Harding Holds Conference With High Officials of Railroad

SITUATION IS UNCHANGED IN A GENERAL WAY

Coast Manager of Santa Fe Says Labor Board and President Should Keep Quiet

OPINES THAT STRIKE IS WON

Strike Leaders at San Bernardino Visit District Attorney in Los Angeles

WASHINGTON, July 26.—Resuming conferences through which he purposes to keep in close contact with the railroad strike situation, President Harding conferred today with W. W. Atterbury, vice-president in charge of operations of the Pennsylvania road, Herbert C. Hoover also participated.

SAN BERNARDINO, July 26.—I. L. Howard, general manager of the Santa Fe Railroad said here today if the labor board and the president would refrain from interfering with the work of the company it would win the shopmen's strike and soon be operating normally. He said the Santa Fe had never had a strike and had no intention of having this. A delegation of strike leaders left for Los Angeles to confer with District Attorney Burke and United States Marshal Sittler about detentions Monday night when a group of men of shop workers were arrested. Mayor McNabb removed the policeman at Critchfield because of the policeman's actions during the strike.

CO-OPERATIVE ASSOCIATION CAN COLLECT FEES

WOMEN ATTACK GANG SHOPMEN ON WAY TO WORK

Call for Help Met With Shower of Bricks and Stones and Police Kept Busy

TOLEDO, July 26.—Forty women, wives and relatives of striking railway employes, today attacked a party of non-union shopmen on their way to work in the Pearing street shops of the New York Central Railroad here. The police responded to a call for help and were met with a shower of bricks and stone, which resulted in a call for police reserves. Three patrol wagons of officers were rushed to the scene with orders to arrest every woman found in the vicinity.

GERMANY SEEMS UP OLD TRICKS OF PROTECTION

Council of Allied Ambassadors Demand Immediate Destruction of School

IN REALITY IT IS A FORT

Strategic Point on Kiel Canal Could Be Converted Into a Genuine Fortress

PARIS, July 26.—The council of ambassadors has decided to send a sharp note to the German government demanding the immediate destruction of the fire control and range finding school which the German naval authorities quietly established at a strategic point on the Kiel canal. Allied expert opinion has declared the school is convertible into a fort commanding entrance to the canal.

SCION IS SUED BREACH PROMISE BY FRENCH LASS

Says DeRothschild Induced Her to Come to American On Promise of Marriage

NEW YORK, July 26.—Baron James A. de Rothschild, member of the famous Rothschild family of France, was sued today for \$500,000 damages here by Marie Porquet, a French girl, who alleges she came here last spring upon his promise to marry her and that he has refused to fix the date for this marriage. Rothschild's counsel denied a promise was given.

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DEPUTY MARSHAL IS STONED AT ROSEVILLE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—An alleged stoning of one of his deputies by a railroad strike mob at Roseville was reported today to United States Marshal Holohan. He did not indicate what action he would take. Eugene Malvey, the deputy, was sent to Roseville to serve subpoenas in connection with the injunction granted the Southern Pacific against strike activities at shops at Roseville and elsewhere. The crowd was composed mostly of women and children, who stoned him, but he escaped uninjured, according to the report.
