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DEMOCRATS KEEP OUTSIDE RESIDENT IN BERTH

It is supposed that George Smith, chairman of the Nevada Industrial Insurance Commission, will come back to Nevada to vote at least a few of the democrats believe that he will be here when needed. George, who stepped on of the governor's office where he acted as private secretary, and the chairmanship of the insurance commission, did not receive a salary of \$4,000 per annum.

At that time he received \$3,000 per annum, but in 1921 he received \$4,000. Later through a vote of the commission and attorney general, he was elected to \$5,000 per annum. Then George managed to receive a \$10,000 and most of his time is devoted to private affairs in the east.

Some six or seven months ago the salary was cut to \$2,000 per annum. Then Smith became interested in California and most of his time was devoted to private affairs there.

Some eight months since he concluded to remove to California, but he expressed a willingness to do the state's business as chairman of the Nevada industrial insurance commission at a salary of \$3,000 a year, with the understanding that he was to make periodic visits to the state to supervise commission affairs.

And so the matter stands. Smith lives in California with his family, has an actual residence in this state, but he comes to Carson City every month, occupies his official chair in the capitol during his stay and draws his \$2,500 per month salary check.

Andy Stinson, the republican member of the industrial insurance board, insisted that the appointee should be a 100 per cent Nevada and that whoever he be that he secure a 100 per cent compensation. He has often stated that if the office holder for a \$2,000 man, that he should be named and put on the job. He maintains there are plenty of Nevada boys, at taxes here and living here, who can hold down the job.

His plea has gone against state walls and Mr. Smith continues to give part time service for part time pay, but he always lands in time to sign on for that \$2,500 per month, as will be him by the democratic members of the board.

A FEW WORDS ABOUT ANDY J. STINSON

Every mining man in Nevada knows Andy J. Stinson, who for the past eight years has held the position to which he is asking reelection at the hands of the voters.
