(Continued from Page Three) they could get for the job. One of all the others were several thousand dollars higher. The county commissioners, with no knowledge of engineering thought that one of the contractors had made a mistake and bid too low. He was eagerly signed up. It was a big job, the other contractors loaned equipment and tools and the profits were divided between all. If it was a small job the equality of the plan was maintained by letting one of the other contractors get the next job.

The political engineers are now equipped with cranes, graders, pumps and tools that can compare with contractors' equipment, hence whenever the attempt was made to do the work by day work under political bosses, the costs were more. The contractors know just how much to bid to be under the costs of day work.

I have seen city water supplies installed that were a maze of useless piping, with big mains supplied by small pipes, through bushings and reducer. The system would test up with excellent pressure but would fall down when emergency demanded a large volume of water at high pressure.

Not only are these water systems violations of all the best practice of hydraulic and hydrostatic engineering but their costs are several times more than a competent system should cost.

One Minnesota town forced a contractor to put in a mile of four-inch pipe and pump the water over the sides of the tank on a 100-foot tower, when pumping into the mains would have been cheaper to operate and maintain with no additional construction cost.

All of these things are burdens on the taxpayer and increase the interest on larger bond issues. It is all collected from the man who does the work in the price he pays for things he buys.

Highway Construction. Every community is proud of good highways. They are the most essential things to mercantile prosperity, agricultural economy, efficient transportation and travel. The cost of vehicle breakage, horse or gas power, speed of highway movements, and the increased business make highways an economic necessity. Every one should fight for good highways, but why construct them out of dust and sand with political incompetency, if not nefariousness?

A short time ago I was riding with a prominent railroad construction engineer along a stretch of highway that had been constructed by political influence as a bribe to laboring men for their votes at the next election. The work was the worst I ever saw, and the road was almost impassable. I remarked: "There is a sample of the \$6000 a mile highway built by political engineers."

"Isn't it a shame. It could have been built, and built right for less than \$1000 a mile by real engineers," he replied.
