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WE SHOULD OBSERVE LABOR DAY

The proposition of holding a big Labor Day celebration in Tonopah is meeting with much response and it seems to be generally observed here. The success of the Fourth of July celebration proved such a pleasing event that the people feel generally we should again demonstrate our ability to entertain the people of southern Nevada.

Labor Day is observed universally throughout the United States and in view of the general good feeling existing in Tonopah and other parts of southern Nevada, among labor and capital, the time seems most opportune when we should all get together and try and create even a better feeling than is now existing.

Let us stage a one-day celebration that will go down in history as establishing new friendships, and that let us all get in the harness and work for a greater southern Nevada. No better time would present itself than at the present for this great undertaking, and when final plans have matured for the Labor Day celebration let us all respond liberally in a moral and financial way to make the event the success that it should be.

ARGENTITE IS COMING PRODUCING SECTION

The camp of Argentite is going to be placed upon the map and announcement that the commissioners of Esmeralda county have approved a bond issue of \$2000, which must meet with the approval of the state highway commission, for the construction of a stretch of road, a distance of one and a half miles from Coyote Springs to Coyote Summit, will meet with the approval of all interested in the future of southern Nevada.

Argentite has given such a splendid account of itself during the past year that there seems to be little doubt concerning its future as a silver and gold producing section. Development that has been performed on the Francis and Mohawk properties has demonstrated that the veins are there in size and richness and that their persistency has practically been proved. Both of these properties have been developed with shafts sunk to a depth exceeding 200 feet with monster orebodies being exposed, the width of which in some places exceeds 40 feet. Other finds of promise have been made in various localities, so it is no longer disputed that the mineralized belt covers a wide area.

Both Tonopah and Goldfield will profit through the construction of the short span of road in question. It will result in owners and operators of property making one of these towns their headquarters and naturally, supplies will be purchased here. A big saving will result in the purchase of supplies, as it has been found that goods can be bought in Tonopah much cheaper than at Bishop, which has heretofore been enjoying a considerable amount of trade.

JAPANESE ANXIOUS TO EXTEND HOLDINGS

It is very evident to those who have intelligently followed the activities of the Japanese in this country recently that they have determined fully to secure the permanent settlement, through peaceful penetration, of as large a representation as possible of their race on this continent—particularly in the United States, and preferably in California and Washington.

A significant verification of this policy appears in the Seattle Post-Intelligencer of June 21st, in an interview with Isaac F. Marcossan, internationally known writer and war correspondent, who has returned recently from an investigation of conditions in the Far East. In that interview he says:

"I am convinced that Japan, so far as her foreign policies are concerned, is undergoing a decided change of heart. She has discovered that her policy of aggression and forceful penetration is a huge mistake. Had she continued as before she would have been intrinsically isolated so

far as world friendship is concerned.

Japan now wishes to colonize only where it is pleasant to live—namely, Washington and California."

PROFIT SHARING ALL RIGHT SOMETIMES

The way of the reformer is hard when he backs his reforms with his own money. He is apt to lose his money and gain no thanks in the bargain. It is not all beer and skittles to induce workers to venture an investment in the stock of the concern for which they work. A prominent example of national-wide proportions, which also operates largely in California, is being subjected to severe criticism for its alleged efforts to sell stock to its own employees.

Some of the latter allege that they are being coerced into buying the stock against their will, only a full disclosure of the facts would reveal whether there is any merit in the charges. An important and well-financed company seem apt to use undue pressure on employees for the sake of selling a little stock. But in furtherance of a settled policy of generosity, it is reasonable to suppose that a company would be disposed to favor the employment of such persons as showed sufficient interest and faith in the concern to invest some of their own money in its stock. If such an attitude necessitates coercion, then it is an exposable one if the idea of cooperation is to make any progress at all. That cooperation cannot be effected without the ownership of stock, and if the owners of stock do not have any preference over non-owners, there would be no mutual benefit in the arrangement. The very purpose of the ownership of stock by employees is to give them a personal stake in the success of the business, and thus insure their best efforts and loyalty. A specific unwillingness to own any of the stock is a very poor guarantee of loyalty to the concern.

GERMANS ACTIVE

The Germans report that they are at work on the super-Zeppelin which was allocated to the United States at the close of the war. Our government was offered the choice of taking this giant aircraft or accept in lieu a German promise to pay. As German promises to pay are not of high value we accepted the Zeppelin, in spite of the ill fate which has befallen the English and Italian monster aircraft. Our government has prudently stipulated that the Germans must not only build the Zeppelin, but deliver it on this side of the Atlantic. The German aviators are not pleased with this requirement, as the test of a journey across the Atlantic is a severe one and they are not eager for honor or a grave beneath the briny sea. Just what we are going to do with it after we get it is another question. The bombing of cities by the Zeppelins was a failure, only frightening women and making men much more bitter to fight. The Zeppelin will probably be mainly a relic of the war.

GREAT MEN OF THE PAST AND FUTURE

It is a common fallacy that as the race increases its store of scientific knowledge, the intelligence and brain power of individuals increase correspondingly. Thus a well known "columnist" contends that "a great human race, thousands of years from now will look upon Michelangelo and Phidias as we look on the unknown cave artist of the stone age. Shakespeare and Beethoven will go to join in oblivion the man who made the first wedge-shaped writing. One hundred thousand years hence children will be born knowing more than Archimedes and Aristotle knew at the end of their long lives."

This statement contains more nonsense to the line than any paragraph ever penned, or, for that matter, dictated or printed. It is so comprehensively absurd that the mind falters before its variegated points of error. One might as well begin with the observation about cave-men artists. No modern artist

holds the work of the cave-man in anything but high respect. The drawings of animals in the Altamira and other paleolithic caves are as good for accuracy and selectivity and firmness of line, as anything that Landseer ever did. Anyone who looks on them with contempt knows nothing of drawing.

The United States department of labor has issued its report upon employment and wage conditions for the month of May comparing conditions with May a year ago and with April of this year. Comparing May this year with May, 1921, eight of the key industries surveyed show an increase in the number of persons employed. Six of the industries show increases in the total amount of payroll. Compared with April of this year, the May figures show that in seven industries out of 12 there was an increase in the payroll and in ten industries out of 12 there was an increase in the amount of money paid employees.
