ROCK ROLLERS CARRIED SLATE OUT TO LETTER

Pink Tea Artists Succeeded in Electing Delegates and Members Central Committee

The pink tea party given at the home of Homer Black Monday night, at which time the slate was prepared for the republican county convention held yesterday, resulted in the vote at all times standing 44 to 27 for the pink tea delegates to the state convention to be held on June 27, and also for members of the county central committee.

The convention lasted until 7 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and the rock rollers kept up their assault, and when the smoke of battle had cleared away, it was found that Homer Black has been elected county chairman and J. E. Peck the secretary.

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As no one else, said Mr. Harn, "he should be able to present its good points in the most convincing manner. Mr. Harn declared that in the majority of cases money often spent in expensive literature "would be much more effectively used in buying more newspaper and magazine space and in co-ordinating the work of the distributor with the newspaper and magazine advertising." He conceded that in the case of the concern which has a rather complicated or unfamiliar product the "need for intensive education probably justifies intensive and extensive follow-up."

"There is only one thing in advertising practice," said Mr. Harn, "as had as neglect to co-ordinate the various advertising forces which one is using, and that is to leave entirely unusual some form of advertising or sales effort which would render what we are doing much more effective."
