NEVADA LEGISLATURE—NINTH SESSION.

Senate—Forty-seventh Day.

CARSON CITY, February 21, 1879.

The Senate convened at 10:30 o'clock with the President in the Chair. Quorum present. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Weir. Minutes of previous day read and approved.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Stewart, from Committee on Education—Unfavorably on bill to abolish the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools.

By Boardman, from Committee on Judiciary—Reported back to the Ways and Means Committee, Senate bill 75, to provide for an asylum for indigent poor; also, favorably with amendments, Senate bill 113, relative to partition fences.

By Thompson, from Committee on Roads and Bridges—Favorably Senate Bill 127, to amend the Act in relation to highways; also, unfavorably Senate bill 93, to amend the Act in relation to highways.

By Stone, from Committee on Elections—Favorably on Assembly bill 41, to prevent fraud at primary elections; also, unfavorably on Assembly bill 30, to amend the election law; also, favorably, Senate bill 107, to create a Board of County Commissioners; also, unfavorably, Senate bill 23, to amend the election law.

By Cousins, from Committee on Ways and Means—Without recommendation, Assembly bill 64, to regulate the measurement of charcoal.

By Blair, from Committee on Mines and Mining—Favorably Senate bill 119, relative to mining records; also, favorably Senate bill 122, relative to mineral collections; also, favorably, Assembly bill 55, relative to safety cages in mines.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR.

Announcing his approval of Senate bill 85, providing for the erection of guide boards on highways; also, of Senate bill 95, to provide for the payment of indebtedness to White Pine County.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

King moved that the vote by which Senate bill 58, relative to the purchase of Hawley's Digest and Sawyer's Reports was passed be reconsidered. Carried. And further, that the Secretary be instructed to recall from the Assembly the above named bill. Carried.

Mr. Cassidy moved that when this Senate adjourn it do so out of respect to the birthday of Washington. Adopted.

Mr. Westerfield moved to reconsider the vote by which the "tree bill" was passed. Adopted.

MESSAGES FROM ASSEMBLY.

Transmitting several bills upon which action has been taken in that House and duly reported.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Comins, to amend the Act to create a current expense fund for White Pine County. Rules suspended and ordered engrossed.

By Schultz, for the relief of James E. Wood for the capture of a horse stolen from him by escaped prisoners in 1871. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

Lane's Assembly bill 96, to amend the Revenue Act relative to theatrical licenses. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Foulks' Assembly bill 78, to amend the State's Prison Act. Referred to Committee on State's Prison.

Smith's, (of Eureka,) Assembly bill 99, to provide for the payment of certain claims. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

Williams' Assembly bill 115, to amend the Act to create a current expense fund for Nye County. Referred to Nye County Delegation.

GENERAL FILE.

Assembly joint resolution—Praying the President to sign the anti-Chinese bill. Motion to lay on the table lost.

Recommitted to Committee on Education for correction.

Haines' Senate bill 116—To pay the heirs of John Cradlebaugh the same amount paid other District Judges of the Territory. Laid on the table.

Shepherd's Senate bill 103—To amend the Act to preserve wild game. Considered engrossed and passed. Ayes 17, noes 2.

Mr. Creswell reported, out of order favorably, assembly bill 115 relative to Nye County finances. Bill then taken up and passed by unanimous vote. Recessed for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reconvened at 1 P. M., President in the chair.

GENERAL FILE.

Boardman's Senate bill 93—To amend the Act relative to highways. Laid on the table.

Haines' Senate bill 107—To amend the Act to create a Board of County Commissioners. Gives the County Commissioners the right to count votes in certain cases. Recommitted to Judiciary Committee.

Shepherd's Senate bill 23—To amend the election law. Refused engrossment.

Dangberg's Senate bill 62—To encourage the growth of fruit and shade trees. Passed. Ayes 16 noes 5.

Mr. Cassidy by leave, reported out of order, from the Eureka delegation, favorably on certain claims.

McConnell, from Committee on Supplies and expenditures—A resolution authorizing the payment to A. C. Bragg of \$50 for rent of Committee room.

Adopted. Senate bill 111—To authorize the employment of Chinese labor. Ordered engrossed.

Boardman's Senate bill 113—To provide for the erection of partition fences. Ordered engrossed.

Boardman's Senate bill 114—To amend the Act to regulate action in criminal cases. Ordered engrossed.

Cassidy's Senate bill 119—To provide for the better preservation of mining records. Passed. Ayes 18, noes 3.

Stewart's Senate bill 122—To encourage the collection of mineral and other specimens in this State, by exemption of such collection from levy and execution, except collections of coins or paper money. Passed. Ayes 13, noes 7.

Boardman's Senate bill 127—To amend the Act relative to public highways. Ordered engrossed.

Mayhugh's Assembly bill 74—To amend the Act regulating the purchase of lands from the State. Placed at the bottom of the file.

Foulks' Assembly bill 30—To amend the election law. [Makes the taking of bribes for votes a misdemeanor and gives half the fine to the briber. Laid on the table.

Powell's Assembly bill 41—To amend the law relative to primary elections. Laid on the table.

Smith's of Lander Assembly bill 55—For better protection of life by the use of safety cages in mines, where iron cages are used. Laid on the table until Monday.

Assembly bill 62, to regulate the measurement of charcoal. Blair moved to amend to make it heap measure instead of stroke. Lost. Bill passed. Ayes 14, noes 6.

Mr. Cresswell gave notice that on Monday he should move a reconsideration of the vote just taken.

Lamb's Assembly bill 7, to abolish the office of County Superintendent of Public Schools. Placed at bottom of file.

Wermuth's Assembly bill 100, to authorize the payment of certain claims against Eureka County by the Commissioners of that county. Passed unanimously. Adjourned at 3:35 P. M.

Convened at 10:30 A. M. Speaker Gaston in the chair.

Prayer by Rev. Mr. McLain.

PETITIONS.

By Williams, from citizens of Tybo, opposing the bill to tax the Mormon peddlars of produce. Referred to Committee on Trade and Manufacture.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

By Allen, from Judiciary Committee, favorably Senate bill 76, to amend the Civil Practice Act; also favorably Assembly bill 111, to regulate the sale and use of opium; also favorably Assembly bill 105, in relation to taxes.

By Mayhugh, from Committee on Public Lands, recommending recommitment to Judiciary Committee Assembly bill 70, to preserve timber contiguous to mines.

By Wilson, from Committee on Elections, favorably Senate bill 99, to amend the School Act.

By Powell, from Committee on Trade and Manufactures, recommending reference to Committee of the Whole Assembly bill 44, relative to the Drummer Law.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Mayhugh—That when the House adjourn it do so until Monday next, out of respect to the birthday of General George Washington. Adopted.

By Allen, of Lincoln—Requesting the Governor to return the bill amending the Orphan Home Act for correction. Adopted.

Allen, of Lincoln—Moved to print double the usual amount of copies of the Lewis railroad bill. Adopted.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

By Beard—To tax vendors of wines, malt or spirituous liquors in this State. [Provides for use of the Moffet punch.] Green moved to reject the bill. Lost—yeas, 3; noes, 41. Referred to Committee on Public Morals.

By Foulks—To require persons slaughtering cattle to keep the hides ten days after killing. Referred to Committee on Ways and Means.

By Smyth—To pay for 300 copies of the homographic chart of the Legislature. Referred to Committee of the Whole. Recessed at 12 M. for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reconvened at 1 P. M., the Speaker in the Chair.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

Boardman's Senate bill—To provide for purchase of Hawley's Digest and Sawyer's Report. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Boardman's Senate bill 37—To amend the Homestead Act. Referred to Judiciary Committee. Senate bill 101—To amend the Militia Act. Referred to Judiciary Committee. Stewart's Senate bill 112—Concerning ap-

prentices. Referred to Committee on Trade and Manufacture.

Cassidy's Senate bill 120—To detect and punish incendiaries. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

GENERAL FILE.

Vansickle's Assembly bill 117—Amending the Kingsbury Toll-road Act by reducing rates of toll one-half. Passed unanimously.

Assembly bill 105—Relative to special taxes. Passed unanimously.

Assembly bill 111—To regulate the use of opium. Passed—yeas, 44; noes, 3.

Melarky moved to go into Committee of the Whole for consideration of the Assembly bill (Lewis) to regulate freights and fares.

Fisk moved to include all bills on general file.

On explanation that the Lewis bill had been made the special order for Tuesday the motion was lost.

Senate bill 99—To amend the Public School Act. Passed.

Senate bill 76—To amend the Civil Practice Act. Passed.

Motion of Allen to reconsider the vote on the bill to prosecute persons diverting waters of the Truckee. Carried, and bill made the special order for February 26.

Allen of Storey, by consent, submitted a report recommending the passage of Assembly bill 70, to protect the owners of stock shares in mines. Adjourned.


