ALLIED COMMISSIONERS FIRM IN THEIR STAND Noted Woman Dies In Massachusetts At Age Of Ninety-One

MARY LOCKWOOD DIES AT HOME OLD PLYMOUTH

Was Known as "Little Mother of Daughters of the American Revolution"
WAS ALSO NOTED AUTHORESS
Was Daughter of Famous Smith Family, Founders of Noted Smith College

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Nov. 10.—Mrs. Mary Smith Lockwood, 91 founder of the Daughters of the American Revolution, died here today. Mrs. Mary S. Lockwood "Little Mother of the Daughters of the American Revolution" was the last survivor of the little group of 18 women patriots who organized that body more than 30 years ago, and despite her nearly full century of years she was one of the most active members of the organization almost up to the time of her last illness.

Not only was Mrs. Lockwood identified with the founding and the progress of the D. A. R. but she was an active figure in the Women's republican organization, and also a noted author. Her chronicles of Washington history, especially diplomatic and political, have secured her well up on the rolls of fame.

Mary Lockwood was born at Chautauque, N. Y., in 1831, a daughter of the famous Smith family, founders of Smith college. While the life of Mrs. Lockwood has been replete with many interesting accomplishments, the outstanding work of her career was the founding of the D. A. R.

JOHN H. MILLER CONGRATULATES J. G. SCRUGHAM

Promises to Co-Operate With Incoming Executive in All Economy Programs

John H. Miller, defeated republican candidate for governor, sent a letter of congratulation to his successful democratic opponent, Col. J. G. Scrugham. An assured him of his desire to cooperate with and support him in any program of state economy he may suggest to the next legislature, of which Mr. Miller will be a holdover senator.

Senator Miller issued the following statement Thursday in which appreciation is expressed to his friends and supporters throughout the state for their expressions of confidence expressed at the polls Tuesday.

"The returns from all sections of the state indicate the election of Col. J. G. Scrugham as the next governor of Nevada by a substantial majority. The people of the state have spoken and we must abide by their decision. At this time I wish to publicly express my appreciation to my friends and supporters for their confidence as indicated at the polls. I feel that we made a good, clean fight and lost, and I feel no animosity over the results.

"My campaign trip over the state was a revelation to me. One cannot begin to appreciate the vastness of this inland empire of ours or realize its possibilities for future agricultural and mineral development without traversing it. While the verdict of the voters has gone against me I feel that this has been more than overcome by the new friendships formed and the old friendships that have been cemented as a result of personal contact with men and women in all walks of life.

"With election a matter of history and the result established beyond any possibility of doubt, it now is up to the republicans of the state to get back all beneficial legislation and any program of state economy that the incoming administration may suggest or propose. At the same time I feel that we will be romans in our duty as citizens and taxpayers if we do not insist that the affairs of the state during the next four years are conducted on a more business like and more economical basis.

ROUNDUP REBELS RESULTS DEATH MEX BANDITS

General Juan Carrasco, Leader Rebellious Faction, Meets Death State Sinaloa

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 10.—A roundup of rebels who have menaced the power of President Obregon has snuffed out the life of General Juan Carrasco, leader of the rebellious factions along the west coast, particularly in the state of Sinaloa. He was killed yesterday with seven of his men in a battle with federal forces at Guamuchilito, in the state of Durango.

DEPORTATION OF BRIDE ASKED BY HUSBAND

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 10.—Mery Dorko wants his bride of ten weeks deported to Budapest, Hungary, from where he brought her, because she refuses to come to Cleveland to share a newly furnished apartment with him. Dorko married the woman on August 26, he told the inspector in charge of the immigration bureau here, after a two years' courtship by mail. Immediately after the ceremony Dorko said his wife told him she never wanted to see him again.

RETURNS FROM ELECTION NOT YET COMPLETED

While complete returns have not yet been received concerning the election of Tuesday, there seems to be little question concerning the election of Joseph T. Murphy, democrat, for the office of district attorney. Mr. Murphy has a total of 999 votes, which includes the five Tonopah and 13 outside precincts, while Charles A. DeFlon, republican, is second with 905 and William Forman, third, with 855. Mrs. Gilbert, republican, for county auditor and recorder, has 1491 votes and Mrs. Jennie A. Curieux, democrat, has 1306 or a difference of 85 votes. In the race for the assembly, it seems that W. A. Marsh and Louise M. Hayes, democrats are elected, and that Charles D. Keough, republican, is elected, while the contest between D. J. Robb democrat and Mrs. Teresa I. Henderson, is close, the former having 1459 and the latter 1497 votes.

There are yet eight precincts to hear from with a total outstanding vote of 120. These are all expected to be heard from either by tonight or tomorrow morning with the possible exception of Sharps, which may not arrive until Monday. The absent precincts are Sharps, Hot Creek, Sunnyside, Ash Meadows, Fahrump, Johnnie, Belmont and Arrowhead.

WORK RESUMED ON CALIFORNIA SHAFT WORKINGS

Retimbering of Thousand-Foot Shaft is to Be Hurried to Final Conclusion

Operations were resumed this morning on the property of the New Tonopah California Mining company, with Roy K. Brown, engineer in charge of development. C. W. Geddes, well known mining engineer, who concluded negotiations with the Stall brothers, whereby eastern capitalists become heavily interested, announced that a hoist man and four miners had started the task of repairing the main shaft and placing it in the very best possible condition, and the work is to be hurried to completion. The shaft, which has a depth of 1000 feet, will be repaired down to the very lowest working, following which development will be started on the various levels with a view of inaugurating shipments at as early a date as possible.

LIEUTENANT OF DE VALERA IN NET OF ENEMY

Dublin Again Scene of Heavy Firing in Various Parts Of the City

BELFAST, Nov. 10.—Erskine Childers, one of the chief lieutenants of Eamon De Valera, in the republican movement was captured by free state forces at Wicklow. It is officially announced.

DUBLIN, Nov. 10.—Heavy firing crackled in the various parts of the city last night. Irregulars renewed their attack upon Wellington barracks and also fired upon Port O'Bellow barracks. Two civilians were found dead on a suburban road and two soldiers lay wounded in the center of the city.

JUDGE GEORGE BARTLETT HEARS APPEAL CASE

Judge George Bartlett of Reno, arrived in Tonopah this morning to occupy the bench in the district court, sitting for Judge Mark R. Averill, who voluntarily vacated in order that a hearing might be had upon the appeal from the justice court of Tonopah in the case of the people of the state of Nevada against Mike Lokanovich, who was fined \$50. An appeal was taken by defendant and the hearing will decide finally the merits of the sentence imposed.

STEAMER IS BURNING ON GULF OF MEXICO

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 10.—The freight steamer M. J. Nola, which plies between New Orleans and Houston, Texas, is said by wireless to be burning in the Gulf of Mexico, 40 miles from the mouth of the Mississippi river.

RELEASE OF FOREIGN VESSELS IS ORDERED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 10.—Release of all foreign vessels seized outside of the American three mile limit with liquor aboard, where there is no evidence of communication with shore by means of the vessel's own boats, was today ordered by Secretary Mellon.

BRITISH MONEY IS TO HANDLE COAST GRAPES

Latest Type Ventilated Refrigerator Ships Will Be Built For That Purpose

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—The British government stands ready to move California's grape crop in the latest type ventilated refrigerator ships, which will be built especially for the grape trade, E. M. Sheehan, president of the California Grapegrowers' exchange announced today. A preliminary investment of forty million pounds sterling has been pledged by the British government for construction of ships which, through a series of payments, will become the property of the growers in ten years, Sheehan said.

BLAIRS HAVE SON

A new banker arrived in Tonopah this afternoon at the home of E. W. Blair, cashier of the Tonopah Banking corporation. The youngster weighed 10 pounds and he put in appearance at 1 o'clock and was given complete possession of the house. Mother and infant reported as getting along fine, with hopes held out for the head of the family. This makes two boys and a girl that have arrived to bless the Blair home.

PROMINENT ACTRESS MAY PEDDLE DOPE

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Cissie Loftus, for more than 20 years a well known actress on the stages of both Great Britain and the United States, was today arraigned in police court accused with being an unauthorized person in possession of morphine and atropine. She appears to be ill. Through her counsel she pleaded not guilty.

LEGAL HOLIDAY IS ON FOR TOMORROW

Tomorrow is a legal holiday, and Armistice day will be observed throughout the land. Nevada people will commemorate the ending of the late world war, and in Tonopah public offices and banks will cease doing business for the day. Simplicity will mark the occasion in this community and the residents will quietly pay homage to the loved ones who gave their all and to the surviving heroes who reside among us.

COMMISSION ON GREAT BOULDER DAM TO MEET

Will Hold Session at Santa Fe, N. M., With Governors and Secretary Hoover

Governor-elect J. G. Scrugham left Wednesday for Santa Fe, N. M., where he will attend a meeting of the Colorado river commission. What probably is to be this country's greatest single project of internal development will be formulated when the commission holds a two to three weeks' session at Santa Fe.

The federal government through Secretary of Commerce Hoover and government aides and the seven states of the Colorado river basin, through their executive officials and others will devise a treaty to govern future power, irrigation and flood developments in the entire region embracing 242,000 separate miles of American territory and 2900 square miles in Mexico.

Agreement of Mexico will be undertaken through treaty negotiations. The Santa Fe conference agreement will be submitted at their January sessions. With ratification by congress it will become law.

Nevada wants power for its mines and for pumping water for irrigation. California is interested primarily in power for Los Angeles and other southern California industries. Arizona primarily seeks power for its mining operations with some irrigation development.

New Mexico's interest is in irrigation. Utah seeks power for its coal, iron and aluminum operations. Wyoming wants irrigation in the upper river area.

The entire territory wants power for the railroad electrification.

The Santa Fe conference will not undertake plans for actual development, but will clear away the obstacles that now stand in the way of development and threaten endless years of litigation.

MEXICAN IS STRICKEN WITH APPENDICITIS

Jose Marmalajo, a Mexican, employed at the Victor shaft, was stricken with gangrenous and ruptured appendix and rushed to the Mine Operators hospital and operated on early this morning. The patient suffered nearly a week, but kept at work until the appendix ruptured, when he was compelled to consult a physician as a result of the excruciating pain. While recovering satisfactory his condition is yet serious.

WALKOUT UNCHANGED

The Goldfield walkout remains unchanged, according to reports received in Tonopah this morning. The men are obdurate and the operators show no inclination to grant any increase in wages.

REPEAL MANY MEASURES NOW IS DEMANDED

Measures Relating to Customs and Public Debt Come Under Stipulations

MUST INSURE SAFETY TROOPS

Allied Generals Arrange Meeting with Rafet Pasha, An-gora Commander

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 10.—The allied high commissions handed a note today to the An-gora government representatives here demanding the repeal of all measures relating to customs, public debt and sanitary and other services which conflict with the capitulations and stipulations of the Mudros armistice agreement of 1918. Other wise, the note says, the commissions will be compelled to refer to their governments for necessary action. The allied generals also arranged a meeting with Rafet Pasha, nationalist governor here, to whom they will submit the minimum demands with a view of securing the safety of troops and of direct control of the political government.

CALLED TO CARSON CITY AS WITNESSES IN TRIAL

E. W. Blair, cashier of the Tonopah Banking corporation; L. W. Horton, assistant cashier of the Nevada First National Bank of Tonopah, and A. W. Newberry, mining engineer, left this afternoon for Carson City. At the state capital Messrs. Blair and Horton will appear as witnesses in a case in the federal court wherein Thomas J. Lynch is plaintiff and E. J. Roberts is defendant. The suit is an outgrowth of a stock division in the old Belcher Divisid Mining company, but has nothing to do what ever with the Reorganized Belcher Divisid Mining company.

RICHARDSON IS GAINING VOTES IN CALIFORNIA

Majority Will Probably Reach Two Hundred Thousand With Final Count

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—With 5255 precincts in tabulations given against the Wright prohibition act a majority of 24,627 votes. For governor, Richardson has a plurality of 173,891 over Woodrow. For senator, Hiram Johnson has a plurality of 303,951.
