DIVORCING S. P. FROM C. P. IS HARMFUL TO WEST Waters of Colorado River are Allocated to Seven States

ACT MUST BE APPROVED BY ALL THE STATES

Herbert Hoover, Who Successfully Negotiated the Allocation, Westward Bound

LITIGATION IS PREVENTED
Great Westerner Will Make Return to President Upon Return to Capitol

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 25.—Having successfully directed the negotiation treaty among the seven western states, first of its kind, and allocating the waters of a river, the third largest in the United States, and so it is believed, preventing years of expensive litigation, Herbert Hoover, chairman of the Colorado river commission, left here today for his home in California for a short visit before returning to Washington to report to the president. The seven states must ratify the pact to make it effective and it also must be approved by congress. It affects Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico and Wyoming.

PRIZE WINNER, SCHOOL PLAY PLEASURES MANY

Parents and Admirers of Students Attend Play in Gym

The high school gymnasium was filled to capacity last evening with the parents, students and admirers of the children who took part in the second of a series of programs in which the high school and grades were represented. The exercises were highly interesting and the grace and skill of the young people showed careful and painstaking training on the part of their teachers. The program included folk dancing by the tots of the fourth grade; an Irish jig and Indian dance by older grade boys; a calisthenic drill and a military drill by high school boys; and a Thanksgiving song by children of the second grade. A very clever skit closed the program, entitled: "The Prize Winner," played by high school students, all of the participants equipping themselves in a most pleasing manner. The exercises were followed by dancing, and the floor was filled with happy young people who danced until after midnight to the strains of a three-piece orchestra.

CHILD OUTLINES POLICY OF U. S. IN NEAR EAST

LAUSANNE, Nov. 25.—Richard Washburn Child, chief American spokesman at the Near East conference, amazed the other delegations at this morning's session by reiterating the insistence of the United States upon an open door policy in Turkey. PEKING, Nov. 25.—Premier Wang Chung-Hui has resigned. The resignation of the entire cabinet has been in the hands of President Li Yuan Yang since the arrest a week ago of Lu Wenli Kan, finance minister, on charges of accepting a personal commission in connection with the negotiation of a pre-war loan with Austrian and German capitalists.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—The Western Pacific was today authorized by the state railroad commission to issue and sell \$5,500,000 in first mortgage 4 per cent bonds at not less than \$92 for the purchase of 2000 new steel refrigerator cars and 1000 automobile cars.

POOR MAN STRIKES OIL; WILL BUILD TWO CHURCHES

MONROE, La., Nov. 25.—W. A. MacKenzie of Sumner, Ark. in the heart of a new oil field, three months ago a poor man but now a wealthy oil operator as the result of the discovery of oil on his land, has decided to donate \$100,000 for the erection of two churches at Sumner, as a life appreciation for his riches.

EXECUTION BILL PUBLISHED

LONDON, Nov. 25.—A bill setting up execution in the Irish free state, known as the execution act, was published here today. It provides for the temporary continuation of the present system of taxation, and gives the Irish free state power to adopt acts applicable to other dominions.

ESTEEMED MAN OF TONOPAH IS CALLED BY DEATH

Rosellas R. Garcia, Pioneer and Empire Builder, Is Dead

This afternoon at 2 o'clock all that was mortal of one of Tonopah's most esteemed citizens, Rosellas R. Garcia, passed to his Maker. The demise of Mr. Garcia has caused a cloud of sorrow in the community, and removed from its midst one of the camp's oldest pioneers and an empire builder of the state.

Yesterday afternoon he was taken suddenly ill with pains in the region of the heart, but improved following treatment; this morning he suffered another sinking spell from which he failed to rally, and succumbed to the inevitable this afternoon. The cause of death was given as rupture of the heart.

The deceased was born at Mazatlan, Mexico, 79 years ago, coming to this country when a small boy. He came to Tonopah in 1902, and up until a few years ago was connected with the Tonopah Lihouor company, and is a part owner at the present time of the splendid stone building of that name. Previous to coming to Tonopah, he resided at Bodie, Calif., and previous to going to Bodie, he had resided in Belmont and Austin. He was a man of the highest character; generous to a fault; an honest and an upright citizen, whose word was his bond, and his loss will be keenly felt by those who knew him for his true worth. He is survived by his widow, to whom he was married 50 years ago; also, by three sons, Rose and Louis of Los Angeles, and Edward of Portland, Ore., and to the bereaved relatives the sympathy of the community is extended. No funeral arrangements will be made pending word from the relatives.

NEW CALIFORNIA RAPIDLY CLEANS MAIN WORKINGS

Actual Mining and Development Work Will Be Resumed Within Short Time

Operations for the week ending November 25, at the New California-Tonopah mine, where work was resumed on November 19, was confined to draining and retrimbering the main working raises and chutes. The raise between the 499 and 600 levels will open a big block of virgin ground as it taps these veins from which leasers, working on the upper levels, extracted so much high grade ore.

It is the intention of the management to begin actual mining and development operations upon completion of work between the 400 and 600 levels as sufficient faces will be exposed from which extraction can be maintained. The lower levels have been put in mining condition and development on the veins which have been crossed will be started.

The placing on the property of a large blacksmith and machine shop and office building has been contracted, and will be ready for occupancy some time during the coming week.

SATISFACTORY SHIPMENTS BY WEST END MINE

Total of 1750 Tons of Ore Broken and Sent to Mill During Week

For the week ending November 25, the West End Mining company produced about 1750 tons of mill ore from the various workings of the property. In breaking this tonnage additional footage of 215 feet was gained. Nothing sensational is contained in the official report, which, however, shows substantial progress with satisfactory results. The regular amount of work was performed in Tonopah 76 ground. The official report follows:

From the West End workings, drift 347 made fair progress on low grade vein material. Drift 404A made fair progress on a fair width of good ore. Crosscut 411-B made fair progress in Mizpah trachyte.

From the Ohio shaft, drift 418 No. 1 made small headway on ore of fair grade. Intermediate drift 510 made good progress without change to report. Drift 536 No. 2 made fair progress on ore of good grade. Raise without change to report. Work was material. Crosscut 553 advanced 540 No. 1 advanced in low grade vein resumed in raise 554 on ore of good grade. Work was resumed in raise 554 on ore of good grade. A small advance was made in drift 555 No. 3. Drift 555 No. 8 made a small advance with no change to report. Drift 805 No. 2 made fair headway on ore. Raise 805 No. 3 cut the ore and stopping operations have been started. Crosscut 862 made the usual advance without change to report.

Regular progress was performed in Tonopah 76 ground with no change to report.

Mill tonnage for the week was about 1750 tons and development footage was 215 feet.

SOLUTION OF RECENT SCANDAL AT HAMMOND

HAMMOND, Ind., Nov. 25.—Prof. John P. Tiernan of South Bend and Mrs. Blanche J. Brimmer of Hansell, Ia., were married today by Justice Howard Kemp at Crown Point, Ind. Prof. Tiernan was divorced Thursday from his wife, and was a principal in the Tiernan-Poulin baby paternity case at South Bend. He gave his age as 32 and his wife's as 24. She was a widow.

CHINESE ATTEMPT TO SMUGGLE INTO COUNTRY

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—An alleged attempt by 14 Chinese to smuggle themselves into this country from the Pacific Mail liner President Taft last night resulted in their being taken to the city prison, it was learned today. An attempt was made to bribe immigration inspectors to allow the Chinese to "lose themselves" in Chinatown here, according to the evidence against them; \$2400 the sum alleged to have been paid as a bribe is being held by immigration authorities.

TONOPAH M. SENDS 1500 TONS TO MILL

Mid-Month Bullion Shipment Delayed Till End of November, Say Officials

Mid-month shipment by the Tonopah Mining company was postponed until the end of the thirty-day period according to the official announcement by H. A. Johnson. During the first half of the month, however, production was up to standard and 1550 tons of ore were sent from the various workings of the mine to the mill for treatment. Values recovered were up to, if not better, than average.

Active development work was pursued from three shafts of the company property. For the week just ended the total development work from the Silver Top, Mizpah and Sand Grass shafts was 129 feet. Workings from the Silver Top shaft produced the largest tonnage, 800 tons of mill ore. Mizpah shaft workings produced 600 tons of mill ore, and the Sand Grass shaft workings, 150 tons of mill ore.

Drift 641 from the Silver Top shaft, was advanced farther during the week than any other workings of the mine. A distance of 28.5 feet was driven on a stringer of low grade ore. From the Mizpah shaft drift 377 was started in westerly direction from raise 377 to prospect the Mizpah fault vein below drift 235, and from the Sand Grass shaft stopping in various parts of the mine produced the weekly tonnage.

The weekly report of production and development follows:

Silver Top
Raise 639 continued 15.5 feet; drift 641 continued westerly 28.5 feet on a small stringer of low grade ore; desert 713 was started from drift 336, Desert Queen, to prospect the downward extension of the orebody formerly mined on the north branch of the south vein. Progress, 12 feet. Development for the week, 56 feet.

Stopping was continued on the various veins in this section of the property and produced 800 tons of mill ore.

Mizpah
Raise 377 was holed through into drift 235, being advanced 5.5 feet. Intermediate drift 377 was started westerly from raise 377 to prospect the Mizpah fault vein below drift 235. Progress, 4 feet. Intermediate raise 4007 was holed through into drift 305 below stope 381. Progress, 29 feet. Intermediate drift 4007 was advanced 6.5 feet. Drift 475 was advanced 10 feet on ore in an easterly direction. Intermediate drift 579 was continued westerly, on ore. Developments for the week, 69 feet.

Stopping operations from the various veins in this section of the Tonopah Mining company's property produced 600 tons of mill ore.

Sand Grass
With no change in formation and no reported excess of values drift 1025 from the Sand Grass shaft was advanced 4 feet. Stopping, however, from this section of the company's ground produced a total of 150 tons of mill ore.

In all the workings of the mine the development work for the week totaled exactly 129 feet, with a production of 1550 tons of ore, which was sent to the mill for treatment. The bullion recovered from the treatment of the tonnage produced during the first half of November will not be shipped until the end of the present month.

WEST END HAS BIG FOLLOWING ON N. Y. 'CHANGE

Nevada Properties Attract Attention of Eastern Investors, Higher Prices Likely

Southern Nevada mining stocks again are receiving attention from investors. During the week just closed activity in the Nevada mining share list was confined to West End, Tonopah Mining, Cortez, Deep Mines, Candelaria and Goldfield Consolidated. There is a larger following in West End and Cortez and higher prices are likely. Candelaria recovered from 32 to 38, and is well supported. Interest in some of the Goldfields continues with Deep Mines leading. No interest is displayed in the Divides and Tonopah Divide, Divides Extension and Gold Zone are lower. Eureka Croesus is more active. The outlook for the coming week is not promising with the exception of Cortez, Candelaria, West End and possibly Deep Mines.

World silver markets do not show any pronounced strength. Mexican producers refused to sell at the lower prices during the past four weeks, but it is quite likely that they are realizing his week. Purchase of domestic silver since the first of the month is small, indicating totals for this year of less than 60,000,000 ounces.

SIXTY CHINESE PASSENGERS HELD UP BY PORT SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Nov. 25.—Sixty Chinese passengers, men and women and children, arriving here from Hongkong on the British Steamer Ying Chow, were arrested by Chinese river police, aided by the French police and are held pending investigation and examination of their baggage and search of the vessel. No reason officially was given for the action of the police, but it is reported that the ship's owners learned from Hongkong that a plot was afoot for pirates to seize her on sailing southward from Hongkong in December.

ORPHAN SHIP COLLIDES WITH TRANSATLANTIC SHIP

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 25.—The American Near East relief steamship, Belgravia, carrying 2000 orphans from Asia Minor, collided with the transatlantic liner, New York, at the junction of the Bosphorus and the Sea of Marmora. Allied ships have gone to their assistance.

He said the statement was authorized by the British government.

BELMONT MINE PUSHING WORK ON NINE LEVELS

Official Report Shows Intense Activity With Usual Tonnage Broken

BUCKEYE STATION REPAIRED

Southeastern Section of Property Being Prospected From the 1500 Level

Active work is being pursued on eight levels of the Belmont Development company property and the usual tonnage of ore is being broken and sent to the mill for treatment. On the 1400 level of the Buckeye development work was suspended during the week in order to timber the station. The official report of development work in company property for the week ending November 21, follows:

Seven hundred level, south crosscut 765 is prospecting for a segment of the Mizpah vein.

Eight hundred level, the intermediate east drift off of raise 810 has been advanced a short distance on a foot and a half of quartz. Intermediate south crosscut off of stope 845 is prospecting the foot wall of the Mizpah vein.

Nine hundred level, west drift 9100 is being advanced on a foot of quartz. East drift 9103 is being advanced on two feet of quartz. West drift 9104 has been started on two feet of quartz and is following the south vein.

Thousand level, intermediate west crosscut is being driven off of raise 121 to prospect for the Favorite vein below the 900 level. South crosscut 1031 is being extended in trachyte. Raise 130 has been started off of stope 10080 and will be driven to connect with the 900 level.

Eleven hundred level, west drift 11022 has been started off of south crosscut 2 on a foot of quartz. South east crosscut 11016 is being extended in the foot wall of the Belmont vein. Raise 138 is prospecting for ore developed on the 1000 level.

Twelve hundred level, intermediate northeast crosscut off of east stope 7 is being extended in the foot wall of the Belmont vein.

Thirteen hundred level, intermediate north west crosscut off of east stope 5 is prospecting the foot wall of east stope 3.

Fifteen hundred level, southwest crosscut 1505 has been advanced the usual distance. Southeast crosscut 1506 has been started off of 1505. Southeast crosscut 1507 has been started for the purpose of prospecting the southeastern section of the property.

Buckeye, 1400 level, development work has been discontinued during the past week in order to timber the station.

SEPARATION OF ROADS BITTERLY FOUGHT AGAINST

Marketing Area Would Shrink Badly, Is Contention of W. H. Prickett

COMPETITION BE ELIMINATED

Western Pacific To Sell Five and Half Million in Bonds at Ninety-Two

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Careful investigation into the situation which would develop by the separation of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific has convinced business interests in the state of Utah that there would result to that territory from the enforcement of the supreme court, H. W. Bell, et al. v. the representatives of the state of Utah, a serious and permanent and also commerce at Salt Lake City and Provo, declared today before the interstate commerce commission.

The general result of the final divorce would be to increase transportation cost, the restriction of the marketing area and the elimination of competition as far Utah is concerned, according to Prickett's view. Increased transportation costs would logically result in increased rates, he said, because Utah traffic moving to the Pacific coast points would have to travel over two separate lines.

The marketing area for Utah products on the Pacific coast would shrink, he added, because of the two-line haul which would replace the present one-line movement and because the Southern Pacific would be separated from the Central Pacific, which now serves Utah; this would increase traffic from competitors, thereby reduced and the Central competition now existing for the movement of Utah traffic to the Northern Pacific and Southern Pacific coast points would be logically reduced and the Central Pacific would be largely dependent upon the Union Pacific, thus creating something otherwise than public interest.

"We are taking counsel of our fears in opposing the separation of the Southern Pacific from the Central Pacific," W. W. Armstrong, strong operator of a chain of banks in Utah and neighboring states, declared. "Because it is our fear that the Central Pacific may fall into control of the Union Pacific and that results our Territory will be faced with a potential monopoly of transportation."
