ORDINANCE NO. 45.

An Ordinance requiring the removal of Swinging signs, or signs below awnings and across the sidewalks.

The Board of Trustees of Carson City do ordain:

Sec. 1. After the first day of April, 1877, it shall be, and is hereby made unlawful, for any person or persons, to maintain or keep any sign, swinging, hanging, or fixed, across the sidewalk below the awning or balcony, on any street in Carson City. Sec. 2. For a violation of the provisions of the first section of this Ordinance, any person so offending, shall on conviction, be punished by fine not exceeding one hundred dollars in gold coin of the United States, or by imprisonment in the city jail not exceeding fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court. NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

Wednesday, February 21, 1877.

Assembly—Fifty-second Day.

Called to order at 11 A. M., with the Speaker in the Chair.

Roll called and quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain.

Journal read and approved.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS.

One offered by Grey from the trustees of the Nevada Orphan Asylum in Virginia. An appropriation of \$5,000 per annum asked. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Committee on Corporations reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 95, relative to a certain railroad; also favorably on Senate Bill No. 97, the gas bill.

Committee on State Institutions reported favorably on Assembly Bill No. 7, amendatory of the Act to provide for the support of the State Prison.

Committee on Education reported unfavorably on Assembly Bill No. 18, relative to the practice of medicine.

Committee on Judiciary reported favorably on Assembly Bill No. 123, to repeal the Act authorizing the Supreme Court to issue restraining orders pending the determination of an appeal.

Committee on Federal Relations reported favorably on Concurrent Resolution No. 11, concerning fares and freights on the railroad.

Committee on Agriculture reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 33.

Committee on Claims reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 61, the Edward Lubin claim bill; also favorably on Senate Bill No. 81, the Peter Cavanaugh claim bill.

Committee on Ways and Means reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 102; also Assembly Bill No. 118, authorizing a State loan.

The same Committee recommended that Senate Bill No. 128 be referred to Judiciary Committee.

REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES.

Lyon county delegation reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 121, the Silver City incorporation bill.

Washoe county delegation reported favorably on Assembly Bill No. 125.

Lincoln county delegation reported favorably on Assembly Bill No. 129.

Approving Assembly Bill No. 41, amendatory of the revenue Act; also Substitute Assembly Bill No. 6, amendatory of the revenue Act.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Babcock, to grant the use of the Assembly Chamber to C. J. Hillyer for a lecture on the bullion tax question on Wednesday evening. Adopted.

By Trousdale, to pay S. W. Hamman \$70 for expenses of trip to Elko. Adopted.

By Bell, to amend Rule 1 of the Standing Rules. Laid over one day.

By Gray, that after the 23d inst., the Assembly shall meet at 10 A. M. Laid over one day.

By Parker, that when the House adjourns it meets on Friday at 10 A. M. Carried.

MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE.

Transmitting Senate Bill No. 127, to tax and regulate foreign insurance companies in the State; also Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 26, granting leave of absence to the County Recorder of Esmeralda county.

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 7, for the protection of fish in the Truckee river and its branches. Rules suspended and passed.

FIRST READING OF BILLS.

By Atchinson, amendatory of the Act requiring foreign corporations to furnish evidence of their incorporation. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

By Gladding, an Act authorizing the construction of the State Prison at Reno in case of a contingency, and appropriating money for the purpose. Referred to Committee on State Institutions.

By Botsford, amendatory of the civil practice Act, was referred to Judiciary Committee.

By Parker, to pay for certain legislative expenses. The bill authorizes the payment of \$120 to Cassidy and Grey for services as President pro tem and Speaker pro tem respectively.

By Moore of Elko, for the relief of H. W. Putnam. Referred to Committee on Claims.

By Bailey, amendatory of the mining, milling and smelting Act, was referred to Committee on Mines and Mining.

SPECIAL ORDER.

Assembly Bill No. 69, the bank bill, was the special order for this time.

An amendment offered by McIntosh was adopted. That gentleman also spoke in favor of the bill, and gave a number of reasons for the passage of the bill. The history of the savings banks in the various countries was given, and the speaker then spoke at length on the subject. Other members took part in the discussion, and the bill on its final passage was lost.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The general appropriation bill was taken up, and after discussion was ordered engrossed.

The Senate amendments to Assembly Bill No. 49, were concurred in.

Senate Bill No. 56, amendatory of the fee and compensation Act, was passed.

Assembly Bill No. 115, to create a current expense fund for Nye county, was passed.

Senate Bill No. 59, to remove certain disabilities from Lewis Cook, was lost.

Senate—Fifty-second Day.

Senate called to order at 10:30 A. M. with Lieut. Governor in the Chair. Roll called, and afterwards prayer by the Chaplain.

Journal read and approved.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES. Committee on Claims reported favorably on the claim of State Mineralogist for furnishing a duplicate copy of report; also favorably on the claim of White Pine county, Lehman Smith, Curtis and D. C. Clark & Bro. It was recommended that these bills be paid.

A minority report of the Committee on Ways and Means was presented on Assembly Bill No. 99, amendatory of the Act providing for the taxation of the net proceeds of mines.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

The vote by which Senate Bills No. 79 and 99 were lost, was recorded.

Resolution, by King, that all committees be obliged to report back all Senate Bills on or before Friday next, and Assembly Bills before Monday. Carried.

Resolution, by Garrard, that the Ways and Means Committee report back Assembly Bill No. 99, immediately, with or without recommendation.

Resolution, by Stampley, to pay the State Mineralogist for a duplicate copy of biennial report, was adopted.

Resolution, by Shepherd, to pay Gabriel Cohn \$275 for expense incurred contesting the seat of Stone. Adopted.

MESSAGES FROM THE ASSEMBLY.

Transmitting Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 31, relative to an amendment to the Constitution; also Concurrent Resolution No. 32, relative to printing the report of the Committee on State University; also announcing the rejection of Senate Joint Resolutions No. 5 and 6, relative to swamp and overflowed lands, and the rejection of Concurrent Resolution No. 25; also announcing the passage of Senate Bill No. 77, to restrict gaming.

On motion of Cassidy, Senate Bill No. 77, relative to gaming, was taken up. The Assembly amendments were concurred in.

RECESS TAKEN.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Committee on Engrossment reported several bills properly engrossed.

FIRST READING OF BILLS.

Senate Bill No. 131, by Stewart, relative to the apportionment of funds for the relief of the State, was referred to Committee on Education.

Standing Committee on Public Printing, out of order, reported amendments to Assembly Bill No. 116, and recommended its passage. This is the bill to abolish the office of State Printer.

The Storey county delegation reported favorably on Senate Bill No. 115.

Ormsby county delegation reported favorably on Assembly Bill No. 80, amendatory of the Carson City incorporation Act.

BUSINESS ON THIRD READING AND GENERAL FILE.

Assembly Bill No. 89, to provide for the purchase of supplies for attaches and State officers, was passed.

Committee on Claims, out of order, introduced Senate Bill No. 132, to pay certain claims against the State. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

Resolution, by Garrard, to pay John B. Gallagher, \$64 for expenses in contesting the seat of A. Gerrard, in the sixth session of the Legislature. The resolution was lost.

Assembly Bill No. 83, amendatory of the revenue Act, was laid on the table.

Assembly Bill No. 104, to provide for the payment of claims against the several counties of the State, was passed.

Senate Bill No. 52, concerning District Attorneys, was passed.

Senate Bill No. 130, repealing the Act concerning courts of justice and judicial officers, was indefinitely postponed.

Assembly Bill No. 101, the endless chain railroad bill, was passed.

Senate Bill No. 79, relative to the University, was lost.

Senate Bill No. 99, to restrict gaming was lost.

Assembly Bill No. 80, amendatory of the Carson City incorporation Act, was passed.

Assembly Bill No. 116, to abolish the office of State Printer, was re-referred to Committee on Printing.

Senate Bill No. 115, relative to incorporating Virginia City, was ordered engrossed.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 32, relative to printing the report of the Committee on University, was referred to Committee on Printing.

Concurrent Resolution No. 31, to amend the Constitution, was referred to Judiciary Committee.

Adjourned until Friday.

MR. HILLYER ON THE BULLION TAX.—C. J. Hillyer, attorney for some of the principal Comstock mines, addressed a meeting of legislators and citizens last evening in the Assembly chamber. Mr. Hillyer spoke for about two hours, and chiefly in refutation of the arguments made by Gen. Clarke on Tuesday evening, against the proposed modification of the bullion tax. We have not space in this issue even for a summary of Mr. Hillyer's argument, which was a very able one.

Mrs. T. D. Edwards and Mrs. A. C. Ellis were around in the interest of charity yesterday afternoon and collected quite a number of half dollars for the purpose of sending Miss Brewster an invalid lady, to California for medical treatment.

The Assembly yesterday remained in session until after five o'clock. Several attempts were made to adjourn, but every attempt was fruitless, and in consequence a large amount of business was done.

THE BAKERS.—To-day being the anniversary of Washington's birth-day and a legal holiday, Wells, Fargo & Co.'s bank and the Carson City Savings Bank will be closed. Citizens will take due notice.

To-day is a legal holiday and in consequence neither the Senate nor Assembly will hold a Session. It will be a good time for the various Committees to fix up odds and ends.

Last evening the Grand English and Comic Opera Company made their first appearance in Carson, and the Opera produced was the Maritana of Wallace. Although there was a ball at the Arlington and a lecture on the bullion tax in the Assembly Chambers, yet there was a large crowd at the Theater and the singing and music was admirable of its kind. All the performers were perfectly at home in their respective parts, and the different characters were represented in an artistic manner. This evening a better Opera will be given in Flotow's Martha, and we would advise everyone to secure a seat for the occasion. An enterprise such as this should be encouraged by all. It is elevating in its tone, and has for its object the diffusion of a higher musical culture throughout the community at large.

This evening will occur the ball of the Mexican Veterans, and the arrangements for the same have been perfected in a most admirable manner. It is a double celebration with the Veterans. They pay due respect to the memory of the Father of our Country, and at the same time celebrate the thirty-first anniversary of the battle of Buena Vista. These Veterans are eminently worthy the honor of the Carson people, and now that they propose to celebrate the anniversary of one of their greatest battles, now that they propose to recall once more the scenes of days long since passed, every respect should be paid to their reception and all should join together for the success of the same.
