MR. BUSINESS MAN, YOU ARE BUNKED AGAIN

Bunked again? This is the expression that apply to a number of business men of Tonopah. Outside the advertising agents have invaded this town and succeeded in inducing a number of merchants to pay a \$1.00 fee to have their names appear in some advertisement that is to make its appearance shortly. These sign boards are to be nailed on fronts and supposed conspicuous places, but little did the business men think that the rain and wind will, in a short time obliterate the very scheme of advertising. Little did he realize that the promoters of this town have a penchant for donations just such signs as are to be placed on their fronts, but little did he realize that for one out of a hundred they never pay any attention to some sign posted on a wall, tree or telephone pole or in front of a building.

The merchant who falls a victim for the oily advertising man, little cares for the success of the town. On the other hand, he has an objection against permitting any other business man to have an existence, and especially so the newspaper publisher, who pays the taxes, employs workers and other help in the various lines of human endeavor. He knows that the newspapers are over working for the upbuilding of the community in particular and the county and state in general, that they spend their money at home and boost the other fellow's game at every opportunity. Yet all the thanks the publisher gets for his efforts is to witness many of these business men falling victims to the oily talk of an itinerant traveling fake advertising man by handing over outrageous sums of money that he may see his name posted in what he considers a conspicuous place in some part of the city.

The printer or sign writer that is necessary to prepare these sign-boards is sent away from Tonopah. Thus the money that should stay at home to be distributed among our own people finds an outlet. What remains after the printing bill, or sign writing, is paid is pocketed by the traveling faker who departs for greener pastures.

IRON AND STEEL EXPORTS

The activities of the department of commerce in creating markets for American goods are bearing fruit. "The total volume of American exports of iron and steel for the first quarter of the year, 598,976 tons, is at the rate of slightly more than 2,000,000 tons for the year," says the department. "Keeping in mind such governing world factors as completion of liquidation of steel stocks, improved economic conditions, increased confidence, and a growing tendency toward stabilization of the exchanges, it is not unreasonable to look for this volume to reach, if not surpass the 2,000,000-ton mark." Let the democrats make an issue of that.

A CLEAR CUT ISSUE

There never was a clearer statement of a political issue than is contained in an article in the New York Times, written by Chairman John T. Adams, of the republican national committee. In the course of a brief, but rather comprehensive statement of the accomplishments and policies of the republican party, Mr. Adams said, concerning the coming campaign:

"The choice which lies before the voters is not between the republican party and some ideal organization which never makes a mistake, but between the republican party and the democratic party."

If there were an ideal party—one possessed of infallible statesmanship and prescience, undoubtedly the people should and would prefer that party to either the republican or the democratic party. But no such organization exists now or ever did exist. There is no prospect that such a perfect political organization ever will exist until the millennium, when there will be no need of parties at all.

For the present, the voters must choose between republican policies and administration on the one hand and democratic policies and administration on the other. Since the Civil War the country has had 16 years of democratic rule and more than 40 years of republican rule. The eight years ended in March, 1921, gave the country a clear demonstration of what Democratic rule

means, and the spokesmen of the democratic party give assurance that they stand now for the same principles and policies that they tried to impose upon the country during that period. They are still opposed to a protective tariff; they desire to put the United States into the League of Nations; they believe in the system of bureaucracy they built up when they incline toward government ownership; they believe in more governmental interference with private industry.

When any man or woman casts a vote next November, he or she expresses a desire either to go ahead with the constructive program upon which the republicans are now working, or to go back to the extravagance, the inefficiency and the internationalism of the democratic regime.

It is a very simple problem for the average voter to solve.

CHINA WILL FORCE BETTER PRICE SILVER

Under the combined influences of pronounced demand from India and China, foreign origin silver towards the end of last week reached 72 cents, the highest since October 17, 1921.

The best bidding was from India, but the situation in China is exceptional and apparently indicates much higher silver prices.

General Wu Pei Fu, the great Chinese nationalist who recently defeated the Manchurian war lord, General Chang Tso-Lin has levied upon the three leading so-called Chinese government banks, Bank of Communications, Bank of China and also the Frontier Bank for the necessary funds to pay off all Chang soldiers who surrendered to the Wu forces at Tientsin. The total amount is to be charged against the account or control of these banks by Liang Shi-wei, former premier, the John D. Rockefeller of China and an ally of General Chang. This has resulted in rendering the paper money of these banks practically worthless and also creates a much larger demand for silver.

It is also understood that General Wu intends to levy upon these banks the total costs of his recent contest with Chang which would probably impoverish Liang Shi-wei (also known as the "God of Wealth") and sorely cripple the banks mentioned and also some others, not mentioned.

Before prevailing political disturbances in China are concluded or modified it may be necessary for General Wu to eliminate the Man of Many Colours (Dr. Sun Yat Sen) but it is thought at present that General Wu's voice will be heard and obeyed in the variegated pseudo-republic of South China.

Trade conditions in India have been so exceedingly favorable for the past few months that some reflection was inevitable in the silver markets.

At the same time bullion speculators in India and China are of undoubted shrewdness and it is apparent that they have adopted a pullish attitude on silver that may continue without variations for the rest of this year.

An analysis of silver imports and exports of Great Britain for the first three months of this year shows the extent of the diminished supplies at London to which we have referred in previous issues. During this period net loss in exports amounted to 1,078,866 pounds, compared with 713,284 pounds in the first three months last year.

Of the imports, supplies from European continent are much smaller than for any previous post-war period. Holland sent but 134,445 ounces and France 158,708. This country was the largest contributor with 1,063,192 ounces.

On the export side 472,900 ounces was sent to China and Hong Kong against 262,400 pounds last year and to India 2,251,277 pounds, compared with 2,500,300 pounds in the corresponding 1921 period.

The totals are 3,682,351 pounds as exports and 2,603,515 pounds as imports.

Our silver exports to India for the first three months were of the value of \$2,759,984, against \$1,515,985 last year. The China they amounted to \$4,707,776, compared with \$5,765,813 last year. French Indo-China also received \$1,320,000.

It is somewhat interesting that India is now taking more silver from this country than from London. April official figures are not ready but the volume to the Far East was much larger than in the preceding three months. Around April 19

China purchased more than 20,000,000 ounces, probably the best high record for such a short period. Mexico has sent us \$12,933,829, against combined total imports of \$18,279,895 during the first three months. Germany has sent but \$84,000; the balance is from Central and South America.

No purchase of domestic silver at the \$1-an-ounce-net-price have been reported during the past six business days.
