THE RAILROAD COMMITTEE.

The Joint Committee of Fourteen and Citizens' Railroad Committee met at 9:30 yesterday morning and resumed discussion of the railroad question.

THE MINSTRELS.

NEVADA LEGISLATURE—NINTH SESSION.

Senate—Thirty-Third Day.

CARSON CITY, February 7, 1879.

The Senate convened at 11 o'clock with President in the Chair. Quorum present. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Hammond. Minutes of previous day read and approved.

Leave of absence for the day was granted Mr. Thompson and Mr. Farrell.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

By Comins, from Committee on Ways and Means—Favorably, Senate bill 88, transferring money in State Building Fund to General Fund.

By Dayton, from Committee on Counties and County Boundaries—Favorably, Senate bill 85, relative to erecting guide boards on highways.

By Blair, from Committee on Mines and Mining—Favorably, Smith's, of Lander, Assembly bill 55, providing for greater security of life of miners, by requiring the use of iron bonneted cages in vertical shafts 450 feet in depth.

By Schultz, on Claims—Favorably, on bill for relief of Miss Hodgkinson, with reduction of amount.

Gibson, from State Prison Committee—Favorably, Senate bill 77, relative to the release of prisoners on recommendation of a joint committee.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

Announcing his approval of Senate bill 58, for the safe keeping of moneys of the State.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Schultz—That the Controller draw his warrant in favor of Miss Hodgkinson for the sum of \$14 for services in copying. Adopted.

By Powning—That the Railroad Committee be instructed to report on Assembly bill requiring local roads to report amount of business done by them, as soon as to-morrow evening. Withdrawn.

By Boardman—Relative to the employment of such additional clerical aid as will insure the completion of the Appendix to the Senate Journal. Laid on the table temporarily.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Blair—For the better protection of the agricultural interests of the State. Referred to Judiciary Committee and ordered printed.

By Stewart—To amend the Act concerning crimes and punishments. (Provides against the posting of advertisements or bills except by permit from individuals or county.) Referred to Judiciary Committee and ordered printed.

By Boardman, without previous notice—To amend the Act relative to highways. Referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Assembly bill 64, regulating the measurement of charcoal. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

By Shepherd, without notice—To amend the election law. (Provides that returns shall be delivered to another county officer, who was not voted for, when the County Clerk has been a candidate for office.) Referred to Committee on Elections and ordered printed.

GENERAL FILE.

Westerfield's Senate bill 88, providing for the transfer of any money remaining in the Building Fund after the 17th day of February to the General Fund. Considered engrossed and put upon its final passage.

Boardman moved to amend so as to make the time of transfer February 25. Lost.

Bill passed, Ayes 19, Noes 3. Powning gave notice that he should ask a reconsideration of the vote.

RECESS FOR ONE HOUR.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reconvened at 1:05. President in the Chair.

GENERAL FILE.

Stone's Senate bill 77—For the release of prisoners by providing for a committee to report to the Board of Pardons. Passed.

Comins' Senate bill 78—To provide revenue for the State. Laid on the table.

Powning's Senate bill 45—To regulate fees of officials. Laid on the table.

Martin's Senate bill 86—To provide for certain legislative expenses. (Relief of Messrs. King and Allen as President and Speaker pro tem.)

Meder objected to the bill as unconstitutional.

Under suspension of rules the bill was put upon its final passage and passed. Ayes 16, Noes 4.

Foulks' Senate bill 85—Providing for the erection of guideboards on highways. Ordered engrossed.

Smith's (of Lander) Assembly bill 55—To provide for greater safety of life by use of cages with iron bonnets in vertical shafts of 450 feet. The question being upon an amendment making the distance exempt from use of such cages 700 feet, considerable discussion ensued, when the amendment was lost.

Cassidy moved to recommit to Committee on Mines and Mining with instruction to amend, making the use of safety cages imperative where cages are used at all. Adopted.

Senate resolution—For relief of John Day in the sum of \$22 64 for copying. Adopted.

Powning's Senate bill 6—To authorize the School Trustees of Washoe County to issue bonds for purpose of building school houses to the amount of \$20,000. Passed by unanimous vote.

Dangberg's Senate bill 62—To encourage growth of shade and fruit trees. Laid on the table.

Cassidy's Senate bill 84—For relief of Eugene Blair and James Brown. Rewarding them for the killing of three stage robbers in protection of life and property. Gives Blair \$375 and Brown \$125. Passed by unanimous vote.

Rules suspended and Assembly message read but not acted upon. Motion to recess until 7 P. M. carried.

EVENING SESSION.

At 7 P. M. a call of the Senate was ordered. Comins moved that further proceedings under the call be dispensed with. Lost.

The several absent Senators submitted various excuses and were admitted. Westerfield moved a suspension of the call. Lost.

HAINES-DANGBERG CASE.

On motion of Mr. Boardman the majority and minority reports of the Election Committee were taken up.

Counsel of both parties then presented testimony.

Mr. Boardman introduced the following resolution: That the Senate, after hearing of the testimony in the contest case of Haines vs. Dangberg, hereby adopts the majority report of the Committee on Elections, and finds and declares that at the general election held in this State on Nov. 5, 1878, the said Haines received a majority of all legal votes in Douglas County for the office of State Senator, and that he is entitled to hold and occupy said office as provided by the Constitution of the State, and that the said Dangberg is not entitled to the same nor to further exercise of the rights or duties thereof and is hereby removed therefrom.

Cassidy proposed as a substitute that the proper way of getting at the question would be for Senators to vote for either Haines, Dangberg or a tie, as they might choose.

The Secretary read the statement of the contestant Haines, setting forth the causes for contest.

Cassidy sent up his proposition in writing and argued in favor of a vote for a tie vote if that was the sense of the Senators, instead of voting for either the contestant or seat member. Lost.

Cassidy moved to lay the motion offered by Boardman—to adopt the report of the majority of the committee giving Haines the seat—on the table. Lost—yeas, 6; noes, 18.

Comins moved to adopt the minority report to retain Dangberg in his seat. Lost—yeas, 6; noes, 18.

The final vote on giving Haines the seat was:

For Haines: Blair, Boardman, Dayton, Doolin, Farrell, Gallagher, Gibson, Kaiser, King, Martin, McConnell, Meder, Perley, Powning, Stewart, Stone, Thompson, Wheeler—18.

For Dangberg: Cassidy, Comins, Cresswell, Schultz, Shepherd, Westerfield—6.

Assembly—Thirty-Third Day.

Speaker Gaston called the Assembly to order at 11 A. M. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Davis.

PETITIONS.

Fisk presented a written statement relative to a patient confined in the insane asylum at Stockton, Light by name, sent from Washoe County, who has money, and is considered sane enough to be released from further relief from the State.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

By Wilson, from Committee on Education, favorably Assembly bill No. 9 to amend the Fish Act.

Also favorably, with amendments, Assembly bill No. 60, to create a State Board of Examiners.

Also favorably, with amendments, Assembly bill to amend the School Act.

By Allen from Committee on Mines and Mining, Assembly bill No. 76, to protect owners of small amount of stock in mines by permitting visits.

By Lane, of Virginia portion of Storey delegation, Assembly bill No. 64, authorizing the County Commissioners of Storey County to transfer certain moneys to School Fund.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

Foulks' resolution relieving the Committee on Corporations from the further consideration of bills relative to freights and fares until after the report of the Joint Committee of Fourteen, was indefinitely postponed.

Beard moved to take from the table Plummer's resolution of yesterday, which proposes to rescind the order referring all bills to said Committee. Indefinitely postponed.

By Williams, joint resolution requesting the establishment of a post office mail route, tri-weekly from St. Clair's to Grantsville in Nye County. Passed under suspension of the rules.

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

Cassidy's Senate bill amending the State Prison Act by providing for gradual commutation of sentence as a reward. Referred to State Prison Committee.

Recessed for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Plummer, by leave, introduced a concurrent resolution requesting General McDowell to establish a company of cavalry at Duck Valley in Elko County during the coming spring and summer, as trouble is feared from the Indians. Passed by unanimous vote under suspension of the rules.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Wermuth—To amend the Revenue Act

(extends the time for settlement of collecting officers ten days.) Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

GENERAL FILE.

Smith's of Lyon, Assembly bill No. 24, to amend the State Orphans' Home Act, placing the election of the superintendent and matron hands of the Legislatures. Passed, Ayes 30, Noes 19.

Smith's of Lyon, Assembly bill No. 21, Supplemental to the School Act so as to allow the formation of a school district from portions of two counties. Passed.

Hagar's Assembly bill No. 45, to prevent breaking of enclosures and provide for damage caused by shooting of animals. Passed.

Mayhugh's Assembly bill No. 12, to provide for the districting of counties into commissioners districts. Passed. Ayes 27, Noes 11.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Foulks—Relating to the flow of water in the Truckee River. (Authorizes the State and Washoe county authorities to prosecute parties diverting water from the Truckee river into California and provides for the appropriation of \$3,000 by both the State and Washoe County for expenses of prosecution. Committed to Committee of the Whole.

Cassidy's Senate bill to ascertain the will of the people on the Chinese question by ballot. Under suspension of rules put upon its final passage and passed by vote of ayes 40, noes 1, Mr. Beard voting on the negative.

At 2 o'clock the Speaker announced the special order, viz: the consideration of Smith's (of Storey) Assembly bill 1, to provide for the care of the insane of the State.

Fisk moved to amend by requiring that citizens of Reno give a \$50,000 bond to the State that they will furnish 300 inches of water at the highest elevation of land to be used, the contractors to give bond of \$200,000 for filling of contract. Laid on the table.

Davies moved to amend by reducing the appropriation from \$100,000 to \$75,000. He stated that the original cost of the asylum now used by Drs. Langdon & Clark at Stockton was \$25,000. He was willing to appropriate about three times as much for Reno. Laid on the table.

Mayhugh moved to amend by allowing the Commissioners \$1,000 for incidental expenses in addition to the \$100,000 appropriation. Adopted.

Smith (of Lyon) moved to amend by limiting the Commissioners to the \$100,000 for the building, furniture, etc. Adopted.

Wait opposed the bill in a set speech.

Foulks and Underwood advocated the passage of the bill as printed.

Allen of Storey moved to indefinitely postpone the bill. Lost. Ayes 9, noes 40.

Mr. Howe believed the bill had not yet been considered in Committee of the Whole, and moved to so commit it. Carried.

GENERAL FILE.

Howe's Assembly bill to prohibit the employment of Chinese on public works. Passed. Ayes 42, noes 3.

On motion of Underwood House went into Committee of the Whole and considered the Smith Assembly bill 1.

Morrison moved to amend by giving the Board of Commissioners the power to locate the asylum without instruction.

Davies moved a substitute that Bowers' Mansion be named as a more desirable place, if it could be purchased for \$150,000.

Howe suggested that Davies' substitute would admit of the owners of Bowers' mansion charging \$100,000.

Foulks asserted that the motion of Davies was the result of a job.

Davies' and Morrison's proposed amendments were rejected.

Allen of Storey moved to substitute \$50,000 for \$100,000 as the appropriation. Lost.

Davies moved to strike out so much of the bill as allowed incidental expenses to the Board outside of the \$100,000. Lost.

Mayhugh moved to amend so as to require the Commissioners to invite bids for construction of building according to plans and specifications within 90 days from passage of Act. Agreed to.

The Committee rose and recommended the engrossment and passage of bill as amended. At 4:30 P. M. adjourned.
