U. S. MARINES ARE ON DUTY AT FOCHOW

Assist British and Japanese in Guarding Interests of Fukien Capital

YMOY, China, Oct. 17.—American, British and Japanese marines are guarding foreign interests at Fochow, the capital of Fukien Province, where a recent upheaval resulted in the flight of Governor Li Hui Chi and all other officials representing the Peking government, according to an official report received here.

RETRENCHMENT PLAN FACES DIFFICULTIES

TOKYO, Oct. 17. The Kato cabinet is facing trouble. No sooner had it started to carry out its scheme of retrenchment than the Seiyukai, the largest party in the diet, demanded that its policy of spending large sums on railways in subsidies for schools and harnessing the waterways should be dropped. Premier Kato, naturally anxious to meet their wishes as far as possible, promised to consider the matter, pointing out, however, that this would be difficult in view of the cabinet's decision to cut all estimates 25 per cent. Mr. Tanaka, the minister of finance, threatened to resign if the retrenchment policy was interfered with. Count Okuma, minister of railways, supports the demands of the party for new railroad construction, while Dr. Mikano, home minister, takes a similar stand regarding improvement of waterways. If the demands of all departments are met, there will be little saving in the annual expenditure.

DANCERS IN MANILA MUST HAVE ESCORTS

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 17. The municipal council of Caloocan, Pasay, San Juan and San Pedro Macabes, towns in the province of Rizal, which adjoin Manila, have passed ordinances barring all ballerinas (professional dancers) from entering dance halls in any of these municipalities unless accompanied by escorts. Several years ago the Manila municipal board established all dance halls from the city, but they sprang up just outside the city limits. Secretary Cecilio of the province of Rizal said the purpose of the ordinance requiring dancing girls to have escorts is to discourage cabarets and dance halls which allow women to dance in consideration of gifts of a poeta (10 cents) or more from their partners for each dance.

ROSETTA PLANNING LARGE DEVELOPMENT

D. F. Murphy, general manager of the Reorganized Rosetta Divide, has issued a circular letter to the stockholders in which he announces an assessment of 1 cent on the stock. This assessment is No. 4. Some time ago the Rosetta and the Goldsmith, both controlled by the same interests, secured claims in the Hornsilver district, but owing to the dull conditions they made little effort to work the claims. Work is now under way and the development of the Hornsilver claims is to be carried out. In his circular letter Murphy says: "The Hornsilver ore, notwithstanding the name of the district, carries mostly gold. Both the properties of the Rosetta and the Goldsmith Divide company, adjoining have remarkable gold showings and the chances of opening ore shoots without great expense are unusually good. I have not abandoned my faith in the Divide property of the Rosetta company. On the contrary, I am more convinced than ever that we shall yet make a big producer there. During all of our exploration we continually found encouraging values in attractive formations, and on several occasions it was believed we had found pay shoots. It seems probable, however, that additional exploration should be by means of deeper mining, and in view of the heavy expense attending such operations, the board of directors has thought best to wait for more interest in mining and to depend upon the work of other companies in that district. The board is convinced unanimously, however, that the Hornsilver group fully warrants further development, and the board believes that with such developments conditions will appear that will create a popular demand for Rosetta shares. The Rosetta company has machinery and equipment to go ahead with these operations without additional outlay on that account, and it is expected that the returns from this assessment will supply ample funds to make a demonstration that will insure the continuous operation of the property."
