CASH BOY

Crosscut Will Be Run to Reach Known Ledges

The Tonopah Cash Boy, share do not seem to have been seriously injured by the disaster, which proved to be so damaging to the wildcats in the southern mining camps.

The Cash Boy was bit nineteen in Goldfield the day before the calamity and yesterday the quotations from New York, as displayed in the brokerage offices in Reno were sixteen and seventeen.

A dispatch from Tonopah states that a station has been cut at the four hundred level and drifting will begin today to crosscut the formation and pick up the ledges that are known to pass through the ground.

Salt Lake to List Comstocks

CCIDENTAL HOTEL, HISTORY

Faded Hostelry That Once Sheltered Noted Comstockers

The destruction of the Occidental Hotel removes one of the most widely known hostelries in the world, and one which had the honor of seeing the best table anywhere in any lands, from the time of its opening in 1862 by Lewis Leland, to 1875, the opening year of the Palace. Countless thousands still living have been guests of this famous hotel, says the Los Angeles Times.

The very best days of the Occidental were from the closing of the Civil war up to about the opening of the Palace in 1875. From 1886 to 1870 it temporarily housed all of the operatic and dramatic stars of that noted Thespian age, when histrionic talent and ability instead of costly gowns and divorce court notoriety were recognized and required.

From Virginia City came the rotund genial General Winters, superintendent of the Kentuck and Crown Point; Charlie Strong, superintendent of the famous Gould & Curry, a most admirable fellow, whose widow has long been a resident of this section and well known in Los Angeles; General Charles F. Smith, Benj. W. and noble fellow, superintendent of the Chollar-Fotos, and now and for a good many years a resident of this city; Colonel Avery, one of the high rollers of the richest silver mining section in the world at that time; Joe Goodman, editor of the Enterprise, and Tom Fitch, the silver-tongued with whom he fought a duel, the latter receiving a slight wound; Sam Davis about as humorous and clever a journalist as has ever been spared to make a crowd laugh; Jim Nye, United States Senator from Nevada, full of Methodism and Republicanism, and often full of drinks; Steve Gage, collector of internal revenue, and also collector of Republican votes, and scores more of as good and liberal fellows as the sun has ever shown upon.

To Build New Mill

Grading for the new thirty-stamp mill to be erected by the Butters Company just west of Sugar Loaf has been commenced. The pulp from the batteries will be run into the plant for final treatment. The mill will be cheaper than maintaining three or four miles of sluices from a point near the Nevada brewery, as originally intended. The Company has made a contract for hauling the Tonopah ore from bins at the C. & C. sidetrack on Mills street at the rate of 55 cents per ton. Work on the new structure will be rushed.—Enterprise.

Notice is hereby given that on the 12th day of Sept., 1905, in accordance with Section 23, Chapter XLVI, of the Statutes of 1905, one Philip V. Mighels and Frank L. Wildes of Carson, County of Ormsby and State of Nevada, made application to the State Engineer of Nevada for permission to appropriate the public waters of the State of Nevada. Such application to be made from Ash Canyon creek at points in N E 1/4 of S W 1/4 of section 10 T 15 N R 19 E by means of a dam and headgate and five cubic feet per second is to be conveyed to points in N E 1/4 of S W 1/4 of section 11, T 15 N R 19 E., by means of a flume and pipe and there used to generate electrical power. The construction of said works shall begin before June 1, 1906, and shall be completed on or before June 1, 1907. The water shall be actually applied to a beneficial use on or before June 1, 1908.
