Discharged Restaurant Employee Suspected Poisoning 100

WAITER NOW IN TOILS CHARGED WITH KILLINGS

Restaurantier in Custody Charged With Poisoning More Than Hundred People

Alleged to Have Baked Pies That Caused Death of at Least Three Persons

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—Charles Abrahamson, baker who had been discharged from Shelbourne's restaurant at Broadway and 29th street, was arrested here today on a homicide charge following an investigation of the poisoning of over 100 persons three of whom are dead, who ate at the restaurant yesterday.

Officers of the medical examiner's office reported a quantity of berry pies baked before Abrahamson left the restaurant's employ, to have been heavily charged with arsenic.

LEHMAN CAVES DEDICATION TO BE AUGUST 6TH

Many Expected from Tonopah and Whole State Will Be Fully Represented

How to get to Lehman Caves for the dedication exercises on next Sunday, is explained in the following, from the man who was instrumental in having this place dedicated as a United States monument.

Answering the questions of those contemplating visiting the caves and attending the dedicatory ceremonies next Sunday, I will say that from Tonopah to Ely is 186 miles. From Ely to the caves is 85 miles over an excellent highway. Cars leaving Ely Sunday morning should start early as it is planned to hold the exercises about 11 a. m. The trip through the caves will follow the exercises.

For the benefit of those who do not carry camp equipment, the supervisor of the national forestry service has wired me that the town of Baker on the highway, six miles from the caves, will have accommodations for 100 guests. Also that the Ely tax company announces special rates to and from the caves for that occasion.

An excursion from the caves via saddle trail, to the summit of Mount Wheeler, 13,407 feet, will probably be arranged for the following day. There is splendid camping facilities within a hundred yards of the cave's entrance, with trees, running water and two nearby trout streams.
