The Danbury News Man.

The celebrated wit who presides over the Danbury News was in Virginia City day before yesterday. Dan De Quille expresses himself satisfied with him. Here is the story of him from an Eastern paper:

James Montgomery Bailey was born in Albany, N. Y., September 25th, 1841. His father was killed when James was quite a child. His mother afterwards married a gentleman from Rome, N. Y., and at that place and in Albany the family lived until 1860, when they moved to Danbury, Conn.

All this time the local news which have since made such a reputation, were slipping into the paper from time to time, and it soon became the fashion to copy them. In 1870 the items became well known and in 1871 all newspaper readers were able to recognize them.

With this slight sketch we will leave Mr. Baily with our readers. We may say, however, for the satisfaction of any curiosity that either sex may have on the subject, that Mr. Baily is a married man. He has no children now living, and resides at Danbury, apparently not at all uplitted by the full measure of fame which has been brought to him.

CINNABAR IN SOUTH EAST NEVADA. Of some facts which would seem to indicate the presence of cinnabar in the southeast part of the State the Pioche Record of June 7 says:

The Seviach Indians inhabit that part of the Colorado valley which lies between the mouth of the Rio Virgen and the Big Canyon—a region of country believed to be rich in minerals, but which has been but very little prospected. The Seviach use a bright red point, and trade it to neighboring tribes, which is believed to be genuine persulphide of mercury, or cinnabar.
