WE CONCUR

The following from the Reno Journal is the truth with the bark on. In these sentiments every decent man will heartily concur.

To take advantage of another's misfortune; to "kick a man when he is down" to make capital out of a fallen foe's undoing are things which the world usually regards as the ultimate of meanness. Beyond this there is nothing more contemptible.

The Los Angeles Express is out with a placard twenty inches long, six inches wide and about as small, withal, as anything could be. It is no less than a bid for popularity based on the calamity which has visited San Francisco.

So fierce is the rivalry which the coast metropolis has inspired in the City of Angels that while the embers of the former's devastating fires are still glowing, her people still houseless and hungry and placard boasting of her own immunity from damage it may be business but it isn't decent.

Without wishing to give the placard further publicity it may be stated that many Reno citizens received yesterday this, from the Los Angeles Express dated Saturday evening April 28.

"Business center of Los Angeles before and after the San Francisco earthquake, April 18th." (Then follows a picture of the business quarter of the southern city.)

Underneath the picture, showing the uncracked condition of the town, follows this:

"Los Angeles was asleep at the time of the San Francisco earthquake a. m., April 18th and was not even awakened. Los Angeles history covering over 100 years shows no earthquake damage."

One wonders after this, whether Los Angeles has received a special dispensation from Him who holds the thunderbolt in His hand; or whether immunity from earthquakes is a result of clever municipal officials; or whether a pact has been entered into with subterranean powers precluding possibility of an upheaval.

No one desires Los Angeles any arm but the wish is natural to all those who love old Frisco and who are not think too much of her awful stress, that a discriminating earthquake might rattle the roofs and shake down the buildings in which live the men whose sense of decency is so subservient to their commercial interest.

San Francisco will rise from her ashes and will be richer and prouder than ever. It may be that the day will come when she will turn

to the assistance of her once envious sister in the south and lift her up.

But Reno and San Francisco will ever pray that no such awful calamity will ever visit this fair land again, nor least of freedom from visitations which no human hand can stay nor wit fortell not even a Los Angeles newspaper.—Reno Journal.
