## LOWER SECTION OF FORT WORTH IS INUNDATED

### United States Will Stand Pat Regarding Russian Privileges

#### NO SURRENDER WILL BE MADE IN ANY MANNER

Ambassador Child Says No Surrender Will Be Made in Any Particular Form

#### ALLIES AND RUSSIANS CONFER

Discuss Formula Concerning the Restoration of Foreign Property in Russia.

(By Associated Press) GENOA, May 9.—The principal European delegations here have been given unmistakable hints by American Ambassador Child that the United States maintains its consistent standpoint regarding any private or general arrangement for commercial and industrial privileges in Russia, and no such arrangements can be recognized by the United States, says Henry Wickham Steed, editor of the London Times.

(By Associated Press) GENOA, May 9.—English and Italian delegates to the economic conference met today with members of the Russian delegation and began working out a new formula concerning the restoration of foreign property in Russia. It was said through an announcement by the French delegation. The announcement said it was hoped to devise a new clause in the Russian memorandum which would satisfy Belgium and, therefore, France.

#### THREE ORPHANS MAY BE DENIED ENTRANCE HERE

Hail From South Africa and on Way to Make Home With Los Angeles Relatives.

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, May 9.—The steamer Venezuela, making its way up the west coast today, is bearing three orphan children from south Africa to make their home with Windham Martin, of Santa Monica, a relative. At the same time Mayor Fryer was telephoning Senator Shortridge at Washington to learn whether arrangements could be made to permit the landing of the three, or whether they would have to return many weary miles to the point of embarkation. The question arose because it was learned the quota of immigrants from South Africa has been exhausted.

#### Robertson Presents Self to British Embassy

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—Alexander L. Robertson, British war veteran and suitor of Miss Mary Culbertson, daughter of the senator from Texas, presented to the British embassy officials his charges today of having been kidnapped by private detectives and of an attempt to railroad him out of the country. Embassy officials did not reveal whether any action will be taken.

#### DISGRACE DAY OBSERVED IN AMOY, CHINA

Is Mark of Protest Against 21 Demands Made by Japanese Against the Government.

(By Associated Press) AMOY, May 9.—"National Disgrace Day" was observed generally today as a mark of protest against Japan's "Twenty-one Demands" on China, made in 1915. All places of business and amusements were closed; schools, guilds, clubs and other organizations uniting in an immense parade and demonstration.

#### SHOOT IN PICK GROWS BIGGER WEEK TO WEEK

Thirty Additional Feet of Ore Added to Rich Shoot on the Intermediate Level.

Driving north on the intermediate level directly in the bonanza ore-body, the Silver Pick has added more than 30 feet to the exposed length of the now famous shoot. Samples of the full face of this drift have given returns of \$400 to \$500 and the lowest face sample gave \$22. That the Pick will produce ore of a gross value of at least \$1,000,000 from the immediately vicinity of the big stope in the Red Top lease now appears highly probable, and, because of the simple method of treatment used in extracting the gold and low freight rates for the short haul to Tonopah, more than half the gross value of the recent shipments has been going into the Silver Pick treasury. The payment of royalty, freight and treatment charges, mining and overhead still leaves the lessee more than half the gross value of the ore.

The lease today appears bigger than ever before. In addition to the length added to the shoot, 10 to 12 feet has been added to the width of the stope at the top. Two to five and six-foot widths in this 12-foot width give assays of \$200 to \$1000 and one 18-inch width gives \$2500. These are remarkable figures, but in a bonanza orebody of this district such as the Silver Pick has they represent merely a recurrence of the conditions of the early days in the mines of the Consolidated and Florence.

Driving west on the third level, north of the stope, is being continued and it is expected that the next important find will be made in this work. The opening of ore on the third level would more than double the value of the lease. As more and more ore continues to be found in the hanging-wall and north of the stope the possibilities become evident, but at the same time it becomes equally evident that one to two years of development, prospecting and stopping is before the Silver Pick and that some such time will be necessary in determining just what has been found.

#### JAPANESE IS FAKER IF THIS IS TRUTH

(By Associated Press) NEWARK, May 9.—A jury in the West Orange police court today acquitted Taisan Tsuji of a charge of assault and battery on Mrs. Amelia Carthens. Tsuji, a Japanese newspaperman, testified he had been tricked into making a confession of the attack on the pretense that he would be protecting the good name of the woman, and had been promised speedy release if he signed the confession. The West Orange police issued a statement denying Tsuji's allegations.

#### NECKTIE PARTY FOR PROFESSOR NIPPED IN BUD

Enraged Citizens of Bowling Green, Ohio, Storm Residence, But Are Repulsed.

(By Associated Press) BOWLING GREEN, May 9.—Demanding that Otto P. Tracy, former Walbridge, Ohio, school principal, be sent out to a "necktie party," a number of enraged citizens stormed the home of Winn Stein, near Walbridge, shooting out the windows. When Stein called the sheriff's office, the mob dispersed.

#### FIREMEN PLAN AMALGAMATION WITH TOOTERS

Meeting Being Held in Houston and Question Depends Upon Action of the Members.

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, May 9.—Probably the most pressing question to come before the triennial convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, which opened here yesterday, is that of the proposed amalgamation with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. The latter brotherhood passed a resolution favoring such amalgamation at its Cleveland convention last year, and the decisions now devolves upon the firemen.

#### Ku Klux Klan Is Declared UnAmerican

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—The constitution of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of B'Nai B'Rith, with headquarters in Chicago, has, through the executive committee, adopted a resolution condemning the Ku Klux Klan as "un-American," while the Knights of Columbus order at a forthcoming state convention at Santa Cruz is expected to adopt a like resolution, it was learned here.

#### CABINET MEETS AND DISCUSSES VITAL QUESTION

Attitude of This Government Towards Soviet Regime in Line With That of Allies.

#### GENOA CONFERENCE UPHELD

Insofar as It Applies to Policies of England, France Italy and Their Followers.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—Discussion of the Russian problem as it is effected by negotiations at Genoa, occupied most of today's session of the cabinet. It developed the opinion that the attitude of the allied governments toward the soviet regime had been shaped up at Genoa in virtual agreement with the policies of the United States.

After the cabinet meeting it was said by administration officials that there had been a general agreement among the cabinet members that the work now proceeding at Genoa was going forward along the lines which had previously been laid down by the state department.

#### TURNBAUGH IS NAMED TONOPAH TRAFFIC AGENT

Will Make Headquarters Here as Result of Order Issued by J. M. Fulton.

E. L. Turnbaugh, for many years identified with the Southern Pacific company as traveling agent of the traffic department, has been appointed traveling agent, with headquarters in Tonopah. This action on the part of J. M. Fulton, assistant general freight and passenger agent, with headquarters in Reno, voices the sentiment generally in railway circles that Tonopah is about the best and most prosperous community in Nevada.

The above announcement, coming as it does from J. M. Fulton, assistant general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, means much to both the people and industries of southern Nevada.

The Southern Pacific lines are now giving to Tonopah and Goldfield an excellent and dependable freight and passenger service, but Mr. Fulton, feeling that the people were entitled to this further consideration, discussed the matters with officials at San Francisco, resulting in Mr. Turnbaugh's appointment which will prove of great benefit and convenience to this section of Nevada, bringing as it does, personal Southern Pacific service to our very doors.

#### Labor Department May Open Marysville Branch

(By Associated Press) MARYSVILLE, May 9.—Requests for the reopening of the Marysville branch of the state labor department have been sent to the state labor commissioner by the Yuba county chamber of commerce. The branch, it is believed, will help supply the labor needed here this summer to handle the fruit crops.

#### HUMBOLDT HOTEL TO USE CARRARA MARBLE

George Wingfield, who is building the new Humboldt hotel at Winnemucca, has instructed his architect, F. J. DeLongchamps, to use marble from the American Carrara Marble company, and the following specifications have been announced: "All marble construction and all marble bases to be American Carrara marble, black and white. All stairs and staircases to be of American Carrara marble, white with bone finish; all marble in lavatories to be American Carrara, white."

#### BOYS OF 1861 ARE MEETING AT RIVERSIDE

Arrangements Made for Entertaining Twenty-Five Hundred Veterans, Friends.

(By Associated Press) RIVERSIDE, May 9.—The 55th annual encampment of the department of California and Nevada, G. A. R., opened here today, and will continue until Saturday evening. Preparations have been made for the entertainment of 2500 delegates to the encampment and to allied organizations which are meeting in conjunction with the G. A. R.

#### GIVE CONVICTS MORE FREEDOM STATES WARDEN

Insists That an Iron Hand and Mere Confinement Accomplishes no Real Good.

(By Associated Press) JOLIET, Ill., May 9.—An iron hand and mere confinement "make convicts and no more; a progressive scale of privileges and freedom within a prison makes men," according to John L. Whitman, superintendent of Illinois prisons, under whose supervision the new state penitentiary at Joliet, near here, is being constructed. The architecture of the building is designed to facilitate application of the "Illinois idea" or progressive merit system. Prisoners will be grouped according to their grade of advancement under the system, and each group will be assigned to one of the eight cell houses, the second of which will be completed and in use within a few days. Prisoners will move from cell house to cell house with their advancement in grade.

The plan provides that prisoners may pass through the following stages: Confinement under strict prison discipline; increasing opportunity to merit more confidence on the part of prison authorities; positions of trust within prison walls; life in cottages outside the prison but under the supervision of prison authorities; parole; freedom.

The system is an outgrowth of psychological study of convicts which was conducted by Superintendent Whitman, the late Warden Everett J. Murphy, and a staff of experts during the last 20 years.

#### Wheat Production Small

(By Associated Press) WINTER, May 9.—A winter wheat production forecast of 584,793,000 bushels by department of agriculture, which was announced as the estimate crop on May 8 as \$2.5 per cent normal.

#### Sheriff Was Member of the Ku Klux Klan

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, May 9.—William L. Tregler, sheriff of Los Angeles county, was a member of the Ku Klux Klan, but resigned on account of pressure from the Knights of Columbus, according to papers found in the official effects of Grand Gobling Coburn, as revealed in connection in the grand jury investigation into the fatal raid at Inglewood, on April 22.

#### REFUNDING OF ENORMOUS DEBT TO START SOON

With Termination of Genoa Conference Commission Will Take Up Its Duties.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—Definite progress in negotiations looking to the refunding of the \$11,000,000,000 foreign debt, may be expected as soon as the Genoa conference is terminated and foreign economic and financial experts are released from their duties there, administration officials said today.

#### MOTHER VOLGA FLOW PROMISES BUMPER HARVEST

After Year of Hunger Peasants of Samara Anticipate Year of Great Prosperity.

(By Associated Press) SAMARA, April 11.—(By Mail)—The surge of spring that will break the ice and snow and send the waters of Mother Volga coursing again is awaited by the peasants of this famine land with hopeful expectation for a year of food after a year of hunger. It will be welcomed by the Volga peasants with a thrill of thankfulness to see the land grow green again.

The winter break up has been stormy but is already at hand. "Burrans" or snow blizzards that sweep the steppes and choke the railways with deep drifts, have dealt winter's parting blow in blocking transportation on rail and highways; but the spring is just around the corner.

Early in May, according to present weather conditions, the Volga itself will be open again and her broad waters will float precious food. Steamers, barges and tiny craft of all description are being made ready to relieve the congested railways of a share of the transportation burden.

Pinned in their huts by the bleak cold of a starvation winter, the peasants who have survived the famine are now emerging like thin bears from their hibernation dens. Every road leading to the railway stations is crowded with their vehicles carrying to the villages seed grain or American corn.

#### NEWSPAPER PLANT IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

(By Associated Press) Des Moines, May 9.—Fire of unknown origin starting in the paper storage room of the Des Moines News wrecked the newspaper plant today and gutted the entire News-Arcade building. The loss to the News plant is estimated at \$200,000.

#### TRINITY RIVER CUTS UP CAPERS GRAND STYLE

Overflowing Banks Second Time in Two Weeks; Lowlands Are Badly Flooded.

#### WARNING WAS GIVEN IN TIME

Property Damage Reported as Being Equal to That Which Formerly Took Place.

(By Associated Press) FORT WORTH, May 9.—Trinity river was out of its banks today inundating sections of Fort Worth for the second time in two weeks. A warning to the residents in the lowlands prevented loss of life, but property damage is estimated approximately at figures reached by the destructive flood of late April. Municipal water supplies are cut off, steam and electric transportation is stopped and the city's gas and electric plants are practically crippled.

#### Mrs. Bowler, Aged Woman Reese River, Is Injured

Mrs. Bowler, aged mother of John Bowler, of Reese River; Mrs. Kate Phillips of Ione; Mrs. George Keough of Reese River; and Mrs. E. E. Seyler of Praying, had the misfortune to fall last Saturday, suffering a fractured arm, as well as a bad cut on the forehead. Mrs. Bowler, who lives with her son John, was taken to Austin, where the surgeon took six stitches to close up the wound in view of her advanced age, 91 years, her condition is considered quite serious, although hopes are held out that she will make a recovery.

#### SANTO DOMINGO SLAPS LANSING RECENT LETTER

Says It Was What Might Have Been Expected From Japan in China Controversy.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—The letter of former Secretary of State Lansing, made public Sunday night, explaining the occupation of Haiti, as due to an agreement to establish peace and property and block German designs, the executive committee of Haiti, Santo Domingo Independence Society, said in reply, is "just such a defense as one would expect from the prime minister of Japan in explanation of the 21 demands upon China and treaties growing out of them."
