DEMOCRATIC MISRULE BEING EXPOSED

The campaign is upon us in all its fury and southern Nevada is being invaded by candidates seeking office, as both the hands of the republicans and democrats. The people of Tonopah will have an opportunity Wednesday night of being enlightened regarding affairs, both nationally and state, when a mass meeting will be held at the Barber theater when will be addressed by Hon. John H. Miller, candidate for governor, Harry H. Atkinson, candidate for attorney general, and Hon. Sam S. Arvink, at present congressman from this state. There will be other prominent speakers, as well as county candidates, and the meeting promises to be one of the most interesting ever held in this section of the state.

The plans of J. G. Scruggs, state engineer, that economy has been practiced under democratic management and who is a candidate for governor on the democratic ticket, have been shattered through statistics which were gathered from the office of the state treasurer. Instead of a saving having been effected the cost of conducting the state engineer's office has increased from \$200,000 to \$250,000 in three years. William Kearney, former state engineer, who is exposing the extravagance of the Scruggs regime, presents facts and figures that are incontrovertible and the people of this state are waking up to the necessity of bringing about a change in the management of their affairs down in Carson City, where the wildest extravagance has prevailed for some years.

John H. Miller, candidate for governor on the republican ticket, is meeting with generous receptions in every place that he visits, and he has pledged an economical administration to the taxpayers. When he is inducted into office Mr. Miller is a conservative and successful business man, and when he assumes charge of the reins of government the people can rest assured that he will insist that accounting be made for every dollar of the finances of the state. There will be no sinecure berths at the state capital, where a horde of officeholders sit around and toast their toes and where state money is scattered to the winds and one particular section is favored. He believes the whole state should receive consideration in the allotment of money appropriated by the legislature.

Harry H. Atkinson, Tonopah attorney, who is seeking the office of attorney general, is the man who will be needed at Carson City to assist Mr. Miller in guarding the state treasury. He is conservative and a stickler for law and justice and will look after the legal end of the management of state affairs in the same conservative manner that he and Mr. Miller would and to apply to their own individual affairs. The republicans offer the strongest ticket that was ever presented to the voters of this state. This applies nationally, state and local, and it would be well if the voters and taxpayers scrutinize the ticket and make up their minds that we need a change in the management of state affairs in no other way can we bring about the economy that is so essential at this time.

MINING OUTLOOK IMPROVES

According to a statistical report in the Financial Review of Sept. 2, the lowest supplies in over 50 years, of marketable, or refined, primary silver, about 2,900,000 ounces or less were in the hands of all United States on July 1, 1922. Total inventories on hand have shrunk 15,000,000 ounces since May 14, 1920.

So cleaned out of any material on hand are the refiners of primary silver, says the article, that in June and July they delivered barely 5,000,000 ounces to the mint, whereas the Pittman act permits them to sell to the mint about 11,000,000 ounces.

The price of zinc has advanced to over 7 cents per pound, lead is up and copper is staying around 14 cents, says Manufacturer.

This renewed activity in the mines means business for every section of the west.

The question of labor is, however, becoming a more difficult matter. Underground mining has become increasingly distasteful; miners have emigrated to the oil fields and the great automobile centers of the middle west. The 3 per cent immigration restriction has greatly curtailed
