POLITICAL CAMPAIGNS ON IN CALIFORNIA

Senatorial and Gubernatorial Candidates Vigorous in Seeking Seats

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Aug. 19.—(By the Associated Press)—Vigorous campaigning by senatorial and gubernatorial candidates was the feature of the weeks preceding California's primary election, which will be held on Aug. 29 and at which candidates will be nominated for complete state ticket and for all county offices.

Virtual last-minute injection into the pre-primary campaign of a republican opponent against United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson, who had been expected to have a clear field so far as the republican nomination was concerned, aroused old-time political antagonisms.

HOT CONTESTS IN IDAHO IS THE PREDICTION

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 19.—Delegates representing the republican, democratic and progressive parties in Idaho will gather in state convention Aug. 22 to choose congressional and state tickets and to adopt state platforms. The republicans will meet in Wallace, the democrats at Hailey, and the progressives at Nampa.

CHINESE IN JAPAN IN FEAR OF DEPORTATION

Government Officials, However, Deny Old Regulation Will Be Invoked

TOKIO, Aug. 19.—Chinese colonies in Japan are greatly excited over the report that 3500 Chinese laborers are to be immediately deported under the old regulation prohibiting foreign laborers working outside of foreign settlements. There are 5,000 Chinese laborers in the country, and such deportation would entail serious hardship for the Chinese, it is thought.

CUBAN CENSORS ARE LENIENT LOVE SCENES

HAVANA, Aug. 19.—Fads of loving embraces, one-minute kisses and kindred screen scenes that skirt the bounds of moral laxity will not be passed on by the newly created Cuban board of moving picture censorship.

Only those films which might turn movie palaces into Eugin's schools of crime are to be banned by the censor according to an order signed by Ricardo Landa, secretary of government, creating a censorship board of five and outlining the limits of its authority.

NEW POSTAGE DESIGNS ARE DECIDED UPON

Changes Not Made With View Of Assisting Collectors in Securing Ideas

MEXICO NOT EXCITED ABOUT LEAGUE'S PLAN

No Indication That Overtures Will Be Made to Gain Admittance

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 19.—The indications of Mexico's status as being considered in the league of nations circles, as shown in Geneva dispatches to the Associated Press, were received with interest in newspaper circles here, but there was no inclination to believe the Mexican government would make formal overtures for admission to the league.

WYOMINGITES CONTESTING FOR GOVERNORSHIP

U. S. Senatorship Fight May Be One of the Most Sensational in the Great Oil State

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 19.—Interest in Wyoming's primary election Aug. 22 centers in the contests in both the republican and democratic parties for the gubernatorial nomination. The United States senatorship is not an issue in the primary for the reason that there is only one candidate in each party for the nomination—Frank W. Mondel, floor leader of the national house of representatives, republican, and John D. Kendrick, incumbent, democrat, who seeks reelection.

Robert D. Carey, incumbent, has been challenged for the republican nomination for governor by John W. Hoy of Rock Springs. The issue between the two men has been over the matter of economy in state government expenditures.

The democratic contest for governor is between William B. Ross, the straight party candidate, and Frank McDowell, endorsed by the conference for progressive political action, the farmer-labor movement.

BROTHERHOOD STRIKE OFF ON COAST LINES

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19.—The strike of the "big four" brotherhoods on the coast lines of the Santa Fe system has been called off and freight and passenger service will be resumed immediately.

THREATENING AUSTRIA

VIENNA, Aug. 19.—The financial crisis in Austria is growing daily in intensity and rumblings are heard forecasting a catastrophe unless means are found to remedy the situation. There is business stagnation as more shops close their doors daily.

IRISH CITIES SCENES OF HARD FIGHT

DUBLIN, Aug. 19.—There was heavy firing all last night throughout the city of Dublin between national army forces and republican irregulars. Free State troops on patrol duty were fired at by snipers and machine gunners who attacked national army posts in various parts of the city.

DUBLIN, Aug. 19.—Military authorities today warned citizens to remain indoors this evening, as they have reason to believe the republicans contemplate attacks in certain places in Dublin city and county.

BELFAST, Aug. 19.—A spirited fight of four hours duration occurred between national troops and republican irregulars at Dungannon, on the South Armagh border. Republicans finally fled across the border with the Free Staters in pursuit.

The northern government has prohibited the circulation of the Irish Catholic, a Dublin weekly newspaper, throughout Ulster for one month as the result of its attack on the northern judiciary.

BELFAST, Aug. 19.—Irregulars last night blew up one of the most important bridges in west Ireland, which spans the River Shannon, near Arick on the Shannon. Nationalist troops made a surprise attack on Lake Island in County Roscommon and captured nine irregulars, together with arms and a quantity of food supplies. The place is believed to have been used as a base of supplies for the insurgents.

TO AUCTION SURPLUS SHIPPING SUPPLIES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The United States shipping board through the Emergency Fleet corporation will conduct auctions of surplus property at New Orleans on Aug. 21 and at Beaumont, Texas, on Aug. 23. The material offered at New Orleans includes hand tools, pumps, tanks, ship telegraphs, pipe fittings, life rafts and miscellaneous ship equipment.
