work was performed in "76" ground.

SETTLEMENT OF QUESTION PARTLY MADE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—The Japanese, through the arms conference delegation, have agreed to transfer to China administration of the leased territory of Kiao Chow in Shantung province.

The agreement becomes effective when a complete settlement is reached on the entire Shantung controversy now before the Chinese and Japanese delegates. Japan also has agreed to hand over to the Chinese government all documents necessary for the administration of the leased hold when the transfer is effected.

TURK LEADER IS MURDERED BY OPPONENTS

RESIGNATION OF WILL HAYS IS ACCEPTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.—Announcement that Postmaster General Will Hays will shortly retire from the cabinet was made at the White House today. After a 40-minute conference with the postmaster general, President Harding said he could not well interpose any objection to Hays' retirement to become head of a national association of motion picture producers and distributors.

NOT THROUGH WITH CRIMES OF GERMANS

PARIS, Jan. 14.—Surrender of the Germans charged with offenses in connection with the war to the allies for trial is recommended in two resolutions adopted by the inter-allied commission on war crimes.

KLONDYKE NOW SHOWING MUCH REAL ACTIVITY

The original Klondyke mine in the district bearing that name is receiving attention at the hands of lessees and occasional shipments of fair grade ore are being sent out. Fred Laguna, who bears the reputation of being an excellent chlorider, is now bringing in a shipment that is expected to mill close to \$100 a ton, the product being delivered at the MacNamara mill. Work "is being prosecuted at a depth of 50 feet and drifting is in progress on a body of solid ore that has a width of 2 feet.

William Maupin is another leasor who is realizing substantial returns from operating under the tribute system, and shipments have been in order for a long time past. He is drifting from the bottom of a 50-foot shaft and is following a fine looking vein of ore that brings a mill settlement averaging around \$50 a ton.

EARLIER DISTRIBUTION MAIL IS NOW ASSURED

Advice received from Washington is to the effect that Postmaster J. J. McQuillan has been instructed to make earlier distribution of the daily mail and secure additional help if necessary. Complaint has been made that the mail arrived at 7 o'clock in the morning, but that distribution was not completed to the boxes before 11 o'clock. Now that the holiday rush is over the citizens may expect better service.

PRINCE WAS NOT HARMED IN DISORDER

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Dispatches to the morning papers from their correspondents in India agree that the prince of Wales was in no wise menaced personally at the time of the disturbance in connection with his arrival at Madras. The prince rode along a three mile route, watched by crowds described as friendly and even enthusiastic. It was after the prince's arrival at the government house, however, that what appears to have been the worst outbreak occurred. A mob from Triplicane, which is mainly a Mohammedan quarter, rushed the statue of Lord Ripon, the former viceroy, and an ornamental pagoda decorated with British flags, portraits of the prince and palms. All the decorations were seized, scattered and trampled in the dust.

TROOP SHIP MAKES PORT IN SAFETY

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The United States transport Crook, which was in serious difficulties at sea Wednesday when she sent out a wireless call for aid, arrived in New York harbor today, accompanied by her transport, St. Michel.

One thousand doughboys returning from Germany on the transport learned today for the first time that their ship had sprung a leak last Tuesday and had been in danger during the great gales that swept the north Atlantic. "Not a crumple was stopped," was the smiling comment of Captain Frank Regis as the Crook was being washed to the pier.

ALMOST SIX FEET A DAY BEING MADE

Work on the deep shaft of the Tonopah Divide mine is progressing favorably that the record for the past week shows almost 6 feet of depth being attained each day, according to the weekly report of operations from the management of the Tonopah Divide Mining company.

Regular shipments are being sent to the mill at the rate of 50 tons each week, and for the seven-day period ending January 11, a total of 133.6 feet of development work was consummated. All work that is being accomplished is being maintained at the usual high average of excellence displayed by this well-known company, and the half month almost completed finds the physical condition of the property to be above the average.

REFUSES TO ACCEPT JOB IN CABINET

PARIS, Jan. 14.—M. Poincare, in a task of forming a French cabinet to succeed the Briand ministry, asked former Premier Rene Viviani to accept the post of minister of justice with the vice-presidency of the cabinet, but Viviani has refused the portfolio. It was officially announced today.

MANY KINDS OF DEPOSITS DISCOVERED

RIGA, Latvia, Jan. 14.—Some hitherto unknown minerals have been discovered in the interior mountains of the Kola peninsula, which juts out into the Arctic ocean and White sea north of Archangel and Murmansk, says a radio dispatch from Moscow, sent out by the official soviet Russian press bureau. Altogether more than 200 different kinds of metal deposits were found.

The discoveries were made by an expedition composed of Petrograd scientists. The region is seldom visited by outsiders. The natives are of the Eskimo or Lapland type.

MONTANA OPERATORS SHIPPING REGULARLY

Lessees on the Montana mine continue the usual tonnage of ore of a commercial grade, most of the product being consigned to the Desert mill of the Tonopah Mining company at Millers. About 50 men are at work on this well-known producer and value of the ore mined averages around \$25 a ton. It was reported unofficially today that lessees on the 300 level had encountered an 18-inch streak of ore that shows average values of \$126 a ton, while picked specimens will go around 1000 ounces. However, the full face of the drift will be broken down in order to keep the values under \$50 a ton.

BELMONT MAKES A FINE SHOWING FOR PAST WEEK
