AID FOR CARSON SINK FARMERS

Bill to Provide for Experiment Station
at That Place

To aid settlers at Carson Sink a bill
has been introduced in the Senate
providing for the appropriation of
\$15,000 to enable the agricultural de-
partment to conduct crop experiments
there. If the bill becomes a law a
station will be established at once in
the Sink and agricultural experts will
experiment with the soil of the vari-
ous localities and also lend their
counsel to the new comers, many of
whom are totally unacquainted with
farming by irrigation in the arid
west.

Through its various scientific bu-
reaux, the Department of Agriculture
has been investigating for several
years some of the more acute prob-
lems, that confront the irrigation farm-
er. New crops have been introduced
from foreign countries, improved var-
ieties of native crops are being se-
cured by breeding, methods have been
found by which alkali may be re-
moved from the soil and ways have
been discovered of so applying ir-
rigation water that injury by alkali can
be reduced to a minimum.

CASH BOY STATEMENT

Favorable Showing in the Mine and
Treasury

Carson City Nev., May 1, 1906
To Stockholders:

The Cash Boy shaft is now
down to a depth of 400 feet, and a
station is being made at this level,
preparatory to crosscutting for the
ore bodies which will be commenced
on May 10th. The shaft is in porphyry
which highly mineralized.

A ledge carrying small values in
gold was encountered at a depth of
275 feet, the extent and value of
which will be determined within a
short time by means of the crosscut
to the north from the 400-foot level.

The development work is being
done at the east end of the claim,
near where it adjoins the Golden
Anchor.

In view of the fact the ledges of
the Golden Anchor, Midway, Tonopah
Mining Company and Tonopah Ex-
tension are all headed toward the
Cash Boy, the prospects for making
a strike of shipping ore in the near
future are very encouraging.

Application for a patent for the
Cash Boy claim has been filed with the
United States Land Office at Wash-
ington.

sion to Appropriation the Public Waters of
the State of Nevada.

Notice is hereby given that on the
12th day of Sept., 1905, in accordance
with Section 23, Chapter XLVI, of the
Statutes of 1905, one Philip V. Mighels
and Frank L. Wildes of Carson,
County of Ormsby and State of Ne-
vada, made application to the State
Engineer of Nevada for permission to
appropriate the public waters of the
State of Nevada. Such application to
be made from Ash Canyon creek at
points in N E 1/4 of S W 1/4 of section
10 T 15 N R 19 E by means of a dam
and headgate and five cubic feet per
second is to be conveyed to points
in N E 1/4 of S W 1/4 of section 11,
T 15 N R 19 E, by means of a flume
and pipe and there used to generate
electrical power. The construction
of said works shall begin before June
1, 1906, and shall be completed on or
before June 1, 1907. The water shall
be actually applied to a beneficial use
on or before June 1, 1908.
