SETRO ENJOINED — THE MINES SCORE ONE!

Yesterday there was issued by Judge Rising's Court in Virginia City an order enjoining Sutro from prosecuting his intended work in the tunnel whereby the water from the Comstock mines was to be dammed out of that conduit. It seems that Sutro had set his men at work sinking a winze from the tunnel level toward the 1700-foot level of the Savage. Of course this would have caused the water to flow in as fast as it was pumped out. Of the injunction and its binding character, the Gold Hill News of last evening says: "This injunction is full and explicit and cannot be misunderstood. It restrains the officers, agents, employees and all persons acting under the control, authority and direction of them or either of them and commands them to absolutely refrain until further order of the court from constructing, building or maintaining any bulkhead or other obstruction to or about the Sutro Tunnel, which shall in any manner retard, obstruct or prevent the free flow or drainage of all water flowing into said tunnel from the underground works of the Savage mine, or which shall at any time flow into or be received by said tunnel from the shaft of said company known as the Combination shaft as the drifts therefrom, and from in any manner obstructing or hindering by said appliances, or otherwise, the free flow in said tunnel of all waters received by the said tunnel, by reason of pumping the same from the underground works of the Savage mine, or by means of said Combination shaft and the drifts therefrom, and from in any manner sinking and excavating the winze being sunk and excavated by the defendant in the plaintiff's mining claim aforesaid from the bottom of said tunnel to the 1700 level of said mine, and from in any manner sinking any winze or shaft or other opening from the bottom of said tunnel to said underground works of the plaintiffs, so as to cause water or any portion thereof to flow out of said tunnel into said mine and underground works, and from in any manner constructing or maintaining any obstruction or appliances of said tunnel which will prevent or tend to prevent the drainage of all water contained in the plaintiff's mine into and through said tunnel."
