"BONANZA HIGHWAY" IS OFFICIALLY PROCLAIMED

Debate Starts in Senate Four-Power Pacific Peace Treaty

NO "ALLIANCE" OR OBLIGATION SAYS SEN. NEW

As a Close Personal Friend of President Harding, Speaker Represents His Views.

CRITICISM TO BE GENERAL

Indiana Senator Asserts Treaties Are Co-Operative and Not Drastic in Any Way.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—There is no "alliance" in the four-power Pacific treaty or any obligation to use force, Senator New, republican member of the senate foreign relations committee, declared today at the opening of the senate discussion of the treaty on behalf of the administration. Reply to criticism of the treaty, Senator New, a close personal friend of President Harding, declared the four-power treaty gave safeguards for peace to the United States and did not impair American sovereignty. He made detailed comparison of the treaty with the league of nations plan, and asserted the treaties were "co-operative" while the league was "drastic and compulsory," and required submission of questions to a council.

A resolution asking President Harding what effect ratification of the four-power Pacific treaty would have on Lansing-Ishih agreement between the United States and Japan, adopted by the senate.

APPROPRIATION CUT FOR AGRICULTURE

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—An appropriation of \$34,978,033 to meet the expenses of the agriculture department during the coming year, was recommended today in a bill reported by the house appropriations committee. The amount is \$3,710,028 less than the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year, and \$1,544,835 less than the budget estimates.

STEEL ORGANIZER DIES AT PASADENA

PASADENA, Mar. 6.—Col. John Lambert, one of the pioneer organizers of the steel industry in the United States, millionaire and prominent in republican politics, died at his winter home here today following ten days' illness, which developed into pneumonia.

FIFTY MARK REACHED BROKERAGE FAILURES

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Mar. 6.—The list of stock brokerage house casualties touched the 50 mark today when involuntary bankruptcy petitions were filed in the federal court against Eatin & Wall and I. B. Mullins & Co.

Los Angeles Home Many Automobiles

(By Associated Press) SACRAMENTO, Cal., Mar. 6.—Los Angeles county led all other California counties in the number of motor vehicles within its boundaries, during the year ending January 31, 1922, according to the motor vehicle division of the state government here. The big southern county, the division's report shows, had 211,673 automobiles, 11,442 trucks, 6,846 motorcycles and 1,222 trailers.

WILL EXPLOIT SERIES VEINS ON CRESCENT

Operations On This Property to Be Resumed Sometime Before the First of April.

Sometime before the first of the coming month development will be inaugurated upon the holdings of the MacNamara Crescent Development company, a reorganization of what was previously known as the MacNamara Crescent Mining company. Plans for the campaign of development, which will be carried forward without interruption for an indefinite period, have been worked out by Jos. T. Joseph, mining expert in the MacNamara Crescent, as well as the MacNamara Mining and Milling company. The plan calls for the drilling of a crosscut to the northeast from the 1,200-foot level of the shaft workings for a distance of 700 feet. Work will start at the bottom of the shaft, the previous crosscut having been to the southwest with 2,623 feet of development being performed.

The driving of the northeast crosscut is of vital importance to the Tonopah district, taken as a whole. It will bring the heading out under a Vahapad area of mineralized country, and if ore in commercial quantities should be encountered, then Tonopah will be in line for a second mining boom, the equal of which was never before experienced in any mining district.

With the 700 feet of crosscutting completed, it is stated by Mr. Joseph that a diamond drill will be brought into use in exploring the country, providing, of course, pay ore is not encountered in driving the crosscut. Should ore be uncovered then the persistency and richness of the prospects of that immediate section will result in owners of properties falling in line with proceeding with exploration of their mineral holdings.

LYOYD GEORGE LIKELY TENDER RESIGNATION

Announcement Will Be Made by English Premier Within Next 48 Hours.

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Mar. 6.—Within 24 or at most 48 hours, the world will know definitely whether Lloyd George has decided to resign his office as chief of the coalition government. This is the only substantial conviction emerging from the tangle of contradictory rumors in the crisis which has engrossed political observers over Saturday and Sunday.

GAS RATE IN NEW YORK CONFISCATORY

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—The statutory 80 cents gas rate in New York City for 1918 and 1919 was declared confiscatory by the supreme court today in a decision in the New York gas cases.

SMALL'S TRIAL IS CALLED AT WAUKEGAN, ILL.

Governor of Illinois to Face a Jury on Conspiracy Charge Obtaining Money

THE DEFENDANT IS CONFIDENT

Alleged Crime Committed While Executive Was Serving as State Treasurer.

(By Associated Press) WAUKEGAN, Ill., Mar. 6.—Governor Small's trial on charges of conspiracy to embezzle state funds, was delayed again while Judge Edwards heard a divorce case, impounded a grand jury and called the docket for the March term of court. Fifty prospective jurors were on hand for examination late in the day, and another 50 were ready to appear tomorrow.

(By Associated Press) SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Mar. 6.—The basis for the charges against Governor Len Small, Lieut. Governor Fred E. Sterling and Vernon Curtis, Grant Park, Ill., banker, was explained in the report of D. A. Brain, foreman of the Sangamon county grand jury, which returned the indictment as follows:

"From the evidence submitted it appears that the treasurer of the state of Illinois carries large daily balances and that during the administration of Fred E. Sterling these balances have ranged from \$22,000,000 to \$32,000,000. During the administration of Len Small and Fred E. Sterling as treasurers of the state of Illinois, the law then in force in this state required the state treasurer to deposit all moneys received by him on account of the state in such banks as he may have paid the highest interest rate. We find that both the letter and spirit of the law was violated in all secure banks of the state, without discrimination, and to such of them as paid the highest interest rate, only a portion of that money was loaned in accordance with the provisions of the law. For the purpose of circumventing those provisions an ingenious scheme was devised and closely adhered to."

BANKER SENTENCED LONG PRISON TERM

(By Associated Press) OMAHA, Neb., Mar. 6.—W. V. Mathews, formerly president of the defunct Pioneer State Bank of Omaha, was today sentenced to from one to ten years in state prison by District Judge Leslie, before whom he recently pleaded guilty to the charge of embezzling \$200,000 of the bank's funds.

MYSTERY FOLLOWS CHINESE TONG WAR

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Mar. 6.—Mystery followed in the wake of the fatal shooting here last night of one Chinese, and the wounding of two, one probably fatally, in the basement rendezvous of Wing Hong Lung, in Chinatown. Joe Wing, said to be from Seattle or San Francisco, did the shooting, according to the police. He was arrested. Wing is an Leong Tong man.

BURCH REFUSES TO TESTIFY IN TRIAL

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Mar. 6.—Arthur C. Burch, jointly indicted with Madayne Obenchain on the charge of murdering J. Belton Kennedy, was called to the witness stand as a surprise witness by the district attorney in the trial of Mrs. Obenchain. He refused to answer questions until granted counsel.

DEATH IS BECKONING FOR HAMILTON REID

The condition of Hamilton Reid was reported as being extremely grave this afternoon at 3:30 and his demise is momentarily expected. Mr. Reid developed spinal meningitis as a result of poison from his injured leg penetrating his system, and at this writing was in an unconscious condition.

Mr. Reid is suffering from injuries he received on the night of February 26, when he fell down the Argonne shaft in the Divide district while in search of the road that had been lost while traveling by auto from Goldfield to Tonopah.

NEW JERSEY IS WET STATE AND NARY ASHAMED

Senator Edge Submits Petition Asking for Modification of Volstead Measure.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—Senator Edge, of New Jersey, submitted to the senate today a petition which he said carried the names of 10,000 citizens in that state asking for a modification of the Volstead act to permit of the sale of light wines and beer.

POPULAR GIRL STUDENT HIGH SCHOOL DIES

Fellow Students Grieve Over Death Miss Garnet Lorene Brown Sunday Morning.

Students and pupils of the high and graded schools of Tonopah are bowed in grief today and the flag is flying at half mast over the high school building as a result of the death of Miss Garnet Lorene Brown, member of the Junior class and one of the most popular young ladies in Tonopah. The death of this charming and accomplished young lady, the loving daughter of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel A. Brown, occurred yesterday morning at 9 o'clock at the family home on Belmont avenue, following an illness of five weeks, lacking one day, in which she battled bravely against the ravages of pneumonia. Her long illness and her weakened constitution failed to respond to the most skilled medical treatment, and the patient passed unto the Great Beyond, surrounded by her mother and father and two sisters.

Garnet Lorene Brown was born at Salt Lake City, June 30, 1904, where her parents had resided for 46 years, and was just blossoming into womanhood. Although having been a resident of Tonopah since August 13, when the mother and daughters arrived to join the father who is employed at the Tonopah Belmont mine, she had ingratiated herself into the friendship of her schoolmates, and all others of her acquaintance, and by her sweet womanly ways had endeared herself to a multitude of friends and acquaintances. Upon the beginning of the fall term of school Miss Brown enrolled herself as a junior in the high school, but had she remained in Salt Lake she would have been graduated from the West Side high school of that city with the class of 1922.

Deceased is survived by her father and mother and two sisters, Blanche Averil and Ruth Helen Brown. The body is at the family home and can be viewed by friends this evening.

The funeral services over the remains of the departed will be held from the Episcopal church tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, the Rev. G. G. Holsboelt officiating, of which denomination Miss Brown was a worshiper.

PRIEST SEIZED BY TEXANS AND BEATEN-TARRED

Victim Claims Incident Was Due to Pro-German Accusations Against Him During War

REGISTERED AS A GERMAN

This Action Was Taken, He Says, Following Being Denied U. S. Citizenship.

AMARILLO, Tex., Mar. 6.—J. G. Keller, Catholic priest at Sharon, who was seized by masked men there Saturday night, beaten and tarred and feathered, authorized the statement here today that the incident was a climax to sentiment the pro-German accusations against him during the world war. He said he was denied final citizenship papers in the federal court here in June, 1920, on the ground he had registered as a German subject after taking out his first naturalization papers.

WHISKY TRUST IS ORGANIZED CONTROL PRICE

Defies Law Prohibiting Combinations in Restraint of Trade—Fixes Prices.

(By Associated Press) SPOKANE, Mar. 6.—Defying the laws prohibiting combinations in restraint of trade, bootleggers of Spokane have effected an organization to boost the price of liquor, it became known today on authority of a police statement. At a meeting last night a price of 88 to 90 a quart for Scotch and gin, with a special bargain in rate of three quarts for \$25, was agreed upon, it was stated.

American whisky and fancy liquors, it was explained, would come higher.

SMOOT AND BURTON MAY NOT BE ELIGIBLE

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—A conflict of opinion over the eligibility of Senator Smoot and Representative Burton to serve on the allied debt commission, caused the senate judiciary committee to defer final decision on recommendations until Thursday. A majority of the sub-committee, which has been studying the question, submitted a report that Smoot and Burton are not eligible.

GUARDSMEN PROTECT HOPE COMPANY MILL

(By Associated Press) PROVIDENCE, R. I., Mar. 6.—Heavy forces of the national guard cavalry and coast artillerymen guarded the Hope company's mill at Hope today in expectation that the strikers would carry out their plans of last Saturday and attempt to picket the plant with strikers from other mills in the Pawtucket Valley against orders of the authorities.

County Commissioners Hold Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the board of county commissioners is being held today. Only matters of routine will come up for consideration, such as the auditing of accounts of the various officials and the allowing of the payroll for the month of February. As a result it is expected that the ghost will stalk around the court house late this afternoon and tomorrow.

Automobile Owners Pay Building Roads

(By Associated Press) SACRAMENTO, Cal., Mar. 6.—Receipts from motor vehicle fees in California for the year ending January 31, 1922, when will be available for highway work, total \$6,926,384.72, according to the motor vehicle department. The figures represent the net receipts, after expenses of the state department have been deducted, and will be divided equally between the counties of the state.

ORLEAN MINE NOW SHOWING BIG RESERVES

Ore Vein at Bottom of 74-Foot Winze From 700 Level is Sixteen Feet Wide.

Reports from the Orlean mine at Herndliver continue to indicate that the property is destined to take its place within the next few months among the heaviest producers in southern Nevada. New finds of ore are being made with frequency, and from work received officially today by this paper the showing in both the 500 and 700 levels in the south-east drifts, has made a wonderful improvement during the past few days.

Crosscutting at the bottom of the 74-foot winze sunk from the 700 level, has demonstrated the vein to be about 16 feet wide. The foot wall was penetrated on Friday and the entire vein matter is heavily mineralized, carrying commercial values, it handled in one class. Naturally milling facilities will have to be available in order to eliminate the heavy transportation charges, but this problem will undoubtedly be solved before the summer season has drawn to a close.

Hornsilver is unquestionably destined for a long season of great prosperity. The preliminary developments that have been prosecuted throughout the winter months on a number of properties have resulted in a number of important mineral discoveries and now that the persistency of the prospects has been proven to great depth, an incentive is given for the numerous owners of properties to get busy and proceed with the sinking of shafts. One of the best showings in the district outside of the Orlean property is to be found on the Rosetta holdings.

REVOLUTIONIST OF GERMANY TO GIVE SELF UP

Dr. Kapp Caused Temporary Overthrow Ebert Government Two Years Ago.

(By Associated Press) BERLIN, Mar. 6.—Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, who led a revolution in March, 1920, which resulted in a temporary overthrow of the Ebert government, has offered to surrender for trial with the understanding that he be given safe conduct and not be placed under arrest. The proposal has been forwarded to the supreme court at Leipzig from an unnamed poet in Sweden.

HIGHWAY IS NOW KNOWN AS BONANZA

Road From Reno, Carson and On to Tonopah and Goldfield Given New Name.

BONANZA GAVE SUGGESTION

Board of Directors of Highway Department of State Acts Favorably in Matter.

Another highway has been created in Nevada by the action of the board of directors of the department of highways, or rather an existing highway route has been dignified by a distinguishing name, says the Carson News.

At the Wednesday meeting a resolution was adopted wherein the board gave its official sanction to the movement started in the south to name the official route No. 3 the "Bonanza Highway." Thus the last highway in Nevada will be known henceforth by its new name.

The Bonanza Highway, according to the resolution, (that part) of route No. 3 starting at Reno, then passing through Carson City, Minden, Gardnerville, Wellington, Yerington, along the west shore of Walker Lake, and through Mina, Tonopah and Goldfield to the California state line near Bishop. The road has been signed by the Automobile Club of Southern California with the official markers of the club. The next move will be to adopt a distinctive sign for the route and place the signs on the poles already in place.

The Bonanza Highway is one of the most important roads in the state, as it passes through a rich mining and agricultural section and is the main artery for travel between the northern and southern sections of Nevada.

The highway is crossed at Carson City by the Pioneer-Trail unit of the Lincoln Highway leading to Lake Tahoe and northern California. The main route to Yosemite valley leaves the Bonanza Highway near Wellington while the road from Las Vegas joins the Bonanza Highway at Goldfield.

The value and importance of designating highways with a distinctive name has been recognized for a long time. The majority of tourists plan their tours over known highways, and well known highways are great assets to communities along their routes.

The action of the highway directors will be ratified by official and civil bodies on the route of the new highway, and in a short time it will be as well known as the great east and west highways across the state.
