uel J. Tilden, "the speaker's eloquence took our reporter so completely off his feet that he found himself quite powerless to follow him. Heavens! what a tempest of applause went up. Tweed rose from a \$50,000 lawyer to an \$8,000,000 "Reformer." Two years before Tilden abandoned Tweed, John Morrissey, the faro dealer, got afraid of his reputation and jumped the game. Tweed, after having been publicly accused of theft in the New York Times, and at a time when seven indictments were hanging over him, was supported for the Senate by Tilden and elected by the "Reform" Democracy to the New York State Senate. When any Republican had been accused and found guilty of dishonest dealing he had been discarded by his party. Mr. Fitch concluded his able and eloquent speech with such a peroration as he alone is capable of making. The great assemblage adjourned with three hearty cheers for Hayes and Wheeler.

Carson street has seldom presented a gayer or more brilliant appearance than it did last night. PROCEEDINGS OF THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

Shortly after 12 o'clock, and after "America" by the Washington Guard Band and a campaign song "Oh, Where is Tweed" by the Virginia City Glee Club, Hon. Geo. A. King, Secretary of the State Central Committee, (in the absence of Chairman Regua), called the convention to order. On motion of Gen. T. D. Edwards of Ormsby, Col. R. H. Taylor of Storey, was nominated for Temporary Chairman. Mr. Crockett of Lyon, nominated Doctor C. B. Zabriskie. Col. Taylor, in a handsome speech declining, upon motion of Col. Wm. S. Wood of Storey, Dr. Zabriskie's nomination was made unanimous. He was escorted to the Chair amid much applause by Col. Taylor and Gen. Edwards. The Doctor made a brief and telling speech, after which he announced the convention ready for business.

Mr. Immel nominated Bob Taylor for Temporary Secretary. He was elected by acclamation. He had to make a little speech, and of course did his duty.

A committee on credentials of one from each county, was, on motion of Col. Wood, selected. The following selections were made:
