## GHOSTS HAUNT BALTIC COAST OF LATE WAR

(By Associated Press) STOCKHOLM, Feb. 16.—Ghosts of the great war still haunt the Baltic, scaring veteran skippers, sailors, fishermen and steamship passengers alike.

Hardly a week passes without reports along the Swedish coast of drifting old mines and derelict submarines, both a serious danger to all navigation. The mines are principally of Russian and German origin, and after breaking loose from their moorings they have drifted toward the east coast of Sweden. Many of them have been washed ashore on Gotland island which lies almost in the center of the Baltic.

The derelict U-boats haunt the western waters. Ever since the arduous Baltic storms have washed up mines upon the coast and dwellers along the shore have long since become accustomed to the terrific detonations of exploding mines hurled against cliffs during heavy gales. Energetic efforts have been made to sweep up these dangerous relics of the war, but it will probably be years before either the North sea or the Baltic is free of them.

It is not at all uncommon for fishermen to catch mines in their nets. They are regarded as lucky catches, although they have to be handled gingerly, for the government pays handsomely for the removal or destruction of the mines, if satisfactory proof of their discovery or destruction can be furnished.

The U-boat derelicts are said to have been discarded English vessels, lost while being towed from English ports to Copenhagen. The menace to navigation from these two sources is such that passenger and merchant vessels have to change their schedules in the Baltic and traverse the danger zones only by daylight.

## INDIAN BASKETBALL PLAYERS ARE COMING

Lovers of basketball are to be given a real treat tomorrow night when a team from the Stewart Indian school will contest for honors with the team of the Tonopah high. ### Measuring Sludge.

An ingenious method of measuring the depth of sludge in deep sedimentation tanks is employed at the sewage disposal works of Pittsburg, Mass., says a Canadian writer. The measurements are made by means of a pitcher pump and 28 feet of 1-inch rubber hose, marked in 1-foot lengths. The pump is screwed to a 3-foot plank and attached to the hose by a union coupling. In making measurements the plank is placed across the top of a gas vent and the hose pushed into the tank until it is near the supposed sludge level. The hose is then lowered an inch at a time. Between each shift sufficient pumping is done to insure a complete change of water in hose. When the sludge level is reached, the pump will raise sludge. The length of the hose below the chimney top is then noted, and as the distance from top of chimney to bottom of tank is known it is an easy matter to estimate the depth of the sludge.

### Mexicans Wary of Snow.

It is possible on almost any day in the year to see snowbanks from Mexico City, yet few of the natives there had ever touched snow until one day last winter, when there was quite a perceptible fall, the first in many years in the Valley of Mexico.

The mountain peaks of Popocatepetl and Iztaccihuatl, clearly visible from the capital, are always snowcapped, but they are some sixty miles away.

Barfooted or lightly shod natives stepped gingerly into the strange element, and afterward spent most of the day huddled in their homes or in sheltering nooks and corners. The snow flurry was due to a sudden drop in temperature during a light rain.

## "What's in a Name?"

### DORIS.

THOUGH etymologists do not directly connect Doris with Dorothy, and some believe that she is merely a modern version of a feminine fancy for a name a trifle out of the ordinary, it is impossible to believe that her source was not identical with Dorothea, and that strange but correct reversal Theodora.

Such being the case, Doris comes from one of the early Christian Greek names, notably Thekla. St. Thekla was said to have been a disciple of St. Paul and to have been exposed to lions at Antioch. Instead of tearing her to pieces, they crouched at her feet, but nevertheless she was considered the first virgin martyr, and no higher praise is possible for a woman than to compare her to St. Thekla.

From Thekla came the French Tecla and then through the Eastern church, Theodora, signifying "divine gift," and, much later, the incorrect Dorothea.

There have been two St. Theodoras, one a virgin martyr and the other a Greek empress.

Massinger composed a drama dealing with the story of St. Dorothea, the Cappadocian maiden who sent the roses of paradise by angelic hands as testimony of the joys of heaven. It is needless to go into the growth of Dorothea, followed by Dorothy, Dolly, Doris, and Dorinda. Her contractions, elaborations and diminutives are legion, but unfortunately history does not record what first enterprising mother named her baby Doris, though the name is almost as popular as Dorothy in England and America. Even Germany uses it. Franco alone finds it too harsh for her tongue and prefers the softer Dorotte and Doralice.

The talismanic stone assigned to Doris is the agate, which gives her courage, guards her from danger and is also said to be a cure for insanity if worn as a pendant around the throat. Friday is Doris' lucky day and 5 her lucky number. (Copyright.)

## SPREAD FEVER TO BE CHECKED RUSSIAN CITY

Polish medical authorities are somewhat apprehensive over the spread of typhus but feel confident that the epidemic will not reach the proportions of 1919 when there were 129,000 cases in the first few months with a mortality of 10 per cent.

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# IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States

## OUR CHARGE \$9.00

SECTION 1.—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.

SECTION 2.—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.

SECTION 4.—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney general.

The TONOPAH DAILY BONANZA will make publication required by law, which includes the filing of a sworn affidavit of publication with the assessor of each of the counties of the State, within which the company is doing business; an affidavit of publication will also be furnished secretaries.
