## THE ACQUITTAL OF MRS. FAIR!

EXCITEMENT IN SAN FRANCISCO!

From last evening's Virginia Chronicle we get the following important announcement:  
SAN FRANCISCO, September 30.—Contrary to all expectation, the jury in the Fair case rendered a verdict this morning. At 9 o'clock the Court met, and the jury was called in. Upon being asked if they had made a verdict, the foreman answered, "We have." It was then handed to the Clerk, and amid the stillness of the grave the verdict of "Not guilty" was read. The verdict was received with astonishment, but no signs of approval or dissent were manifest. The jury was polled and discharged, and immediately thereafter the prisoner was discharged from arrest and left the Court-house in company with her counsel and friends. Mrs. Fair appeared to be greatly excited. Much indignation is manifested at the verdict, but a great portion of the people accept it as a finality.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 30.—3 P. M.—Crowds surround the bulletin boards and discuss the Fair verdict, which is now the only exciting topic. Opinions as to the merit of the verdict are divided, but Carson is greatly praised for his management of the case.  
It being rumored that one of the Crittendens had threatened to shoot Mrs. Fair if she was acquitted, it was thought best for her to retire to her old quarters in the jail for a time. Nothing can be learned of her intended movements.

REPLY TO "NO VEGETABLE DIET FOR THEM."

BELMONT, Sept. 26, 1872.

EDITOR DAILY APPEAL: In your issue of September 17 appears an article under the caption of "No Vegetable Diet for Them," in regard to the Nye County Democratic Convention. As it has misrepresented that convention, as well as individual members of it, it is eminently proper that it should be replied to through your columns. The convention was held on the 12th and the ticket was nominated as reported to you by a prominent gentleman from Belmont. Your informant has either willfully misrepresented or has displayed unparagonable ignorance upon a subject that he attempts to report when he gave you the information embodied in your article, and especially the following extract:

"Mullen was President of the convention and when about half through with its labors, became disgusted with the tricks played upon Stowe, Brophy and himself made them a scathing, bitter speech of denunciation; accusing them of fraud, treachery and subordination for coin; withdrew from the convention; bid its members and the party a political farewell and said he and his friends had cut loose from the rotten old carcass of the Greeley Democracy, and should vote for Grant and Wilson."

The above extract is untrue throughout, and no incident connected with the convention could have been so construed by any one in attendance. Messrs. Stowe and Brophy were candidates for Recorder and County Clerk respectively, and were defeated. The author of this letter was placed in nomination for Sheriff but respectfully declined, and in a short address favored the nomination of Mr. Caldwell and moved that he be nominated by acclamation, which was done.

The convention passed off quietly and orderly, and at its close the defeated aspirants ratified the nominations and the whole proceedings of the convention by congratulations to the successful ones and by building bonfires in the public streets.

The disaffection in the Democratic ranks that your correspondent, a prominent gentleman of Belmont, magnifies into so great a mountain, will have brought fourth but a ridiculous mouse as he will see when the solid Democratic vote of this country is cast for their ticket, their party and their principles. In conclusion, permit me to say in behalf of myself and friends, who the very prominent gentleman from Belmont has informed you have bid farewell, politically, to the Democracy, that our hearty support and earnest endeavors will be given to the furtherance of the cause of Democracy in all of its parts; that our votes in next November will be cast for Greeley and Brown, and for the whole Democratic ticket, both of county and State.
