MORE BOMB EXPLOSIONS OCCUR SAN BERNARDINO
President Lee Orders Trainmen to Return to Their Duties

ENGINEERS ORDERED TO RETURN TO WORK BY HEAD OF UNION

CLEVELAND, Aug. 12—Members of the trainmen's brotherhood who struck on the Santa Fe have been ordered to return to work.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12—G. E. Travis, general chairman here of the Western and engineering, said he would not and would not order men under his jurisdiction to return to work.

Passenger trains due to arrive here today over the Union Pacific were indefinitely delayed.

He said it was an individual matter with the Brotherhood men left their work as individuals due to hazardous conditions of employment following a statement from the Brotherhood executives that they could leave the work if conditions are hazardous.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12—Reply to an early answer by the union striking shop unions to President Harding's proposal was made in an announcement from the White House.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12—The strike of employes, members of the Big Four Brotherhoods on the West coast Pacific at Oakland, Stockton and other points stalled two overland freights at Stockton and forced the company to declare an absolute embargo on perishables and live stock from all California points.

ODDEN, Aug. 12—Several hundred travelers are still marooned here by reason of the refusal of the Southern Pacific firemen to take out trains and the refusal of yard switchmen, engineers and firemen to operate the switch engines.

The Southern Pacific announced at 12:30 o'clock today the firemen who struck in this district had agreed to return to work.

FATALITIES IN NEW YORK ARE MORE NUMEROUS

Babies and Old Men Lead List, According to Statistics of Health Department

NEW YORK, Aug. 12—Babies who were too young to realize danger and old men who could not move quickly enough to avoid it, headed the list of accidental deaths to 2484 in New York city last year, according to reports received by the health department.

The most important cause of accidental deaths from a numerical standpoint is the automobile, the report continues. Last year 849 persons were killed in this city as a result of automobile accidents.

Almost 12 persons per 100,000, numbering 684 died in falls, says the report; 163 from scalds and burnings and 138 from fire escapes and windows.
