HIGH GRADE IS SHIPPED FROM GOLDEN EAGLE

The second shipment of ore from the Betts lease on the Golden Eagle claim of the Hudson Mining company at Royston was started Sunday for the smelter of the U. S. Smelting & Refining company at Salt Lake City. Delivery of the product from the mine to the railroad siding at Millers was completed Saturday, and the following day the car was picked up by the north-bound passenger train. The shipment consists of about 50 tons, and while assays show values of over \$400 a ton, it is expected that a net settlement of close to \$25,000 for the car will result, which will allow for a considerable deduction over values previously reported.

RENO NEVADA

SPLENDID ORE NOW SHOWING ON CHICO CLAIM

News of an important mineral discovery on the Chico claim at Royston reached Tonopah yesterday. The find was made at a depth of 30 feet with 16 inches of splendid-looking ore being in evidence. While no assays have been reported, the product is unquestionably of a commercial grade, and in the event the ore is found to be persistent to any great depth, then a substantial production will follow in due course of events.

The ground in question is operated under lease by E. A. Hafferman and L. Cohen, both of Tonopah, with the former being in charge of operations. Almost from the inception of development small feeders of high-grade ore were in evidence, and the uncovering of a 16-inch vein has greatly encouraged the lessors. The Chico claim is owned by the Hudson Mining company, and the present lessors have been granted 500 feet on the ground. If the present showing continues it is proposed to open another shift of miners and a test shipment will be made at an early date.

Operations at the Golden State property in the Klondyke district are progressing in a favorable manner and a substantial production of excellent grade ore is being made. Development is going forward on the 100-foot level, the shipments aggregating around 100 tons a month, with the product being delivered at the Belmont mill for treatment. The Klondyke section is fast gaining in popularity and there is a great deal of activity manifest. Own-ers of property have been prosecuting operations in a quiet way for a long time past, and the shipments that have been made from the original Klondyke mine have a tendency to stimulate matters in no small way. It is freely predicted that the coming summer will witness this old section receiving much attention.

MIZPAH GRILL WILL REOPEN WEDNESDAY
