ELKS TO BUILD MEMORIAL FOR DEPARTED BOYS

Circular Building With Giant Dome to Be Erected in Memory of War Heroes

CHICAGO, Aug. 11—A circular building with a giant dome supported by a ring of Grecian pillars, will be the main structure of the memorial to its war dead of the Republican and Protective Order of Elks to be erected in Chicago. The national memorial headquarters commission of the lodge which met in New York recently decided on this kind of a structure and plans and specifications for the \$2,500,000 home of Elksdom will be drawn within the next few weeks.

On either side of the huge memorial rotunda will be small wings connected with the main building by porticoes. These will hold the offices of the secretary of the grand lodge and the editorial offices of the Elks magazine.

The structure will be erected next summer and will be located at Diversey parkway and Lakeview avenue, in the heart of a colony of beautiful residences, and facing Lincoln park. In the rotunda will be placed some memorial to the members of the lodge who lost their lives during the war. The nature of this has not been decided upon according to Fred C. Robinson, the grand secretary.

EMBARGO ISSUED AGAINST FRUIT IN SAN JOAQUIN

Fifteen Plants Along Santa Fe Were Ordered Closed Today By General Manager

FRESNO, Aug. 11—Orders for an embargo on fresh fruit shipments out of the San Joaquin valley are being waited here by local shippers as a result of the strike action announced on the part of the Big Four Brotherhoods. Fresh fruit and packing plants will be ordered closed by shippers as soon as the embargo becomes known.

Fifteen plants along the Santa Fe route were closed this morning by E. V. Foley on the understanding of the action taken by fruitmen in southern California and will be followed immediately by orders from the railroad to refuse fruit shipments.

MINERAL FIND MADE VICINITY OF HOT CREEK

Old Rattler Mine Shows Four Foot Ledge That Carries High Silver Values

News of a most important mineral discovery has reached Tonopah from what is known as Rawhide mountain ten miles east of Hot Springs. The property was formerly known as the Rattler, but has been relocated under the name of the Silver Reef by R. C. Gaston, trouble shooter for the Western Union and John McElvray, old time prospector of Tonopah and southern Nevada.

The ledge has a width of four feet and the outcroppings can be traced for several hundred feet. It is a silver proposition in the truest sense and samples of the ore that were brought to Tonopah Wednesday show values of 88 ounces silver, 41 in gold and 3 per cent copper.

Previous owners of the property sank a shaft to a depth of 60 feet, and it is estimated that there is on the dump not less than 50 tons of ore of commercial value, and the present owners contemplate making a shipment in the near future. The showing has created no little interest and a number of prospectors are planning to invade that section with a view of making locations.

CONTROVERSIES ON REPARATIONS SETTLED

CANCELLATION TRAIN ORDERS ARE EFFECTIVE

Santa Fe Fails to Send Any Trains Eastward from City of Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 11—East-bound passenger service on the Santa Fe system is tied up and no through trains will leave Los Angeles until the walkout situation of the Big Four Brotherhoods in the Western division ceasing at New York, Calif. is fixed up, it was announced today by General Manager Hubbard of the coast line. The Big Four men quit to enforce their demands that guards be removed from railroad property.

RAILROADS MAY PASS OVER TO GOVERNMENT

Legislation Being Considered to Empower President to Meet Emergency

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11—Chairman Cummins of the senate interstate commerce committee, introduced legislation is under consideration which would empower the president to take over the railroads if transportation became seriously paralyzed.

GRAT DIVIDE CROSSCUT NOW NEARING GOAL

Big Bore is Out Nearly Four Hundred Feet to South of Main Shaft Workings

The crosscut on the 1400 level to the south on the Tonopah Divide mine has reached a distance of 378 feet, according to official report of operations issued Wednesday night of this week. There is yet no sign of the much desired vein, but it is evident that the heading is nearing the objective. Owing to the dip of the vein as judged from the 1000 level it is almost impossible to determine the lay of the ground, and it may be necessary to drive a considerable distance, although the desired goal may be reached almost any day.

The north crosscut has been driven for 170.5 feet and it is expected to pick up a vein almost any time now, and developments are being closely watched by William E. Walters, the efficient superintendent who has had so much to do in placing this property among the list of the big producers of this section of the state.

Shipments continue to be made at the average rate of 50 tons a day and values varying around \$30 a ton are being received in settlement. Official report of operations for the seven day period in question follows:
