

As we are informed by the papers of last evening, Governor Pollock and Arthur Orr, Mint machinist, under convey of Senator Jones, will arrive here today. Their object is the inspection of the Mint with a view to such improvements and enlargements there as may be practicable. Much is to be hoped for from this visit. These visitors are men whose recommendations in Mint matters go a long way with the Washington authorities, and Senator Jones being one of the most prominent silver miners in the United States and therefore very largely interested in all matters looking to the enhancement of facilities for the refining and coining of the precious metals, of course he and they will work harmoniously and with a view to enlarging the capacities of the Mint, and for such widening of the scope of the coinage laws as is needed by our mining interests. The restoration of the finances of the country to a coin basis being one of the larger and more immediately obvious questions with which Congress will have to deal, and our Senator understanding that branch of the subject which has to do with the production and handling of bullion, and it being a commercial necessity here in Nevada that the Mint should coin silver half and quarter dollars it is not at all impossible that the said laws may be so amended as to set the Mint at work doing this much needed service. With increased requirements of course an increase of room will be needed; and so there will have to be more employees and more money to pay them with. These matters constitute the legislation most important in the eyes of the citizens of Carson; and so there is much to be hoped for from this visit of today.

THE STEEL RAILS laid from Virginia City to Gold Hill on the line of the V. & T. R. R., make a beautiful road of it, and the cars run with remarkable smoothness and freedom from jarring. It is the intention of the company to continue this steel rail along down below the Crown Point Ravine bridge. On the main road between the foot of the grade and the Mound House, and along those steep a ditches and sharp curves it is intended to replace the worn and injured iron with much heavier rails than have ever heretofore been used. These will be of iron; although it is the intention of the management to have nothing but steel on any part of the line whenever a general reconstruction of the road is in order. Mountain Superintendent Yerington has a force of men at work "spotting" such badly worn and defective ties as need replacing; and the entire upper section of the road is being overhauled, and new materials employed wherever it is possible.

Cow Shot.—Saturday night a cow belonging to Mr. E. D. Sweeney came home and milked and yielded ten quarts of milk. Sunday morning Sweeney and his brother went into the field, west of town, where he kept this cow and found her lying there dead. When Sweeney told us this story of the sudden loss of this valuable cow, of course we asked him the cause of her dying. He didn't know, he said, but thought she'd been shot. The presumption is in favor of the suspected shooting, for the reasons that the cow was well on Saturday night, that there is nothing about the pasture that could poison her and cause her death and that only two or three days ago Sweeney and his brother both got hit with a charge of shot fired from the gun of a careless pot hunter, in that same field. A cow being bigger than a man and therefore a larger mark, and this being a field where shooters roam, and she being dead, of course somebody shot her. There can be no doubt in any candid man's mind that she was shot to death.

OF AN ACCIDENT at the Crown Point Mine, yesterday, the News of last evening says: Superintendent Sam Jones and P. J. Langan met with quite a severe mishap at about 9 o'clock this morning, while going down into the Crown Point Mine. It appears that just as Mr. Jones was upon the point of stepping off the cage at the 1,100-foot station, a piece of rock, about as large as a man's two fists, which had fallen all the way from the 600-foot level, struck him on the back of his head, knocking him down and inflicting a frightful gash in his scalp. Langan, while in the act of assisting Mr. Jones, was struck by a second piece of rock which laid open the scalp on the right and upper portion of his head, a distance of about two inches. Both men were brought up out of the mine in a gory condition.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.—A new lodge of this Order was instituted at Gold Hill yesterday afternoon. The Virginia lodge, to the number of 40 turned out in full regalia and marched to Gold Hill to assist in the institution of the new lodge. Carson Lodge was also represented on the occasion. The Knights of Gold Hill prepared a banquet for the entertainment in the evening.

TEMPERANCE.—The announcement that Rev. James Woods would preach a sermon on the above named subject on Sunday evening caused the Presbyterian Church to be filled on the occasion. The Good Templars were out in full force—the Order in Carson numbering at present about eighty active members.
