HEAVY OUTPUT CONTINUES AT SILVER PICK

Lease is Considered Better Than at Any Time Since Operations Started

Two more carloads of ore, 110 tons netted for at \$82, was last week's contribution of the lease on the Red Top to the treasury of the Silver Pick company. This brings the production since May 1 to 19 carloads of ore of an average value of more than \$50, and yesterday there was 120 tons broken on the intermediate level.

General conditions in the lease are considered to be better now than at any previous time in its history, principally because the ore, instead of being run across the vein and so on under the drift on the third level, is now being run through a shaft, which is being run up 15 feet with the hanging wall now in sight on the hanging wall side of the dip.

The north drift on the intermediate level of a point 100 feet from the shaft, which at this depth has a lateral length of 65 to 70 feet, the strengthening of the ore and the way it is being run on the hanging wall side of the third level, which is considered of the greatest importance as it opens a new way over the possibility of the main vein through to the surface.

The drills are hammering away at the top of the slope near the south end and yesterday at the north end the intermediate drift was blocked by 150 tons of ore lying broken in it.

A raise being driven from the fourth level will cut the shaft 30 feet below the intermediate and it is expected to break through into the intermediate before the end of this week. This raise will be too far south to cut the heart of the shaft, but it will provide another outlet for ore.

While trying to regulate the gas-line burner on the linotype in the Bonanza office this morning at 11 o'clock John Wallace, the operator, suffered bad burns to the right hand and arm. The injury will incapacitate him from work for several days. The wounds, although painful, are not serious.


