

CHINAMEN GET INCREASE FOR DAILY LABORS

Kick Not if You Pay More for Firecrackers on Glorious Fourth of July.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 6.—When you pay more for your Chinese firecrackers for the next Fourth of July, you may take comfort from the fact that the men who made them over in Canton are getting a 15 per cent increase in wages, according to a report of labor conditions in China made public yesterday by the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions.

Canton, says this report, has been having successful strikes in hundreds of trades, with resultant increase in wages and improvement in the living of the workmen. The makers of the crackers got the lowest increase. Tenacose waiters got the highest increase, 50 per cent. Masons, tailors, barbers and wooden box makers got increases of 40 per cent. Ox butchers were raised 35 per cent, as were all butchers. Workers gaining 30 per cent included mechanics, makers of rag dresses and laundrymen. White distillers got a 25 per cent raise; so did painters and tea pickers. Matched builders had their wages increased 20 per cent.

The 52 Presbyterian missionaries in Canton report that contributions to their work must be increased to correspond with the new scale of wages and the higher cost of living. This missionary force supervises 35 organized churches with a communicant membership of 6270. Canton also has 23 Christian schools, including a medical college with a school for nurses, a school for the blind and a college of theology, all of which are affected by the increasing wage scale. To a lesser degree the higher cost affects all the Presbyterian missionary work in China, the Presbyterians having 535 missionaries throughout the republic. Prices are advancing for the whole population, according to a report made by J. E. Wilson of the Canton Union Middle school to the Presbyterian Foreign Board.

FILIPINOS ARE HOLDING THEIR ELECTION TODAY

Most Exciting Contest Since Islands Passed to American Sovereignty.

(By Associated Press) MANILA, P. I., June 6.—Probably the most exciting general election held in the Philippine Islands since the government was organized under American sovereignty took place today throughout the archipelago. The principal contest centered in control of the next legislature, although governors, treasurers and other officials of all but four of the 49 provinces were chosen. In four provinces, inhabited by non-Christian tribes, the officials are appointed by the governor general of the Philippines.

Since the establishment of the house of representatives in 1907, the Nacionalista party has controlled the body by a large majority. That party also has controlled the senate, with virtually no opposition, since the upper house came into being six years ago.

Early this year a revolt in the party ranks occurred over the question of the method of leadership. One faction under the leadership of Sergio Osmena, who has been speaker of the house since its organization, contended for unimpersonal leadership in the party. The other faction, headed by Manuel L. Quezon, president of the senate, advocated collective leadership or leadership by a committee of five or more persons.

After many weeks spent in futile attempts to compromise their differences and after Speaker Osmena and senate president Quezon announced their intention to retire from public life, the final split in the party came, resulting in the formation of the Nacionalista Collectivista party. Senator Quezon reconsidered his determination to quit public life and announced he would lead the new Collectivista party and become a candidate for the senate again in his old district, composed of the provinces of Tayabas, Cavite, Batangas and Mindoro.

Speaker Osmena also decided to continue in public life, as head of the Nacionalista party, but instead of seeking reelection as member of the senate in his home province, Cebu.

HEAVY OUTPUT REPORTED FROM TONOPAH M. CO.

Production for Week Amounted to Thirteen Hundred Tons Usual Grade Ore

The Tonopah Mining company continues its aggressive campaign of ore production from its three shafts—Silver Top, Mizpah and Sand Grass—and the tonnage is in keeping with that of the last several months. The latest report issued shows that for the preceding seven days a total of 199.5 feet of underground work was performed, with 1300 tons of ore shipped to the Desert mill at Millers. Development and tonnage was classified from the three shafts as follows: Silver Top, 104.5 feet, with 450 tons; Mizpah, 75.5 feet, with 650 tons; Sand Grass, 19.5 feet, with 200 tons. The official report of operations follows:

Silver Top Shaft

"Drift 125, east, was continued on small high grade streak. Raise 269 has led to stope 265 on high grade stringer. Raise 493, no change to report. Crosscut 537, satisfactory progress with no change. Development, 104.5 feet; tonnage, 450.

Mizpah Shaft

"Drift 403 has been discontinued. Raise 591, led to Mizpah stope and has been discontinued. Drift 631 D Q, satisfactory progress with no change to report. Development, 75.5 feet; tonnage, 650.

Sand Grass Shaft

"Raise 1167 has been started in footwall of Merger vein out of crosscut 1167. Tonnage, 200; development, 19.5 feet.

OBREGON WILL ALLOW VOTERS EVERY RIGHT

Next Presidential Election to be Conducted in All Honor and in Every Fairness

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, May 29.—(Ly Mail.)—Although the next presidential election is more than two years distant, there have been various indications during the last few weeks that the political pot in Mexico is even now commencing to boil.

President Obregon has been called upon frequently of late to give official assurance that full guarantees will be given voters and, speaking with direct reference to the congressional elections to be held next August, the chief executive has stated repeatedly that an earnest attempt will be made to permit the voters of Mexico to express their sentiments without fear or hindrance.

The newspaper El Universal is now conducting a contest to discover its readers' choice for president, and according to its statements, a lively interest is being displayed. President Obregon described the contest as "one of the best jokes of the season," and in other official quarters that is the direct charge that Editor Palavicini of El Universal is taking this means to enhance his own chances to gain the presidential seat.

The first computation of votes as announced by El Universal gave Adolfo de la Huerta, present secretary of the treasury and former provisional president, first choice. Pascual Ortiz Rubio, former minister of communications and public works, was next and Senor Palavicini was third. These three men were closely grouped in the voting.

There was then a distinct drop in the number of votes to Secretary of Interior Calles, and President Obregon was fifth with a mere 26 votes.
