DEATH OF MR. C. W. FRIEND'S FATHER.—Mr. Charles W. Friend received last night, from Auburn, California, a telegram announcing the death of his father, at the advanced age of 77. This announcement coming to Mr. Friend at a time when he is prostrated by sickness is fraught with peculiar sadness and sense of affliction. The funeral will take place to-morrow.

A LARGE number of the Senators and Representatives were at the different churches on Sunday, and were well pleased with the services there heard. But few towns of Carson's size can boast of neater and more comfortable churches, and these for the most part are well attended. The sermons are good, the singing excellent, and the collections small.

We acknowledge an invitation to the reception of the Au Fait Club, which will be given on Friday evening of this week. Judge Hillier is President of the Club, and General Clarke is Chairman of the Executive Committee. At least our invitation says so, and we will stand by our invitation, no matter who may oppose.

QUITE A number of Carsonites attended the veterans' ball in Virginia. Also quite a number of Legislators were in attendance. All returned well pleased with the exercises of the evening. Judge Bailey says that dancing all night is not just the thing to make one feel particularly bright and happy the next day.

THE target match between Bob Duncan of Carson and Neil Loyalchan of Gold Hill is to come off to-day at the Mound House. Other matches will also occur at the same place. Considerable interest is being taken in this match by the sporting gentry of Carson and Virginia.

REV. McCLAIN said a good thing the other day in his church when he said a man is not a true politician who can not rise above party spirit in matters of right, and a man is not a good Christian who can see no good outside of his own particular sect.

SENATOR STEWART has introduced a bill in the Senate in reference to the rights of those who deal in mining stocks. It has created considerable discussion in Legislative circles, and has been referred to the Committee on Mines and Mining.

ABOUT one thousand dollars were netted from the Paddock and Hughes benefit in Virginia on Monday evening. Miss Montague was unable to play her part on account of sickness. That lady is now very ill with congestion of the lungs.

LAST Saturday the Mint authorities paid to Geo. A. King, Agent of the Nevada Bank, three hundred thousand dollars on account of bullion purchased. This shows that money making is active in Carson, even if it is confined to one particular building.

CAPT. BOGARDUS has gone back to San Francisco. He proposes to return East in about three weeks. On his way he will stop at Virginia when a return match will take place. A plan is under consideration to have the great market stop at Carson.

SUPERINTENDENT Cr. word, of the Mint, has made another purchase of silver from the Nevada Bank, amounting to two hundred and fifty thousand ounces.

THE Board of Pardons have refused to commute the sentence of Larkin. On the 19th inst., Larkin will be hanged in Storey county.

THE sentence of Daniel Taylor for train robbing has been commuted by the Board of Pardons from thirty to fifteen years.

A BILL was proposed yesterday in the Assembly in reference to restricting the sphere of the Board of Pardons.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

The situation in New Orleans is becoming more and more complex. Yesterday the streets were filled with armed men, and Lafayette Square presented a scene almost unknown except in times of war. The Nichols' militia seized the police stations, and also took possession of the Supreme Court building, and installed their Judges in the same. They are in possession of everything except the State House, and an attack on it was probably made late yesterday afternoon. The Republicans are hopelessly in the minority, and the most intense excitement prevails. A force of three thousand of the militia of Nichols is under arms on the levee. The force under Packard will not exceed a few hundred.

The Illinois Democracy held a convention yesterday at Springfield, with John M. Palmer as President, and one Vice-President from each Congressional district in the State. They declared in short that it was the duty of both Houses to use every means in their power to settle the Presidential question in a parliamentary and satisfactory manner, and for any failure to do the same the Representatives will be held accountable by the people. They reiterate their faith in the election of Tilden and Hendricks.

The Virginia Democracy have held a meeting, which was attended by the Representative men in the State. They recommended a strict adherence to the Constitution in arranging the present political affairs, and declare that Virginia is still true and loyal to the government. Firmness in the present crisis is recommended to all lovers of justice and equal rights to all.

The much talked of duel between May and Bennett, is reported to have taken place. The strictest secrecy is observed in all the details. The latest particulars report the wounding of May, but not seriously. Bennett is said to have escaped unhurt. Considerable excitement is rife in New York regarding the matter, the friends of both parties being anxious for the safety of the principals.

Commodore Vanderbilt in his will leaves all his property to his son, W. H. Vanderbilt, who is to be responsible for several small bequests. The other relatives of the deceased are not satisfied with the bequests as announced, and threaten to contest the will. The Commodore remembered his old pastor, Dr. Deems, by a bequest of twenty thousand dollars. Cornelius Vanderbilt received two and one-half millions.

The Indiana and Kansas Democracy have held conventions and reiterated their faith in the truths of the great Democratic party. They discountenance any recourse to arms to settle the Presidential problem, and declare that the emergency at present requires wisdom and moderation. Both conventions were largely attended, and the interest in the proceedings were very marked.
