REPUBLICANS TO CONTROL NEXT LEGISLATURE

The voters of Nevada voted their sentiments at the election held on Tuesday of last week, and made it plain that they do not care for extravagance in state affairs, and the majority are entitled to rule under the laws of this land, and we must bow to the inevitable. However, Governor-elect J. G. Serrano, throughout the campaign, pledged economy, frugality, and that he will make good on these promises. If he shows such a willingness he will find ready cooperation among the republican members of the legislature, which will be controlled by that party. Reports from the election show that the republicans will have 23 members in the lower house and 9 in the senate, as against 10 in the assembly and eight in the senate for the democrats.

Republican members of assembly have a solemn duty to perform and that is to proceed with their program of retrenchment. Work has already gone forth among the members that appropriations are to be slashed right and left and the business of the state brought down to a two-cent level of soundness. Therefore, it may be expected that with the close of the coming session of the assembly there will be a substantial reduction in all departments of state, not however permitting educational institutions to suffer. This means that a horde of useless officers and clerks may expect to be looking for new positions early in March 1923, and that those retained will be expected to return at full day's work for the salaries that they receive.

There will be no attempt on the part of the republicans to cripple any department of state. On the other hand they will labor for the enactment of laws that will redound to the good of the commonwealth, and which will result in Nevada being placed again among the sound state governments that capital may be induced to lessen the purse strings that our great resources, mining, agriculture and livestock may be thoroughly developed. In order to bring about the desired results taxes must be reduced to a minimum, and the past wild extravagance brought to an abrupt ending. This the republicans propose doing.

FOREST SERVICE BUILDS MANY MILES ROAD

During the past year the forest service, United States Department of Agriculture, constructed 724 miles of minor roads at a cost of \$540,868 and 2959 miles of trails at a cost of \$519,429.

Three hundred and eighty miles of major roads were constructed for the forest service by the bureau of public roads at a cost of \$4,620,326. In addition 3997 miles of major and minor projects were maintained at a cost of \$1,871,162 of which \$65,436 was secured from local authorities. Forty-two hundred and ninety-four miles of trails were maintained at a cost of \$1,139,883. This represents a total expenditure for the construction of roads and trails during the year 1921 of \$6,450,694, which includes \$2,153,522 co-operative funds secured from states and counties.

Expenditures to Jan. 1, 1922, for constructing 3729 miles of major roads total \$15,301,373 of which \$5,681,451 are co-operative funds. Likewise 4856 miles of minor roads were constructed by the service at a cost of \$2,732,970 including \$773,922 of co-operative funds. To date \$1,917,169 have been expended in the construction and maintenance of 12,448 miles of trails. The total thus far expended upon equipment amounts to \$651,968 while \$929,134 was expended upon overhead and administration by the bureau of public roads and forest service.

To date a total expenditure of \$22,216,724 for the construction of 4786 miles of roads, 6211 miles of trails and the maintenance of 3997 miles of roads and 5737 miles of trails has been made.

SHOULD BE RELEGATED

It seems altogether likely that too much public attention has been given to the subject of repayment of the debts due from European countries to the United States. This has probably been due to the fact that on this side of the Atlantic a number of prominent men have been making speeches advocating some kind of cancellation of the debts in whole or in part. Naturally when such a policy is advocated by Americans, a vigorous protest is aroused, and the subject receives more or less animated discussion.

Every utterance from high official sources in those countries owing large amounts to the United States contains an assurance that there is no intention to try to evade payment of one cent of the debt. The latest declaration on that subject has come from the new chancellor of the exchequer of Great Britain who asserts that "our first duty will be to settle our debt to America. To the last penny we are going to pay it." Several months ago similar assertions were made by French officials concerning the debt of France to the United States.

LONG DISTANCE FLIGHTS MACREADY AND KELLY

Lieutenants John Macready and Oakley Kelly coursed 2100 miles in their army monoplane in 25 hours and 17 minutes. Over practically the whole distance from San Diego to Fort Benjamin Harrison, near Indianapolis, Ind., their radiator was dead and part of the voyage was through storms. Had the machinery of the plane not been defective they could easily have made the unfinished 700 miles of their trip in about seven hours and would have crossed the continent by a long air route without stopping.

Macready and Kelly have proved that they can fly from the Pacific to the Atlantic. They surely will succeed in their next expedition, and they will sail from ocean to ocean in practically the same time the fastest trains run between Chicago or St. Louis and New York.

Macready holds the world's aviation records for distance, duration and altitude. American, through the army, also holds the world's speed records.

These demonstrations are spectacular to the public, but they are of great practical utility. They prove the safety of aerial navigation and the superiority of the plane. The weight carried by Macready and Kelly indicate the possibilities for passenger and freight traffic by air.

As a result of these flights we shall have airplane lines for passengers, for distances of 750 to 1500 miles. The day is not far off when passengers can have breakfast in New York City, lunch in Chicago or St. Louis and dinner in a Rocky mountain city. In fact it will be possible to have breakfast in New York City and dinner in Seattle, San Francisco or Los Angeles.

SHIPMENTS OF BULLION SHOW BIG INCREASE

Tonopah Belmont Forging to Front as One of Great Producers of the West

LARGE DEVELOPMENT STARTS

Company Planning on Augmenting Output While Silver Remains Stationary

Tonopah Belmont Development company shipped bullion during the month of October amounting to \$164,235. The heaviest production was made during the last half of the month when the output amounted to \$84,000, while the first half the bullion was worth \$80,235.

This company is gradually enlarging the scope of development, and extensive development is being carried forward on seven different levels. The physical condition of the mine is improving from week to week, and now that all fear of labor disputes has been eliminated as long as silver remains at \$1 per ounce, effort is to be made to increase the output.
