## GREAT RAILWAY STRIKE VOTE IS BEING TAKEN

### Southern Ireland Is Electing Irish Parliament Today

#### ELECTION HELD UNDER TERMS OF LATEST TREATY

Members Elected Will Pass On Draft of Constitution as Soon as Sworn In.

#### MORNING PAPERS FAVORABLE

One Journal Asks That People Use Fearless and Prudent Judgment in Matter.

(By Associated Press) DUBLIN, June 16.— Voters of southern Ireland went to the polls today to elect an Irish parliament as provided under the terms of the Anglo-Irish treaty.

The publication last night of the terms of the draft of the Irish constitution on which the new parliament must pass, is not expected to influence the vote. Comment in the Dublin morning newspaper is mostly favorable to the constitution. The Freeman's Journal says: "The draft of the constitution declares all political power in Ireland derives from the people. Let the people prove today by fearless, conscientious and prudent exercise by their franchise, they are worthy of the reputation of that supreme power."

#### DESERTER HAD FOOT ON EACH SIDE OF BORDER

Wealthy Frenchman Taken Into Custody When He Thought He Was Surely Safe.

(By Associated Press) GENEVA, May 23.—(By Mail.)—A wealthy Frenchman, F. Bertrand, described as a deserter, has been arrested here at a moment when he had practically one foot on either side of the Swiss and French frontier. He was in a cafe that straddles the border. The cafe is in the village of Saint Julien on the international boundary. Part of the building is in Switzerland and part in France.

Early in the war Bertrand settled in Geneva, where his accusers aver, he made a large fortune trading with Germany. He bought a villa and several automobiles and led a life of pleasure. He said he was more German than French, and took pleasure in speaking against France, particularly in the cafe at Saint Julien where, safe on Swiss territory in one of the drinking rooms, he could be overheard, and even seen by the French police in the rooms on the French side. There the French listened to his annoying talk, but, unable to catch him on the French side, they could not arrest him. Bertrand boasted that when there were no police about—he could enter France and return without a passport.

Bertrand, after dining well, proceeded to cross the border by going from the room on the Swiss side to that on the French side to greet some friends. At the instant he passed the line into France he was pounced upon by two French gendarmes. He put up a fight, but was quickly subdued, handcuffed, and carried away.

#### KLANSMEN DECLARED TO BE UNMASONIC

(By Associated Press) BOSTON, June 16.—A letter declaring the Ku Klux Klan an "un-Masonic organization and utterly without Masonic support or sympathy," has been sent to all Masonic lodges of this state by Arthur D. Prince, grand master of the Massachusetts grand lodge.

The letter, after asking how long it will be "before the law abiding people of this commonwealth visit dire punishment upon those who forget or flout the sovereignty of the law," concludes with the declaration that no Masonic temple or apartments must be used for the Klan's purposes.

#### FOURTH JULY CELEBRATION IS ASSURED

Finance Committee Meets With Splendid Reception Among the Business Interests.

Tonopah is going to stage a real old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration, and one that will cause an influx of visitors to Tonopah from all sections of southern Nevada.

In making the canvass of the city with a view of securing financial pledges, the committee at work has met with great success and the liberality of the people has practically bubbled over. A canvass of business blocks of the town resulted in subscriptions totaling \$1500, and when the other sections have been canvassed and the results compiled, it is believed that at least \$3500 will be available to make the celebration one of the best ever held in this section of the state.

While plans concerning the program are not yet available, but will be worked out following a meeting of the entertainment committee to be held at the Elks club tonight. It is known, however, that a splendid athletic program of sports will be provided for both young and old, while a wild west entertainment will probably be staged that will eclipse that of anything ever before pulled off in Tonopah. Baseball games, in which some of the fastest teams in southern Nevada will contest for honors, will also be a feature of the program, and last, but not least, the kiddies will not be forgotten by any means.

#### SCORE TRAPPED HOLD OF LINER NEAR HAMBURG

Vessel Capsized While Being Hauled Out of Dry Dock at Vuman Shipyards.

(By Associated Press) HAMBURG, Germany, June 16.—Over a score of men were trapped in the hold of the Brazilian liner Avare when she capsized while being hauled out of dry dock at the Vuman shipyards here. Openings are being forced this afternoon into the hold in order to save the men inside.

It is believed about 30 men, members of the Brazilian crew of the liner, and shipyard employees were caught within the hull. Others on deck jumped overboard when the ship for some unknown reason began to list heavily. They were saved by motor boats and the harbor fire department which immediately began operations to save the entrapped men.

#### MARCONI MAKES NEW DISCOVERY RADIO MYSTERY

Says Experiments on Yacht Show It Is Possible Transmit Messages Around World

#### MAY REDUCE COST MESSAGES

Proportion in Cost Small in Comparison to Laying Great Oceanic Cables

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 16.— Guglielmo Marconi, of Italy, perfecter of the wireless, announced on his arrival in his yacht Elettra, that experiments he had conducted on the Atlantic had shown it possible to transmit radio messages around the world. Previously he had said the maximum sending distance established was 12,200 miles.

The inventor said round-the-world wireless would reduce the cost of long distance communication as the cost of wireless apparently does not increase in proportion to distance in the same ratio as the cable.

#### WOMAN IS KIDNAPPED WHILE PLAYING GOLF

(By Associated Press) CINCINNATI, June 16.— While playing golf on the links of the Marketwahn country club, Mrs. Clara Marshall, 30, daughter of William Shaw, treasurer of the Krippendorf Dittman Shoe company, was seized by two men, carried to a waiting automobile and whisked away. The police have started a search.

#### MINERS KILLED AS RESULT MISSED SHOT

(By Associated Press) GROVELAND, Cal., June 16.— Angelo Segale and John Haley, miners, were killed instantly last night in an explosion which followed when Segale drilled into a missed hole, four miles inside the Hetch Hetchy tunnel.

#### CADET KILLED AS AUTO HITS A LOCOMOTIVE

Several Passengers on Pennsylvania are Injured as a Result of Collision

(By Associated Press) MANASQUAN, N. J., June 16.—A Pennsylvania railroad train was wrecked today at Allaire, and several passengers reported injured, when the locomotive crashed into an automobile driven by Jerome Stewart, West Point cadet. Stewart was instantly killed. A young woman who accompanied him, escaped by jumping.

#### PUBLIC BUILDINGS COVER GOLD GROUND

(By Associated Press) DOWNEVILLE, Cal., June 16.—The court house and small group of other buildings here belonging to Sierra county stand on ground estimated to contain approximately \$4,000,000 in gold if it were practicable to work it by the hydraulic method. The building or their predecessors have stood there since the early '50s, although all the surrounding ground has long since been mined.

#### NEGRO HANGED FOR ASSAULT OLD WOMAN

(By Associated Press) IRWINGTON, Ga., June 16.—Bill Denison, a negro, who several weeks escaped from a mob after being taken from the county jail, was hanged today for criminally assaulting a 70-year-old white woman.

#### BELGIAN STATESMAN KILLED BY SOVIETS

(By Associated Press) BRUSSELS, June 16.—Rumors are current in the Belgian chamber of deputies that Emile Vandervelde, former minister of justice, who went to Russia as counsel for the social revolutionists on trial there, had been assassinated at Moscow. There was no confirmation.

#### MANCHURIA TO ESTABLISH NEW GOVERNMENTS

Three Provinces Will Govern Themselves While Recognizing China as Country.

MUKDEN, June 16.—Proclamation of a new form of government throughout Manchuria was published today by the assemblies representing three provinces and provides that each province shall govern itself while recognizing Manchuria as still a part of China, and names Chang Tso Lin commander in chief of all troops.

#### HEAVY OUTPUT IS MAINTAINED TONOPAH M. CO.

Active Operations Being Prosecuted Through Three Shafts in the Tonopah District.

#### EARNING IS BEING INCREASED

Desert Mill Turning Out Large Amount of Bullion From Ores Being Treated.

It is gratifying to watch progress of development that is going steadily forward at all times on the properties of the Tonopah Mining company in this district. There is a hum of activity in evidence and the results that are being attained are best evidenced from the steady flow of ore that is reduced into bullion that is treated from month to month. During the past several weeks bullion shipments have shown a steady increase, and throughout the summer and fall the production should be heavy.

During the week ending Monday, June 12, there was performed a total of 237 feet of development at the Silver Top, Mizpah and Sand Grass shafts, with a total of 1550 tons of ore produced. The official report follows:

#### BLAIR-DOVER CONTROVERSY BURNS ANEW

Petition Circulated Asking President Harding to Uphold Dover Policies

#### WOULD FIRE UNFAITHFULS

Names of Hundred and Fifty are Included Who are Disloyal to the Government

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 16.— The Blair-Dover controversy in the treasury department threatened to break out afresh today when it became known that a petition had been circulated among republican members of congress, asking President Harding to uphold Dover's policies. The petition, it was learned, had received the signatures of about 150 members, and plans are being made to present it to President Harding within 24 hours. Circulated with the petition was a document giving the names of almost 150 office holders in the department who are declared to be democrats occupying key positions. Many of these republican house member circulating the petition said, were disloyal to the administration and through lack of cooperation were obstructing the work of the government.

#### NAVAL BUDGET MEETS WITH A COMPROMISE

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 16.—A compromise in the appropriations in the annual naval budget for Mare Island navy yard, by which an ultimate expenditure of \$2,800,000 for dikes and channel dredging is provided, was adopted by the senate today without an objection upon the motion of Senator Johnson.

#### MINERS BREAK COAL GUARDED BY SENTRIES

Lines of Machine Guns Watch Over Sixty Men at Work in Illinois Mine

(By Associated Press) HERRIN, Ill., June 16.—Guarded by two lines of men armed with machine guns, 60 men began production of coal today at Lester and Sherwood strip mine, six miles east of here. It was the first coal mined in Illinois since the miners' strike became effective on April 1, and armed sentries guarded the roadway to the mine.

#### CAIRO AND BAGDAD GET AIR SERVICE

(By Associated Press) CAIRO, Egypt, May 13.—(By Mail.)—The inauguration of an "Air Mail Service" between Cairo and Bagdad and between the latter city and Karachi, giving a through India-Egypt service, is making Egypt the center of England's imperial air communications. Just as the Suez canal has been in the past the center of Britain's sea ways. It is understood that the next step England to Egypt, soon will be taken. This will give through air service from England to India. There is also a rumor that owing to the widespread dissatisfaction prevailing in both England and Egypt with regard to the inferior facilities now offered by the post office, a service of flying boats between Alexandria and Brindisi will be inaugurated, the mails being by rail between Brindisi and Paris, and again by air between Paris and London.

#### BLIND WOMAN HOLDS SHORTHAND POSITION

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Blindness need not prevent a woman from a successful career in business, according to Mrs. Florida Hartman, who recently was given a position as stenographer with the California Industrial Accident Commission as the result of having passed second out of several hundred candidates in the semi-annual state civil service examination. She has been blind since infancy.

Mrs. Hartman was educated at the state school for the blind at Berkeley, finishing off with a business college course in Oakland. Samples of her typing are perfect according to Will J. French, secretary of the commission.

#### SHIP SUBSIDY AMENDMENT IS NOW REJECTED

Provided That Government Must Not Aid Ships on Which Liquor Is Carried.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 16.—Without a record vote, the house merchant marine committee today rejected the Rankin amendment to the ship subsidy bill, providing no government aid should be allowed on ships on which liquor is sold. Edmund's proposal, which would extend the Volstead law by sea by taxing all ships of any registry touching American ports on which liquor selling is permitted, was not acted on, and the committee ordered the bill reported by straight party vote.

#### SUMMER RATES TAKE MANY TO WESTWARD

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, June 16.—Summer tourist rates, which are lower than for several years, have stimulated railroad travel westward tremendously, according to reports from local passenger agents. On road reports 25 per cent increase over last year.

#### PROFESSOR OF OXFORD FAVORS USE OF SLANG

Says It Enriches the Language and Adds a Most Picturesque Atmosphere.

(By Associated Press) CLEVELAND, O., June 16.—The use of slang was defined by William A. Craigie, professor of Anglo-Saxon at the university of Oxford, England, in an address on "The Oxford Dictionary" as Western Reserve University, here. "Slang undoubtedly enriches the language," Professor Craigie said. "The ephemeral part disappears, but the vivid, expressive part remains in the language and adds a picturesque note." Referring to the Oxford dictionary which will be published soon after 50 years of collecting and compiling millions of notes, Professor Craigie said: "The Oxford dictionary is a record of English terms from the 18th century down to the present time, omitting only the words which did not survive the 11th century and the new words which are so trivial or too technical to be included." "The words of classic origin are easy to study and classify. It is the simple words that are hard," he continued. "The word 'sit' for instance, occupies 55 columns and is divided into 154 sections."

#### CHIEFS CLAIM BIG MAJORITY FAVOR STRIKE

Official Notice Withheld Pending Receipt of Board's Action on Other Slashes.

#### SITUATION GROWING SERIOUS

Walkout May Result in Million and Half Men Refusing to Work After July 1.

(By Associated Press) CINCINNATI, June 16.—Rail union chiefs are considering today serving formal notice on the railroad labor board that an overwhelming majority of the 1,225,000 shop craft and maintenance of way employees were voting for strike on July 1, and officials of the union would, likely by the decision of the workers. Decision as to the dispatch of formal notice was held up by union chiefs awaiting receipt of the board's action on further restrictions of forcing 350,000 station employees, clerks, express and signal men, 600 money firemen, others and train dispatchers.

The notice, in effect, would formally communicate to the board a public statement issued here last night by union heads, which asserted the board in ordering wage reductions had "so violated their fundamental rights that the strike becomes an act of preservation."

#### TWO CARLOADS ORE FROM SILVER PICK

(By Associated Press) CINCINNATI, June 16.—E. M. Joss, all president of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor was authorized by the union to request the officers of the United Mine Workers of America for a joint conference to discuss a joint strike action.

Two carloads of ore from the Red Top workings of the Silver Pick property at Goldfield were received at the Tonopah district mill yesterday and is expected to bring the usual returns of better than \$50 a ton.

Reports from Goldfield are to the effect that the Silver Pick lease is higher and richer than previously reported, and that a continued increased production will be in order. Up to the present time it is said the treasury of the company has been enriched to the extent of \$60,000, after paying repair and operating expenses, which means that within the last few weeks a gross production of about \$400,000 has resulted.
