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MACK'S BLIGHTING INFLUENCE

Charley Mack and Dick Kirman, who handled the rump ticket at the last election announce that they are going to make a similar fight against the silver ticket this fall, and urge as a reason that they don't want to see the silver party delivered over to the democrats.
