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LATEST TELEGRAMS.

Richard Evans, an agent of the English stockholders in the Erie R. R. Company has looked at the affairs thereof and says he is satisfied with their management.

A dispatch dated New York May 22 says:

A series of meetings is projected in different parts of the city, with a view to bettering the present condition of working men. A number of prominent citizens have taken up the matter and promise their influence by attending the meetings. A committee has been appointed, consisting of Abram C. Hyatt, Peter Cooper, S. T. Church, James Connelly, Isaac Wood, Gen. Siegel, Courtland Palmer, and a number of prominent working men.

The Sun this morning says a company has been organized with a capital of \$600,000 for the manufacture of butter. A well known chemist has introduced the plan and a number of wealthy persons including several leading men in the butter trade, have purchased stock in the company. The butter is made from fat or suet brought from the slaughter houses, and after passing through a certain process, with necessary mixture of milk and salt, is said to be equal to the finest country butter. The profits are expected to be over one hundred per cent.

We infer from the following that the bruisers named have been through the motions of going out to fight and coming back unscathed—which is a shameful way to treat the public:

The return of the world-be prize-fighters, Siddons and Chambers, to this city from Boston, caused considerable flutter among the sporting fraternity. The friends of each denounce the other bitterly. While not a few admit that Siddons won the stakes according to the articles of agreement, still they denounce him for taking advantage of Chambers' absence. The stakeholder says he paid the money to Siddons, notwithstanding the threats of Chambers and his friends to sue for the money.

COLUMBUS, O., May 22.—The State Convention reassembling this afternoon, organized. The present State officers were renominated except that Alphonse Bart of Portage, was nominated for Lieutenant Governor and John Little, Controller. The resolutions reaffirm the principles of the Republican party, declare its necessity for the welfare of the country, reaffirm confidence in President Grant and in the wisdom, integrity and success of his Administration.

NEW YORK, May 22.—A gentleman from this city who has been connected with a shipping house in New London, Conn., which formerly employed Capt. Tyson and Buddington, makes a number of interesting statements in regard to the disposition of these two men, whose characters the reports received thus far seem to place in such strong contrast. Capt. Tyson some six or seven years ago was in command of the schooner Era, on a voyage from New London to Greece; in the Fall of the year in Cumberland Sound the vessel broke from her moorings and he was obliged to abandon her with all his crew. Twenty-four men were with him and stores and provisions. Making his way to shore he built tents of sails taken from the vessel and lived under them during the winter. His vessel was five miles from shore, in pack of ice, without anchorage. When the ice broke up, seeing the ship was not seriously damaged, he regained it, filled it with oil and returned to New London. Tyson is described as a brave, dashing captain, who will expose his vessel to the dangers of an Arctic Winter up to the very last moment of safety, and will often accomplish brilliant results. Buddington, on the other hand, is a careful, calculating Yankee, noted for his scrupulous guardianship of property and lives under his charge. His

New London neighbors, it is reported, predicted when the expedition started, that Buddington would bring back his vessel and crew in safety, and that scientific results would be subordinated, so far as he was concerned, to this end. He is a man of family and experience. Both men are old whaling captains, and have made eight or ten voyages each. Captain Buddington is the man who brought into New London the ship Resolution of Sir Belcher's expedition which was abandoned May 15, 1854, not far from Beecher Island. Captain Buddington was then on a whaling voyage. The impression seems to be general among shipping men that the Polar is safe and may be expected in the latter part of September or first part of October. Capt. Tyson once returned as early as August 15th, but this was the earliest arrival on record.

HALIFAX, May 21.—Three more bodies were recovered from the Atlantic wreck. A considerable part of the cargo, mostly hardware, has been taken up.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22—1 P. M.—The Police made another raid on the Chinese quarter this morning, arresting the occupants of over crowded tenements about 80 were arrested. The city prison is for the time worse crowded than the houses.

Last night Charles Eckman stabbed Wm. Evans in the chest, inflicting a serious wound. Eckman was arrested for assault to murder. The men had quarreled, but were separated before the weapon was used. Evans went away and Eckman followed him.

Prof. Fairview is inflating his monster balloon or air ship at the City Gardens. He will make his first trip at 2 P. M. He says he will sail around the city and land at 4 P. M. Prof. Lay is assisting him.
