

RECORDING OF AIR PRESSURE NEW INVENTION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—A new manometer or instrument for recording air pressure on wing and tail surfaces of airplanes at different points simultaneously has been designed by F. H. Norton, an engineer of the Langley Memorial laboratory at Langley field, Virginia, it was announced today by the national advisory committee for aeronautics. The first experiments were undertaken by the laboratory of the navy department in order to determine the distribution of pressure over the horizontal tail surfaces of an airplane and to analyze the relation of this pressure to structural loads and longitudinal stability and were conducted on full-sized planes in the air and on models in the wind control. The old method consisted in using a horizontal tail surface inside of which rubber tubes connected with a series of holes on the surface which led to a multiple liquid manometer.

STREETS WHITE MILLS ARE SAFE FOR PEDESTRIAN

FRANKFORT, Ky., Feb. 22.—Now that the Kentucky general assembly has made the streets of White Mills, Harlan county, safe for pedestrians by passing a bill which says who ever goes on the streets of an incorporated village with no police protection, clad only in a bathing suit, is subject to a fine, its attention has been called to other public matters. Among the recent bills introduced in the senate is one to require moonshiners to attach whistles that can be heard two miles to their stills, and to blow them every 30 minutes from 1 a. m. until 11 p. m.

Recently-clad summer boarders are given as the reason for the passage of the anti-bathing suit bill. The principal industry of White Mills is entertaining summer guests. Its main asset is a small river and swimming is its great outdoor sport. But the bath house facilities consist of willow trees under whose drooping branches one may perch the bathrobe. These facilities, however, have failed to appeal to the visitors, which include a gaudy number of young women. Representative C. A. Nelson noticed this and he told the legislature that the youth of his village home is being corrupted by the sight of women clad in bathing suits strolling down the streets to the river.

HAWAII LIMITS PLANE PILOTS U. S. CITIZENS

HONOLULU, Feb. 22.—Only citizens of the United States are permitted to pilot or fly in an airplane over the territory of Hawaii, according to the aviation regulations prepared by Attorney General Harry Truman and incorporated in the territorial aviation licenses, the first of which was issued today. No pictures or sketches may be made while in the air, carrying of passengers is limited to the hours between sunrise and sundown and no private plane may fly above any fortification, military or naval establishment in the islands. The regulations also limit pilots to persons honorably discharged from the army or navy flying corps, members of the signal or reserve corps and those who have unrevoked licenses issued by the state.

NEW TAXICABS MAKING TRIPS TO THE MARNE

PARIS, Feb. 22.—The veterans of the Marne, those ranshaekie, broken-down taxicabs which every American visitor to Paris has had to dodge on the Paris boulevards, have been permanently retired and replaced by 3290 modern comfortable taxicabs.

The forbidding appearance of the old "cruisers" seemed to have an ill effect on the drivers and hope is expressed by many Parisians that the new machines would also mark the passing of the disreputable chauffeurs who are considered as ill-mannered as their machines are old. The taxicabs were placed in service in 1905. In 1914 they were mobilized by General Gallieni, then military governor of Paris, who crowded his army into them and rushed them to the battle of the Marne where they aided in the success of the famous tanking movement that saved Paris and defeated the Germans.

These hardy pioneers of the streets have been dashing about Paris for 17 years.

GANDHI ACTIVE IN AFFAIRS OF INDEPENDENCE

AHMEDABAD, India, Feb. 22.—Mahatma K. Gandhi has become a more dominating figure than ever in the Indian independence movement in consequence of the action taken in the annual session of the Indian national congress recently held here. Not only did the congress appoint Gandhi as its sole executive authority, as cabled at that time, but it authorized him to appoint his successor in event of any emergency.

This action was taken when the congress voted to suspend all other activities in order to concentrate attention upon civil disobedience. The congress not only stipulated, however, that Gandhi should not be authorized to conclude terms of peace with the British or Indian governments without previous consent of the All-India congress committee, but it also declared that the present creed of the congress was in no case to be altered by either Gandhi or his successors without first having obtained permission from the Indian congress.

GIVE SOLDIERS HONEST DEALS, SAYS M'NIDER

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—Hauford Mac Nider, national commander of the American Legion, in an address before the Union League club here today, said the immediate problems before the country and the American Legion were those of seeing that the men who came back from the war maimed and broken in health "got a square deal" and to see those who served be not "penalized economically for offering their lives to their country in the dangerous days."

BANDITS HOLD UP STREET CAR IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 22.—Two passengers sat in a street car on a local line here, waiting for the motorman and conductor to start their first inbound trip. Suddenly the passengers donned masks, drew revolvers, and held up the carmen, then quietly removed the masks, pocketed their revolvers and ordered the street car men to start the car toward town. They crew obeyed, they reported, and the two robbers were last seen strolling unconcernedly away. They got \$25.

NEW TRAINING FOR FOOTBALL DECIDED UPON

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Feb. 22.—A new system of football coaching which includes boxing, wrestling and fencing as methods of making all-America stars out of men who previously played the game, is partly responsible for placing Notre Dame university's gridiron eleven among the country's leaders for several years. This system and a scholastic arrangement which brings some of the students through a course of outdoor activities almost from the kindergarten to the athletic field are looked upon as the secrets of Notre Dame's athletic supremacy, testified to by a football record which includes only one game lost in three years—to Iowa, 19 to 7, last fall, and consistent triumphs over eastern teams.

Krute Rokine, the football coach, attributed his success to the "never say die" spirit of his athletes. The school authorities, however, give Mr. Rokine's unique coaching system most of the credit.

BELMONT SHIPS BULLION VALUE OF \$102,660

Heavy production continues in order at the Tonopah Belmont Development company's property, and regardless of the recent stormy weather the output is kept at a high standard. This was evidenced as a result of a shipment of bullion that was sent out this morning, the consignment consisting of 45 bars weighing 87,000 ounces and having an estimated value of \$102,660.

The output of bullion promises to be even heavier in the near future in view of the fact that the milling charges have been reduced substantially to go into effect on March 1.

MEXICO HAS NUMEROUS OIL WELL PRODUCERS

IMPORTANT NOTICE

To Secretaries of Corporations Doing Business in Nevada But Incorporated in Other States

OUR CHARGE \$9.00

SECTION 1.—All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper for a period of four weeks.
SECTION 2.—The secretary of the company publishing the statement shall file a copy with the assessor of each county of the State of Nevada, in which said company is doing business.
SECTION 4.—Any district attorney in the state is competent to sue to recover the penalty, or the attorney general. The first county suing through its district attorney shall secure the penalty, and if no suit is brought for the penalty by any district the State shall have the right to recover through its attorney-general.

The TONOPAH DAILY BONANZA will make publication required by law, which includes the filing of a sworn affidavit of publication with the assessor of each of the counties of the State, within which the company is doing business; an affidavit of publication will also be furnished secretaries.
