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A MODOC VICTORY.

Our Troops Ambushed and Slaughtered.

A courier came into Yreka yesterday bringing the following startling account of a disastrous engagement which occurred on Saturday last:

LAVA BEDS, April 26.—A reconnaissance composed of Batteries K and A, Fourth Artillery, and Companies C and E of the Twelfth Infantry, left camp at 7:30 this morning, and proceeded in the direct morning to lead to the present Modoc stronghold, Captain E. Thomas of the Fourth Artillery being in command. A dozen or so of Warm Spring Indians were expected to co-operate on Captain Thomas' left. The troops having formed a line of skirmishers, advanced without molestation until they arrived at the foot of the bluff south of the Lava Beds, having meanwhile signalled to camp that no Indians could be found. On reaching the bluff the Modocs opened a severe fire, causing the troops to seek for such shelter as they could find in the crevices and chasms. As usual, the foe was unseen. The first position becoming untenable, owing to the fact that the Indians obtained both a cross and an enfilading fire, it was deemed expedient to retire to better cover. In the first fire and that received during the retreat, many fell killed or wounded. The wounded, so far as can be learned just now, are: First Sergeant Clifton, Company E, Twelfth Infantry; Private John H. Gifford, Battery K, Fourth Artillery; Private John Lynch, Battery K, Fourth Artillery, since dead; Private Joseph S. M. L. Smith, Battery K, Fourth Artillery; Private Wm. McCoy, Battery K, Fourth Artillery; Private Francis Rolla, Battery K, Fourth Artillery; Private Michael Wallace, Battery K, Fourth Artillery, since dead; Private Joseph Broderick, Battery A, Fourth Artillery; Private James McMillan, Battery A, Fourth Artillery. Lieutenant Wright, Twelfth Infantry, is reported dangerously wounded. Lieutenant Harris, of Fourth Artillery, was struck by a spent ball and was not injured much.

STILL LATER.

YREKA, April 27, 5:30 A. M.
A dispatch received from Colonel Green, of the First Cavalry, who went out with the reinforcements yesterday evening, shows the surprise to have been much more complete and more terribly fatal than was at first supposed. The dispatch states that Captain Thomas and Lieutenant A. B. Howe, of the Fourth Artillery, are killed; Lieut. Harris, of the Fourth Artillery, badly and perhaps mortally wounded; Lieut. Cranston, of the Fourth Artillery, missing. A full list of the killed and wounded cannot now be obtained, but it is known that privates Ward, of Battery K, and Parker and Collins, of Battery A, were killed; also private Boyle, of Company E, Twelfth Infantry, and one other man of the company. It is supposed that Modocs burned the bodies of the two latter. In addition to the list of wounded given above, the names of First Sergeant Robert A. Roemer, of Battery A, and private John Higgins, of Battery K, Fourth Artillery, are given as badly wounded, and Matt Murphy, of Company E, Twelfth Infantry; James Noble and Charles Cuff, Battery A, Fourth Artillery, slightly. Acting Assistant-Surveyor B. Semig was wounded in two places. The Modocs were armed with Spencer carbines. As a sample of their cunning, a portion of Batteries A and K, Fourth Artillery, and Company E, Seventeenth Infantry, finding themselves in danger of being out-flanked, took shelter in a hollow spot, affording partial cover. There were some twenty in all. No sooner had they done so, than the Indians, who knew and commanded every grove from this cavity, and what at that point numbered twenty-one warriors, detached seven of their number to one side, four on remaining on the other, and opened a cross fire on the poor fellows who could not show themselves without an almost certainty of being struck. A very few escaped an injury. The rest were killed or wounded.

IMPORTANT DECISION.—WASHINGTON, April 28.—The Court of Claims today rendered judgment for \$13,595 in favor of Eugene Deilman, a subject of Prussia, for loss sustained by detention of the Prussian ship Essex at New Orleans, under order of General Butler, on suspicion of containing contraband goods. The Court held the United States liable under the thirteenth article of the treaty of 1799 with Prussia, which requires damages by such detentions to be paid by either nation when a belligerent exercises belligerent privileges. Chief Justice Drake dissented, mainly on the ground that martial law was supreme at that time in New Orleans, and that the vessel was brought there with the knowledge of the risk incurred in coming in conflict with the will of the military commander. This claim was referred to the Court by a special Act of Congress. Judgment was also rendered for \$10,000 in favor of Andrew J. Gill for 556 tons of hay used by the army in Colorado in 1864 and 1865.
