### MESSRS. PLATT AND ROBERTS, TAKE NOTICE

It is amusing to hear Republican candidates and orators tell what the Republican party is going to do on the tariff question when it gets back into power. But there are several reasons why they are not going to do anything of the kind. First, the Republicans are not going to get back into power for many, many years. They have got the two houses of congress to capture first, and then the presidency, and they stand no chance of getting one or the other. Second, a tariff commission, thanks to a Democratic administration, has been created and hereafter will handle all tariff measures, and though the Republicans get in control once more the people of that faith, not the interests, will turn the party out of office again as they did in 1912 if the commission is turned down and an attempt made to revise the tariff upward.

If the Republican candidates and orators have not yet learned that the people of the United States are now in the saddle they have another thing coming and it will be made pretty plain when next Tuesday's votes are counted.

The day of the Cannons, ePnoses, du Ponts, Olivers, Smoots, Galingers and Lodges and special privileges for the interests has passed forever in the United States.

### WHY WAS ROBERTS SILENT?

On pages 3986 and 3987 of the Congressional Record of March 3, 1916, will be found the debate on that portion of the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill relating to the Carson mint. It will be noted that Representative Good of Iowa, a Republican, moved to strike out the paragraph making an appropriation for the maintenance of this institution, which, if carried, would have abolished it. Congressman Good in support of his motion made an attack on the Carson mint and although Roberts was present, for he answered to a roll call a few minutes later (see page 3992) he did not say a word in defense of this institution and had not Representative Smith of Idaho come to the rescue this mint would now be ancient history.

It will also be noted that after Smith of Idaho made his speech in defense of this institution Good informed him he was not referring to the Boise office, thinking it perhaps strange that one from another state should take such a friendly interest when it did not seem to concern our own congressman, whereupon the Idaho congressman said he was aware that he, Good, was not talking about the Boise office, but that the plan was that as each of the western offices was reached they were to be knocked out and that he was in favor of keeping them all, as they had been a great factor in the development of the mining industry.

### WILL WE MEET THE TEST?

Woman suffrage is today the policy of the state of Nevada, but it is not yet the policy of the nation. It is being tried out here, as it is being tried out in California, Washington, Oregon and other intelligent sections. Neither action in congress nor in the state legislatures can influence the result. Even if congress acts favorably in changing the constitution a vast majority of the states must act to make it binding for the Susan B. Anthony amendment.

Rhode Island was unconvinced by the arguments of Hamilton, Madison and Jay in the Federalist, and waited years before it accepted the national constitution. Doubtful and conservative states in New England and on the Atlantic seaboard will now await the proof of trial before accepting the doctrine of woman suffrage. They will await the test in California, Montana, Illinois, Nevada and elsewhere, under varying conditions, to judge whether or not equal suffrage is a farce where tried.

Do you think the misstatements and heckling of the Martinets, the street speaking of the Mahel Vernons are helping the cause of woman suffrage? Instead of helping they are lowering the tone of the suffrage question and putting it back in public opinion a dozen or more years.

We are making a test of the real meaning and merits of equal suffrage right now in this state and out of the result will be builded a nationwide sentiment for or against.

### ANOTHER SUBTLE STATEMENT

In an open letter to the women voters of Nevada the Woman's party makes the statement that "at a word from him (President Wilson) congress would have put through the Susan B. Anthony amendment, as it put through the child labor bill," but forgets to mention the fact that a bill is passed by a majority present, while an amendment requires a two-thirds vote of both houses of congress. Not since the 'reconstruction period' has any party controlled two-thirds of the votes of senate and house of representatives.

Another little matter the framers of the "open letter" forgot to mention was that in June of this year and again in the latter part of July letters were written to Senator Pittman urging him NOT to let the amendment come to vote for fear it would not carry.

Suffrage never had any standing in congress under the Republican administration. It was an unpopular subject. Under President Wilson's administration a committee was formed, with Senator Thomas of Colorado as chairman, to deal with the suffrage question in the senate. This gave the movement a standing and dignity hitherto lacking in its history. During the last session of congress thirteen senators and representatives appeared before the Judiciary committee of the house of representatives, speaking in behalf of woman suffrage. All were Democrats; not a Republican member spoke in its behalf during the last session.

In the three and a half years of Democratic administration under President Wilson more hearings have been held, more votes taken in both houses of congress, more favorable reports made by committees and more recognition given to suffragists by the president than in twenty years of Republican rule. And yet in spite of all this the Woman's party is crying for the defeat of President Wilson in the nation and of Pittman and Caine in Nevada.

### EVEN FLIES INDICATE TREND

In a Los Angeles store they are taking a novel "straw vote." In one show window a sheet of stick fly paper was placed and labeled, "Hughes Ballot Box;" in another window a second sheet of fly paper was labeled, "Wilson Ballot Box." Every fly that became entangled in the Wilson sheet was counted as a vote for the president; every fly that became hopelessly involved on the other paper counted for the Republican candidate.

At last reports flies from all parts of the city were coming to vote, but Wilson was in the lead.

### ADDS TO THE VALUE OF PROPERTY

In a recent editorial the Sacramento Bee comments on the good work being done by the Auburn Improvement club and recommends that other towns of Northern California follow the good example, and adds: "There is no town or city which cannot add to its attractiveness by methodical improvement of streets and gardens, planting of shade and ornamental trees and of flowers, and by general and periodical clean-ups. "Such things are desirable not only to gratify the sense of order and beauty, but also because they are highly practical and profitable to any community. They add to the value of property and do much to attract homeseekers and the investment of capital in local industries."

Do you believe women should receive equal pay with men for the same work? Governor Hughes of New York vetoed a bill providing equal pay for men and women teachers. This bill was later passed and approved by a Democratic governor.
