SULTAN TURKEY TO BE DEPOSED BY THIS LAW

Nationalist Assembly Passes Law Suppressing Sultanate of the Country

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 3.—It is reported that the nationalist assembly at Ankara has passed a law suppressing the sultanate of Turkey and the deposition of the sultan to be effected in a dispatch to the emperor. The telegraph from Constantinople which action means that the sultan will be deposed.

ELECTION GREAT INTEREST AMONG PEOPLE NATION

Republicans Expect to Gain Additional Strength in the House and Senate

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—America's barometer of political and public opinion will be read at the polls Tuesday, Nov. 7, when another national house of representatives, more than a third of the senate membership and 32 governors of states, together with state legislatures and local officials will be chosen.

Nationally the general election Tuesday is the first of the Harding administration and thus is regarded by many as a test, bearing upon the next presidential campaign. The republican will go before the country largely on the record of President Harding and the present congress, an issue accepted by their democratic and other opponents.

Excepting in Maine, where the elections were held last September, the new 68th congress of 435 members will be chosen Tuesday from all states. Thirty-seven senators in 34 states also will be elected. The battle of ballots throughout the country largely is between the two dominant parties, republican and democratic. Congressional candidates mostly are for the 68th congress which will not assemble until December, 1923, unless a special session next summer should be called. Of the 37 senatorial seats at issue, 22 are for regular terms of six years beginning in the next congress and five to fill vacancies by death and resignation. In addition to the 435 members of the next house to be chosen there are three to fill vacancies in the coming winter session, two from Nebraska and one from Illinois. A turnover of more than 80 seats is required for loss of the next house by the republicans. Democratic leaders have said that only a miracle would change the political complexion of the next senate at this election.

WILL TRANSFER ASTOR WEALTH GREAT BRITAIN

John Jacob Astor Pays Six Million for Northcliffe's Interest in London Times

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The remark made yesterday by Major John Jacob Astor of 11 rue de Valenciennes, was interpreted as a transfer of his wealth in America to this country. It was reported that he had bought the London Times for \$6,000,000. Astor is considered for a seat in parliament. He is a brother of Viscount Astor.

NEW YORK Nov. 3.—Viscount Astor and John Jacob Astor inherited \$5,000,000 from William Waldorf Astor.

Among the most frequent appeal is that the league make the world bone dry, suppress tobacco as well as all drugs and drinks; that it institute a universal religion.

Jack Kennedy and Harvey Logan Killed after Robbing a Mail Car

WITENBERG, Mo., Nov. 3.—Jack Kennedy, veteran train robber and Harvey Logan, a former railroad worker, were shot dead early today after robbing the mail car of a Frisco train. The stolen mail and 100 registered letters were recovered. Inspectors learned of the attempt to rob the train and planted an extra force of shotgun men on the train and kept a watch on the automobile of Kennedy and Logan. The inspector said the amount of letters taken was unknown but said there was an unfounded assertion that the amount was \$200,000. Eleven officers waited near the bandits' automobile and commanded the bandits to hold up their hands. The robbers reached for their weapons and were shot down. The robbers had halted the train near here cutting off the mail car and stealing the mail. Kennedy had a record of seven robberies and had served 12 years in the penitentiary.

PROCLAMATION THANKSGIVING BY PRESIDENT

Gratifying Progress Toward Permanent Peace Results and Confidence Better

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3.—Declaring the estate of the nation "presents very much to justify a nationwide and most sincere testimony of gratitude for the bounty which has been bestowed upon us," President Harding's annual Thanksgiving proclamation calls on the American people to observe Thursday, Nov. 30 as a "day of thanks." It says: "We have seen a race of giving, supplication and devotion," mankind make gratifying progress toward permanent peace, toward order and restored confidence to its high destiny."

POPE HAD INTEREST FASCISTI SUCCESS

ROME, Nov. 3.—The Pope gave intense interest to every phase of the revolution bringing the fascisti into power, often repeating the desire that it be bloodless. He remarked no revolution could merely change the government. The vatican policy will continue with dignity, silence and aloofness toward the government.

The bronze figure stands more than 13 feet in height, placed on a pedestal of granite eight feet high.

SILVER PICK IS WELL FINANCED ORE SHIPMENTS

Over Eighty Thousand Was Received from Shipments of Ore to Belmont Mill

The Silver Pick company has just issued its annual statement covering the period from September, 1921 to September, 1922. The accounts show that \$80,969.20 was received from the sale of ore. Out of this was paid \$42,703.51 for mine expenses, \$14,595.05 for milling and \$5431.01 for freight and royalties amounting to \$11,029.22 making a total of \$74,807.79. This leaves \$6150.41 as profit out of which was paid administration expenses. The cash in banks amount to \$13,134. but assessment No. 26 was collected during the year. This amounted to \$14,999.54. The sum of \$1440 was spent for new machinery and office rent. The expenses of the San Francisco and Goldfield offices were \$365.33. Accompanying the financial report is one by Superintendent Matt Murphy. Of the new lease in the combination he says: "Some ore is being saved and there is 50 tons of \$25 ore ready for shipment. This ore was discovered when prospecting in the footwall country of the famous Ish-Sheets lease ground, at a depth of 150 feet and is probably a footwall vein with conditions similar to those found in the Red Top claim.
