TONNAGE MAKES BIG INCREASE TONOPAH M. CO.

Outlook Is Promising for Continued Increase of Earnings During the Present Year.

MILL IS OPERATING STEADILY

Silver Top, Mizpah and Sand Grass Shafts Are Scene of Much Activity.

The Tonopah Mining company is prosecuting an aggressive campaign of development and ore extraction, and the outlook is promising for the tonnage of ore being increased with the summer months. Large development is going forward at the Silver Top, Mizpah and Sand Grass shafts, and during the week ending Monday, May 8, a total of 1250 tons of ore were consigned to the Desert mill at Millers. The heaviest work was performed at the Mizpah shaft where 1200 feet of underground work was performed with an extraction of 550 tons of ore. Silver Top followed with 765 feet of work and a production of 450 tons. Sand Grass operations are nearly satisfactory with 36.5 feet of work and 250 tons of ore which is a substantial increase over the preceding week.

Official report of development for the seven-day period in question, is as follows:

Silver Top Shaft.
"Drift 237, east, was continued on high grade stringer. Drift 394, intermediate west, was continued on one foot of mill ore. Raise 498, no change to report. Raise 4000, usual progress with no change to report. Development, 76.5 feet; tonnage, 450.

Mizpah Shaft.
"Crosscut 3009, no change to report. Drift 4003, intermediate, following one foot low grade ore in footwall of Mizpah vein. Drift 629, intermediate, following one foot of mill ore. Crosscut 631, has been started on Desert Queen claim for prospecting purposes. Development, 120.5 feet; tonnage, 550.

Sand Grass Shaft.
"Raise 1167, has been started in hanging wall of stope 1002. Crosscut 1167, no change to report. Development, 30.5 feet; tonnage, 250."

CORN IS FED RUSS ADULTS ALL SECTIONS

Last District to Receive Food Was Kazan and Distribution Was Carried Out Quickly.

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, April 22.—(By Mail.)—Every district in the Russian famine area is now provided with corn for adult feeding, says a cable message received at the London office of the American relief administration. The last district to receive the food was Kazan, where the corn arrived April 2.

Thirty-two hundred horse teams are now distributing it to the outlying villages near Kazan racing against time and the spring thaw which will make the Kama river impassable. Spassk, one of the forest areas, lies across the Kama, and every effort is being made to get the food there in time.

If 25 per cent of the American supplies reach their destination before the thaw finally sets in, then the adult program is assured, in the opinion of American relief administration officials. That amount will carry the people in the remote villages through until such time as the river navigation and the hardening of the roads makes them again accessible. The cities therefore are receiving their rations last, because they can always be reached from the railroads.

All American relief administration supplies are now moved in solid trains of 30 cars or more and are routed straight through to their ultimate destination. One hundred and seventy thousand tons of supplies left Russian ports for the interior during the month of March.

When the thaw prevents transportation in the outlying districts, the movement from the ports will still continue, but the cars will be routed to Rihinsk and Tzaritzin. Here the corn will be stored until the opening of rivers navigation makes its shipment by water possible.

That any young man who can possibly get away, should fall to long for and grasp such a summer's vacation is incomprehensible. Think of it—a trip to Salt Lake City; a month of healthy outdoor activity; engaging in athletic competitions; supplied with plenty of ammunition for rifle practice; a chance to make the acquaintance of other young men from all quarters of this area, and acquire knowledge of our wonderful "Inland Empire"; and an opportunity to see the many points of interest in and around Salt Lake City.

Fort Douglass is an ideal spot for such a camp, situated on a plateau 300 feet above Salt Lake City, with a wonderful view of the city, valley and the rugged mountains that surround it.
